

Salman Rushdie's book, *The Satanic Verses*, is a fictional work which won a literary prize and earned praise from critics. It has also earned Rushdie a death threat from Iran's leader, Ayatullah Ruhollah Khomeini, Khomeini sentenced Rushdie to death for insulting Islam, the prophet Muhammad, and the holy Koran. Two Iranians promised a reward of \$5 million to the person who kills Rushdie. Rushdie is currently hiding in England and being protected by Scotland Yard.

George Bush became the 41st President of the United States on January 20, 1989. Bush defeated Michael Dukakis in November's election to win the Presidency. One of Bush's first moves was to assemble his Cabinet. John Tower was Bush's Secretary of Defense designate, but the Senate did not approve Tower's nomination. Amid allegations of alcoholism, womanizing, and illegal defense contracts, Tower was rejected by a 53-47 vote.




▲Afghanistan soliders

The Soviet Union withdrew its troops from Afghanistan after nine years of defeat and humiliation. The war, an attempt to take over Afghanistan, was extremely unpopular in the Soviet Union, much like Vietnam was in the United States. The Soviet Union left Afghanistan in bad condition, and it is expected to only get worse. The current reigning Communist regime and a band of mujahedin rebels are still battling for control of the country. The outlook for Afghanistan's immediate future appears grim. +Gas plant in Rabta Hostile relations between the United States and Libya continued this year. A dispute arose over a chemical plant in Rabta, Libya. The United States claims that the plant has been used to manufacture chemical weapons, which have been banned for use in warfare. Libya's leader, Muammar Gaddafi, has maintained that the plant has been used for pharma-

ceuticals only.

The Soviet Republic of Armenia was leveled by an earthquake in December, with the town of Leninakin being hit the hardest. It is estimated that 100,000 of its 290,000 inhabitants died in the earthquake, which registered 6.9 on the Richter scale. Spitak, a town of about 20,000, located extremely close to the earthquake's epicenter, was completely destroyed. Many Western nations, including the United States, sent relief help to the Soviets. It marked the first time since World War II that the Soviet Union accepted help from the United States.

Pan Am Flight 103 exploded over Lockerbie, Scotland, on December 21. All 258 people on board were killed, and approximately twenty more on the ground were killed from the falling debris. The plane had left London, enroute to New York, when it disintegrated and then completely disappeared from the radar screen. Soon after, parts of the plane began falling on Lockerbie, causing fires, destruction, and death. A bomb planted inside a tape recorder was blamed for the blast.



Florence Griffith Joyner

The 1988 Summer Olympics took place in Seoul, South Korea, during September, with record-breaking performances coming in women's track and field and men's diving for the United States. Florence Griffith Joyner and sister-in-law Jackie Joyner-Kersee dominated women's track and field at the Summer Olympics for the United States. They each set a world record - Florence in the 200 meter dash, and Jackie in the long jump. Greg Louganis also set a record. He became the first male diver to twice win two gold medals in the Olympics. There was also negative news at the Olympics. Canadian Ben Johnson, the world's fastest man, tested positive for anabolic steriods, a banned drug, and was consequently stripped of his gold medal in the 100 meter dash.



ADodger pitcher Orel Hershiser

Orel Hershiser, also known as Bulldog, enjoyed a season few pitchers would ever dare to even dream about. This Los Angeles Dodger ace pitched a record-setting 59 straight shutout innings, led his team to a World Series Championship, and was named World Series MVP. Hershiser's season-long success also warranted him the acclaimed Cy Young Award, the highest honor given to a Major League pitcher. Remarkably, his shutout streak snapped fellow Dodger Hall of Famer Don Drysdale's mark of 58 innings which was established 20 years ago.



ANU linebacker LeRoy Etienne

Two-time all Big Eight linebacker LeRoy Etienne helped to anchor the Nebraska defense in a 7-3 victory over Oklahoma. The Blackshirts limited the highly touted wishbone of Oklahoma to just 97 yards rushing in a rainstorm in Norman, Oklahoma. Ken Clark led the Nebraska offense with 167 yards rushing. It was Nebraska's 1st win over Oklahoma in five years.



Workers clean up the oil spill

The worst oil spill in United States' history occurred on March 24. Ten million gallons of North Slope crude poured from the Exxon Valdez, off the coast of Valdez, Alaska. The oil spill began after the ship was steered onto rocks three miles from its designated channel. The ship was under the control of Third Mate Gregory Cousins at the time of the accident. Captain Joseph Hazelwood was legally drunk when tested 101/2 hours after the accident. Experts predict that the effect on the environment will be devastating.



























Students Help the Less Fortunate

Also starting this year, Flag Corps was considered to be a class. This meant the members got credits first semester.








Club Raises Money to Support Athletic Teams






Football Continues Winning Tradition























Girls Achieve Success












Midnight Dreams Become Realities








Graduation . . . the moment the Seniors waited for finally arrived on May 21, 1989. It was a tearful moment, yet a happy one, for Seniors and parents alike.
