We have in our school such a place and we enjoy the large collection of books and the pleasant atmosphere we find there.





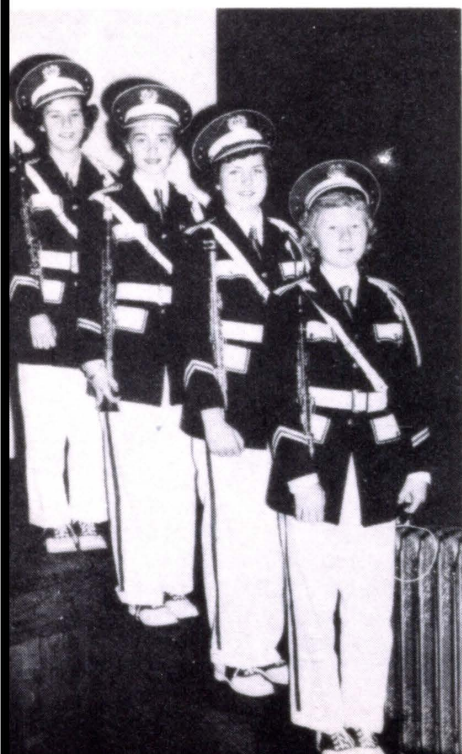

The 1951 Football season was the finest enjoyed by St. Bonaventure since they became a class B School. The Irish had a record of 7 wins and 2 losses. They were rated 6 in the state in class B ratings.

The Shamrocks were upset in their opener by a good St. Cecilia's of Hastings team 12 to 6. St. Bonaventures out-downed and out-rushed the home team but lost the ball game because of fumbles.

The Shamrocks launched a five game winning streak by pounding Loup City 48 to 0. Tooley threw two touchdown passes to Keefer and Hoshor. Zuroski scored on a 40 yd. scamper, and other tallies were added by Blahak, Mimick, and Bowe.

The Shamrocks rolled over Boystown reserve in their third game of the season by the tune of 38 to 6. The Irish started rolling after a 12 to 6 half time lead. Blahak set the scoring pace with three touchdowns. Sokol, Mimick, and Zuroski added the other markers.

The Irish won their third straight game by spanking St. Joseph's of Omaha 46 to 0. John Blahak kept up his scoring pace by scoring 4 times throughout the game. The other three markers were registered by Bowe, Mimick, and Zuroski. Larry Sanders, Lawrence Miller and Dennis Baumert were defense standouts.

The Shamrocks staged a nine touchdown parade to swamp Newman Grove 56 to 6. The Irish piled up a 39 to 0 half time lead. Schmid, Bowe, Blahak, and Hoshor turned in long scoring runs. Zuroski, Mimick, Soulliere, and Tooley accounted for the other points. Tackle Chochon was a standout on defense.

The Shamrocks, celebrating Homecoming, steamrolled St. Mary's of Grand Island by the tune of 51 to 0. Zuroski scooted 64 yards on the second play of the game and the Irish were never threatened after that. Sanders, Tooley, Hoshor, Blahak, and Mimick also added touchdowns.



