




Your 1974 SCOTUS ANNUAL is Volume 25 of a yearbook which began in 1949 under the title THE VENTURE. Because the school newspaper bore the same name, the yearbook title was changed to the BONA VENTURE, which means "good luck". This was its title until St. Bonaventure centralized in 1966, and became Scotus Central Catholic, In that year, they selected SCOTUS as the title for the annual and SCOTISTICS as the name of the school newspaper.

We, the editors of Scotus annual, have had the privilege, as well as the responsiblity, to represent the happenings of the 1973-1974 school year as our six years at Scotus come to an end. We hope we have caught all the memories dear to the students and to the community of Scotus and Columbus.

As we compiled this book, we realized that many changes had occurred in our six years at Scotus; especially this year. We observed senior boys and junior high students attending Home Ec courses, girls track and volleyball, golf and the Cross country joggers were making pages in the sports columns.

We also noted Scotus Junior High has had a layman for Principal and there are fewer Sisters teaching at Scotus. And now, as we complete this book, we have learned that Father Meyer, our Superintendent for the last six years, has been appointed to new duties and will no longer be at Scotus. "It takes unity, working together, to make changes and progress possible,"

Father has often told us. We wish to thank Father Meyer for all he has done for Scotus and for us, and wish him God's blessing in his new work.

Throughout these pages we have tried to picture that unity which has been accomplished among students, faculty and the supporting patrons and friends of Scotus and the Columbus community.

The endsheets, an aerial view of Columbus, shows the Scotus environment; St. Bonaventure Church and Grade School, St. Mary Hospital, one of the oldest landmarks, around which this Christian Community grew; and the recent development in the Industrial site. Progress brings about changes and we see this verified at Scotus.



## A Yearbook Remembers

These pictures obtained from the 1954 and 1964 school annual of Cathedral High School, Gallup, New Mexico, and the one about taken for her Golden Jubilee as a Sister, which she celebrated on February 17, 1974, reflect some of the changes Sister has experienced in her long career as a teaching Sister of St. Franics. She attended St. Francis Academy (now Scotus) for two years. After graduation, she joined the Sisters of St. Francis and her teaching career has paralleled her life as a Sister. Sister taught at St. Bonaventure High School from 1943-47, and from 1949-52, and at Scotus since 1965, a total of fifteen years during a period of change in education as well as all phases of religious life.

Sister has adapted to these changes not only in her garb but in being open to new ideas and methods. Now a full time Spanish teacher, she is remembered by former students as a Science teacher and for the school Science Fairs.

## Athletics At Scotus Continues to Expand

"Paul (Dutch) Ernst. . . has started his thirteenth year at St. Bonaventure. . . He introduced football in St. Bonaventure in 1940; in 1943 he tutored his first untied and undefeated team which was eighth in the state in six-man standing. In 1946 he introduced eleven-man football. . "Dutch" also started track in 1940."

As the above picture shows, there has been a need to increase the staff as the expansion continued. In 1969, Cross-Country pictures began to appear in the Scotus; in 1970, a golf team appeared. In 1972, the girls sports, volleyball and track became competitive and district and state berths were sought. Predictions are that in 1976, the bi-centennial year, the girls will be equally competing with boys.
