In a fast paced, ever-changing world, this school is a trendsetter that will never slow down.



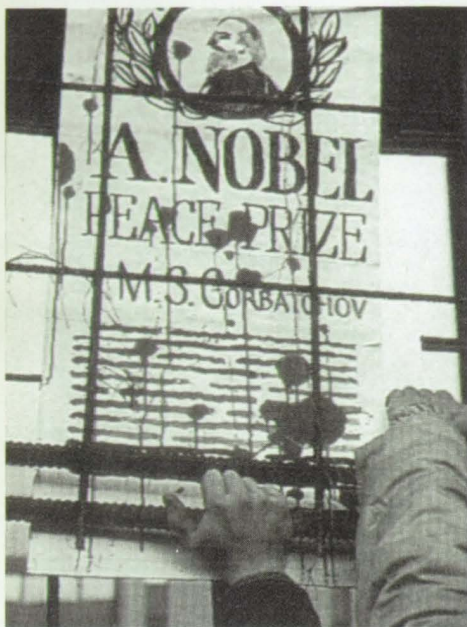

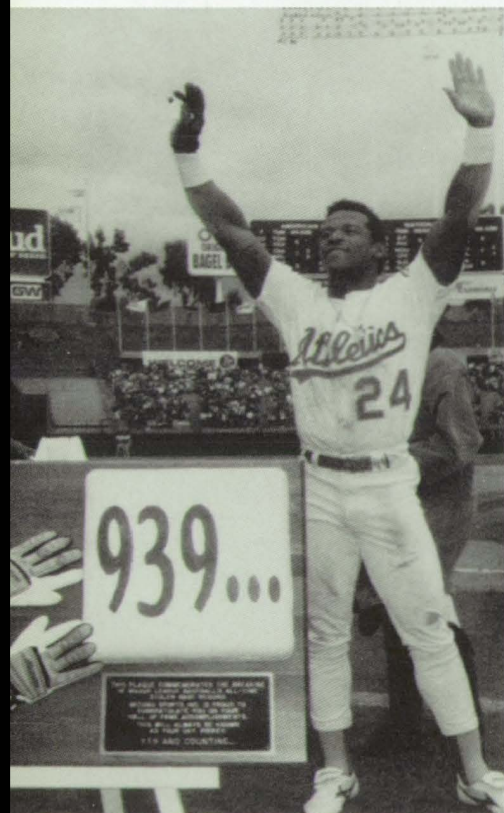

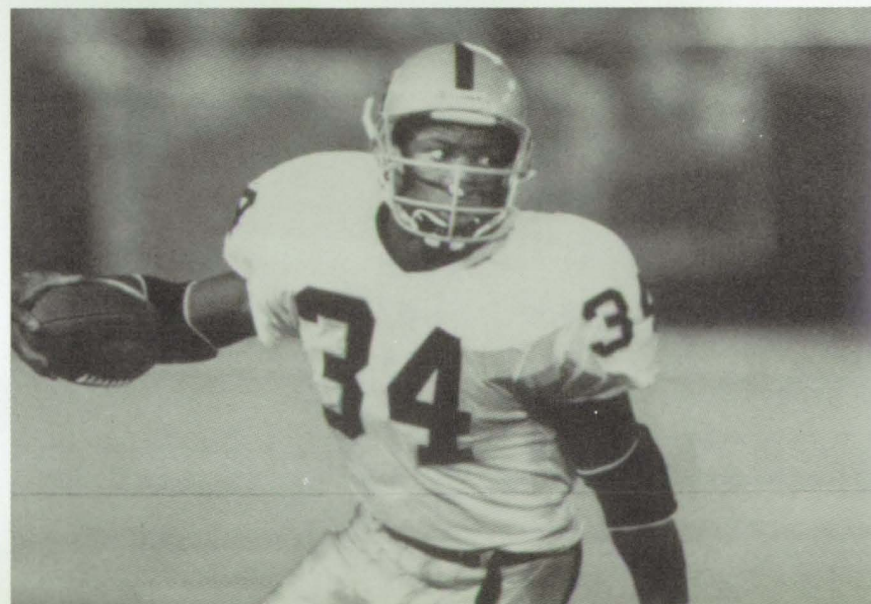