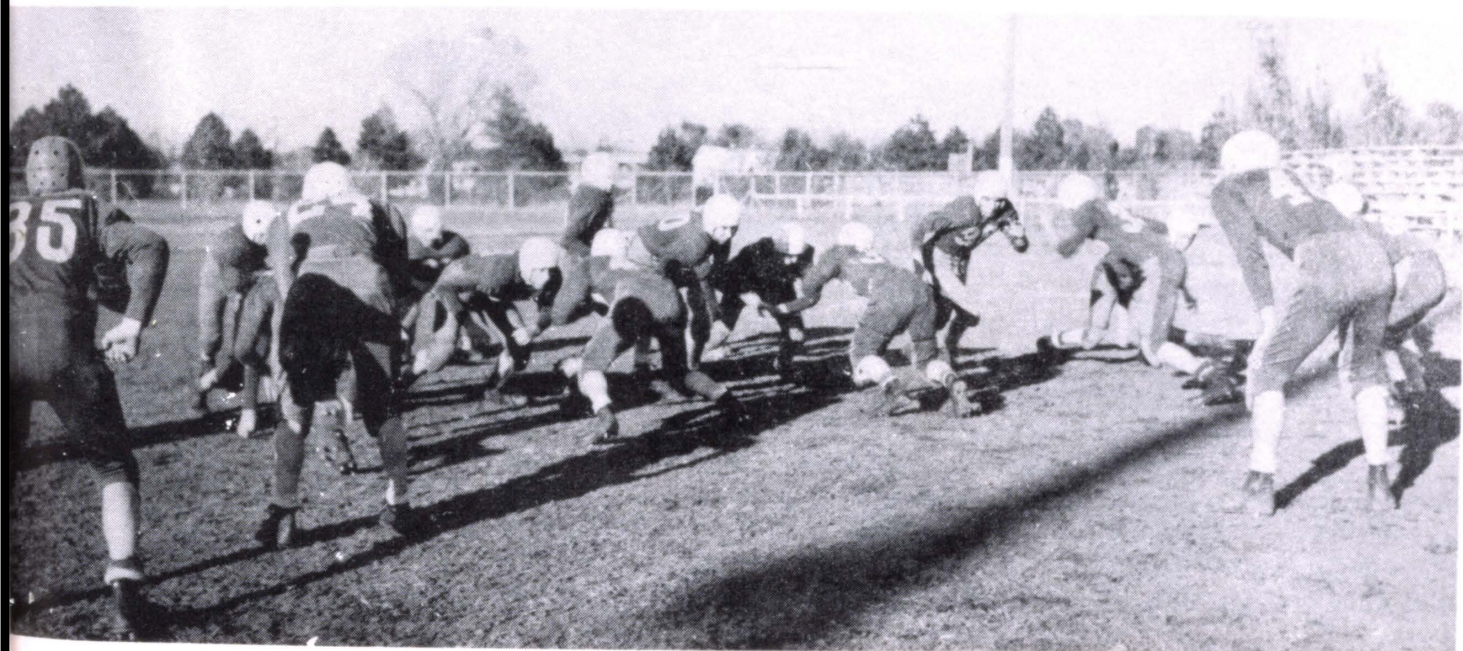
The Irish win strike of five was broken by powerful Holy Name of Omaha by the score of 14 to 6. Holy Name, ranked 1st in the state in Class B ratings, made St. Bonaventures their 38th triumph in a row without defeat. The heavily favored invaders capitalized on two first period breaks to score twice. After that the Rambler's highly tattooed offense was stopped by a rugged Irish defense. The Shamrocks, in the first half, out-played, out-downed, and out-rushed Holy Name and played them on even terms the second half. The Shamrocks scored in the second period after a 65-yard march with John Blahak going the final 6 yards. J. Kaminski, H. Keefer, and D. Bowe were defense standouts.

The Shamrocks ended a very successful season with a 32 to 6 romp over highly regarded Seward team. This was Seward's second set back of the year. John Blahak scored three times and Tom Zuroski twice, one on a 70 yard kick-off return. Ted Mimick turned in excellent running and added two extra points. Baumert, Keefer, and Melcher turned in excellent defense plays.

Sacred Heart of Greeley forfeited to the Shamrocks the last game of the season. The score was 1 to 0, the score of a forfeited game.

St. Bonaventure Shamrocks compiled a season record of 11 wins in 16 starts during the 1951-52 season. Seniors winning basketball letters were Dennis Baumert, John Blahak, John Kaminski, Herman Keefer, Don Sokol, and Dick Tooley.

The Irish opened the season December 4 with a 48-39 triumph over St. Edward. Blahak led scoring with 11 points, Tooley added 10, Sanders and Sokol contributed 8.

The green and white overwhelmed Sacred Heart of Norfolk in their second outing by the count of 62 to 31. Herman Keefer led scoring with his season high of 21 points. Dennis Baumert played an outstanding ball and added 14.

The Shamrocks lost their first game of the season to Lincoln Cathedral by the count of 53 to 30. After a close 23-21 first half, the Irish fell apart.

The Bonnies five won their third victory in four outings by defeating Newman Grove 56 to 29. They coasted after a 32 to 13 half-time lead.

St. Bonaventure ventured to Schuyler January 8 to defeat the warriors 51-38.

The green and white suffered their worst set-back of the season at the hands of Holy Name

in the first game of the Catholic Tournament by the count of 46-19.

In a thrill-packed game, Lincoln Teachers handed the Irish five their third set-back of the season 53-41. Teachers didn't pull away till late in the final quarter.

The Shamrocks doubled the score on St. Paul of Fremont 42 to 21. Herman Keefer and Don Sokol set the scoring pace with 15 and 14 points respectively.

