## St. Bonaventure



St. Bonaventure, a poor Franciscan friar, who practiced and taught humility and mortification, was raised by the church to its highest honors. St. Francis gave him his name; for, having miraculously cured him of a mortal sickness, he exclaimed, " $O$ bona ventura!"-good luck. St. Thomas and St. Bonaventure received their Doctor's cap together. He was the guest and advisor of St. Louis, and the director of St. Isabella, the king's sister. At the age of thirty-five he was made general of his Order and appointed Cardinal. His remaining years were spent at the Pontiff's right hand, and spoke first at the Council of Lyons. His piety and eloquence won over the Greeks to Catholic union and then his strength failed. He died in A.D. 1274, and was buried by the assembled bishops of the council.