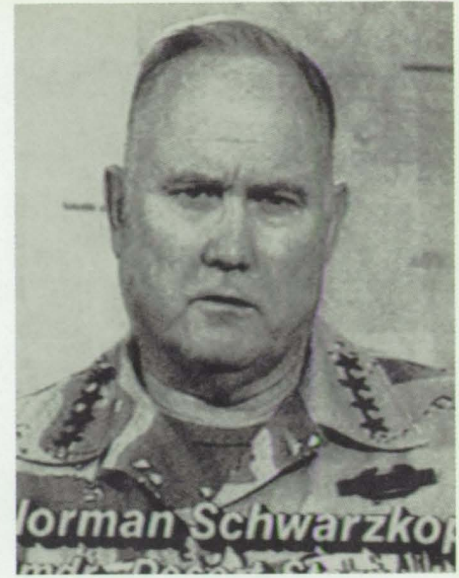

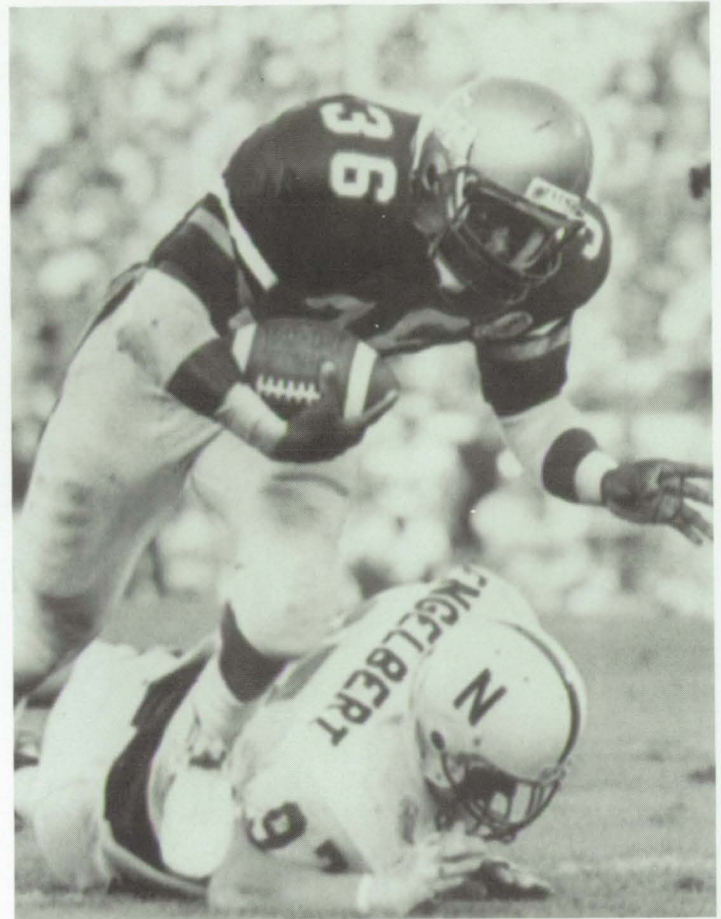


Thousands of Kurds fled Iraq after the war. Their war wasn't over yet, they had to battle fatigue, hunger, disease, and no home.