Coach Cletus Fischer's Bonnies marked up their sixth victory in nine starts by downing St. Francis of Humphrey 47-23. The outcome of the game was never in doubt after a 7-7 first quarter.

Keefer, Sokal, and Tooley paced St. Bon's past St. Mary's of Grand Island 52-41, for the Shamrock's seventh victory.

St. Edward avenged an early season setback by defeating the green and white 51 to 44 at St. Edward. Sanders and Sokol sparked the Irish offense with 15 and 14 points respectively.

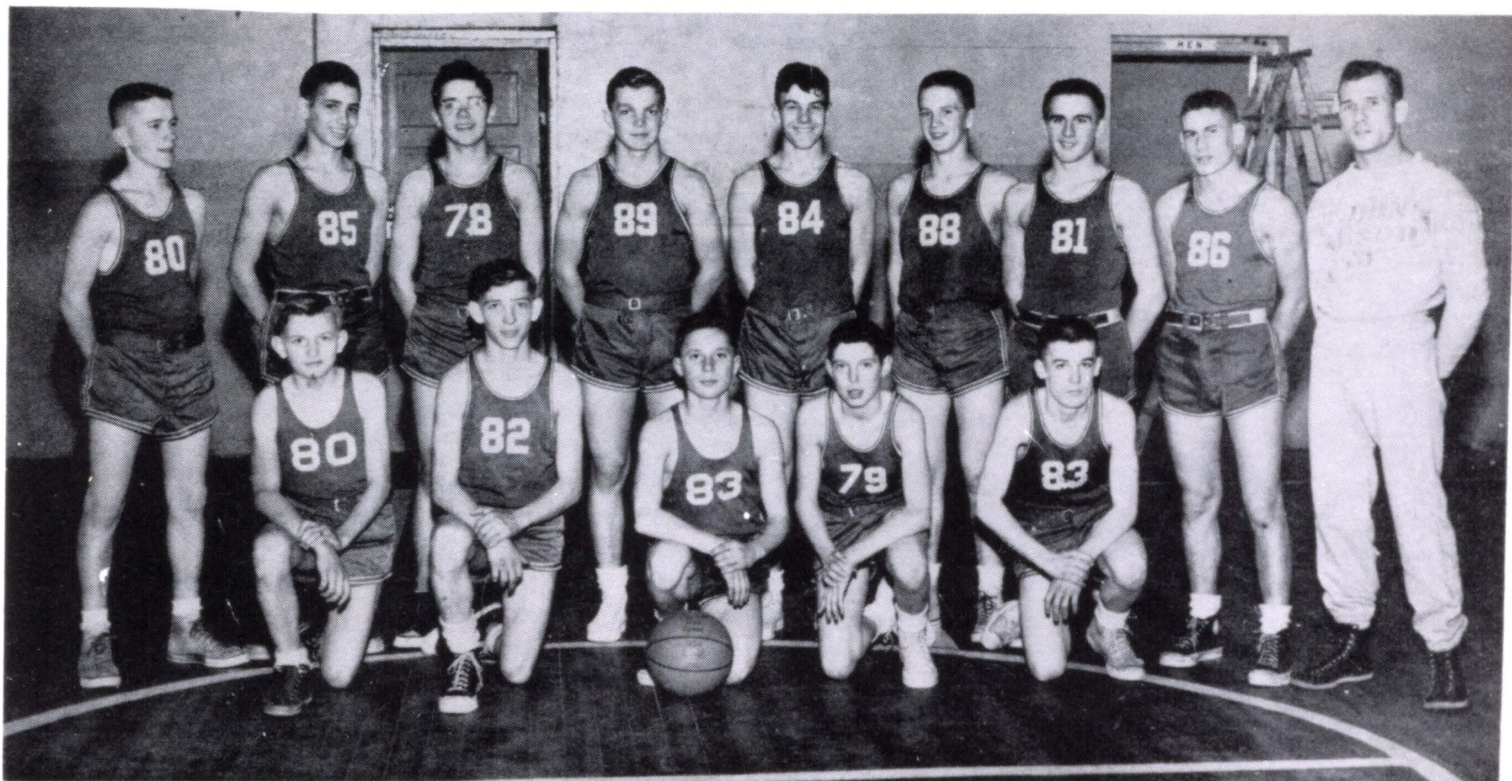
The Shamrock squad, hurt by sickness of several key players, defeated Osceola at Osceola, 36-35. It was a close and exciting contest all the way.
