


Administrators Keep Scotus Alive



The one element of stability that you have is your Faith. If you are at peace with God you will be at peace with yourself. May God love you and assist




Our Spiritual Leaders Inspire Faith And Effort








Mr. Peck is advisor for the National Honor Society and a





She takes an active part in the Big Brother and the Big Sister programs, an aid to youths who lack one parent.










Graduation 1975

By State Ranking Of Seventh Position








Steiner And Mimick Earn Honors




















Senior Leadership Boosts To Victory



the highest award given.












Junior High Enrollment Sets Record