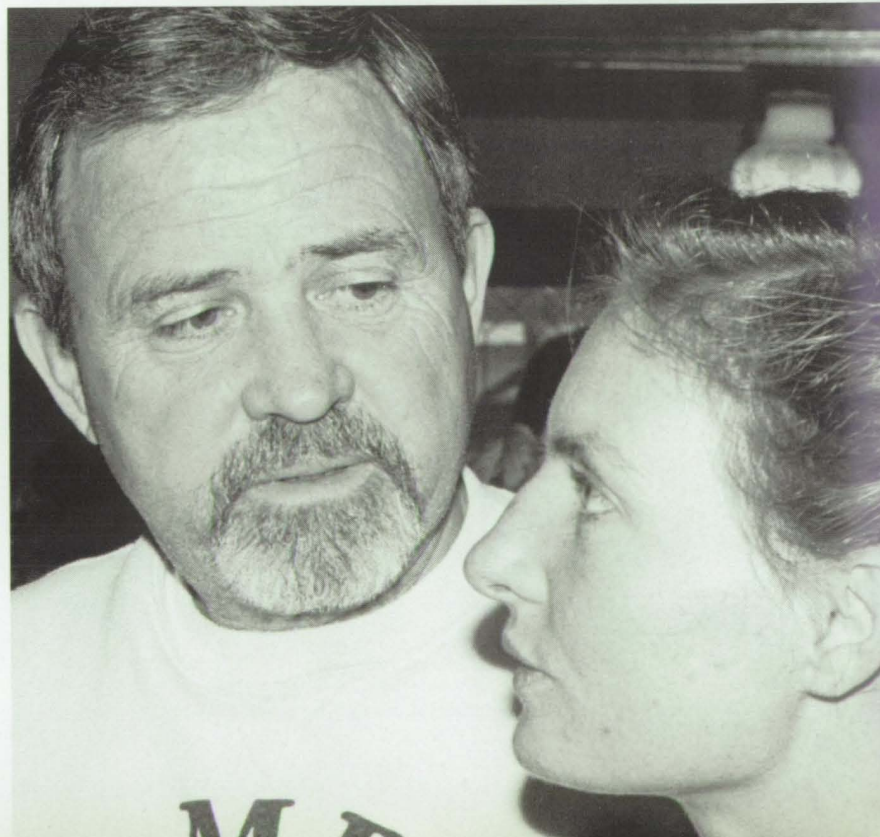

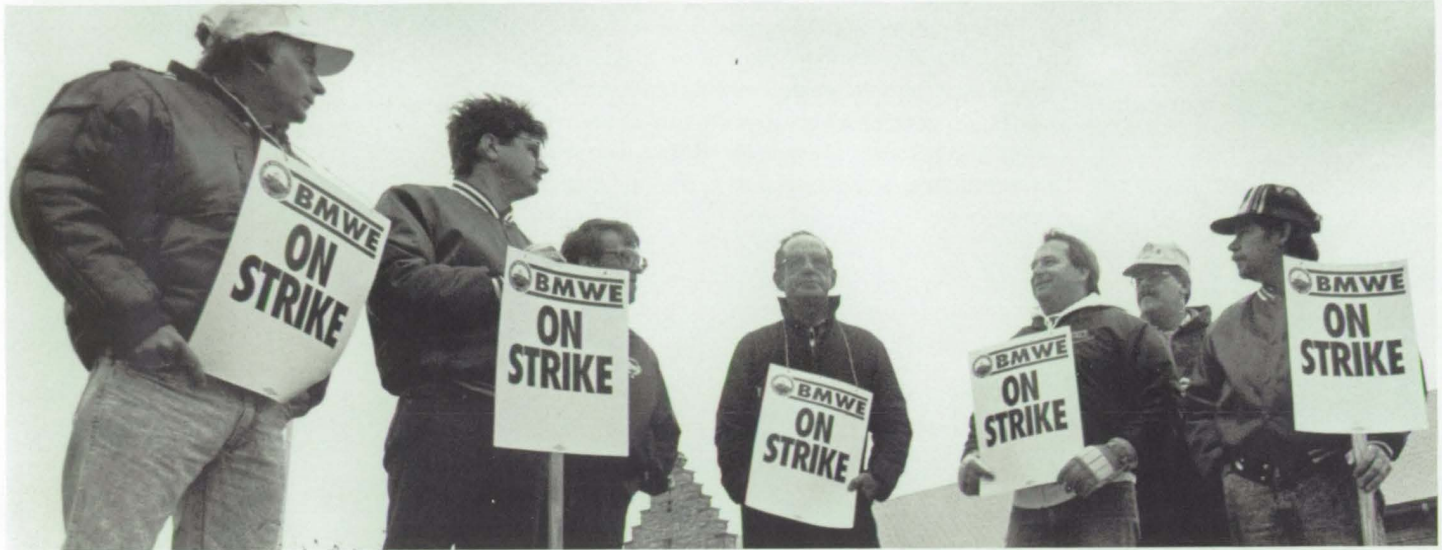

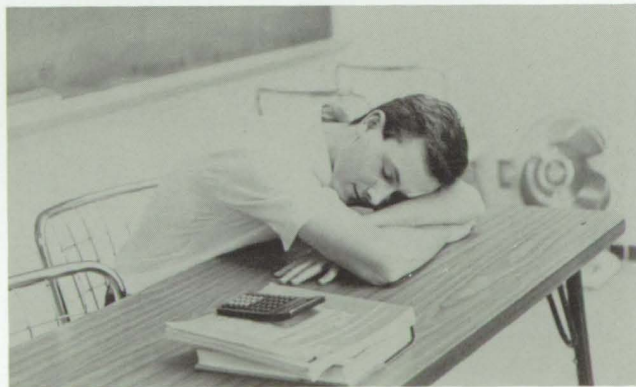

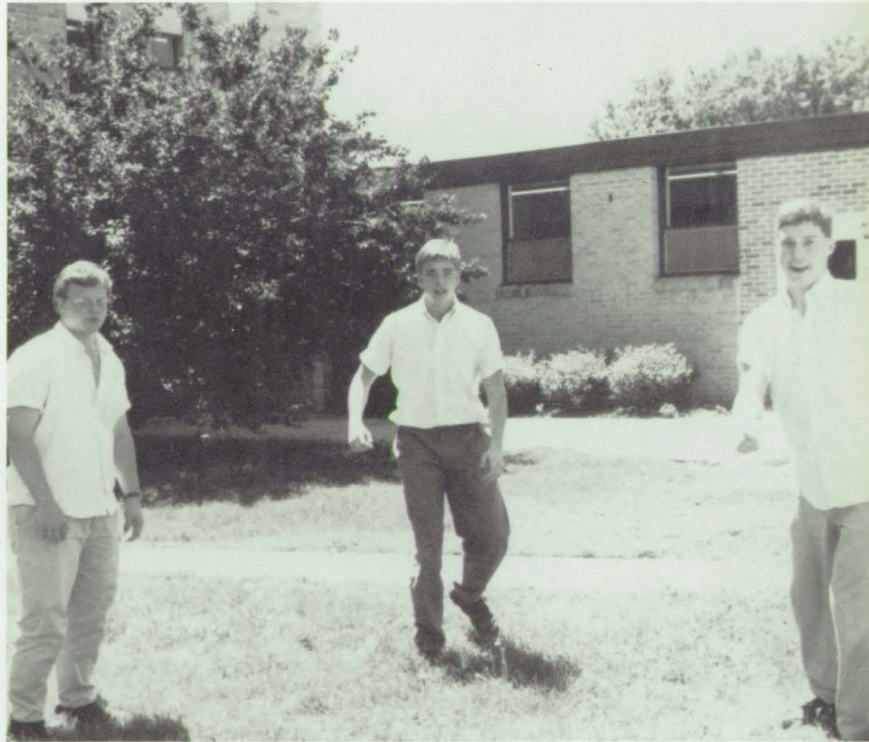

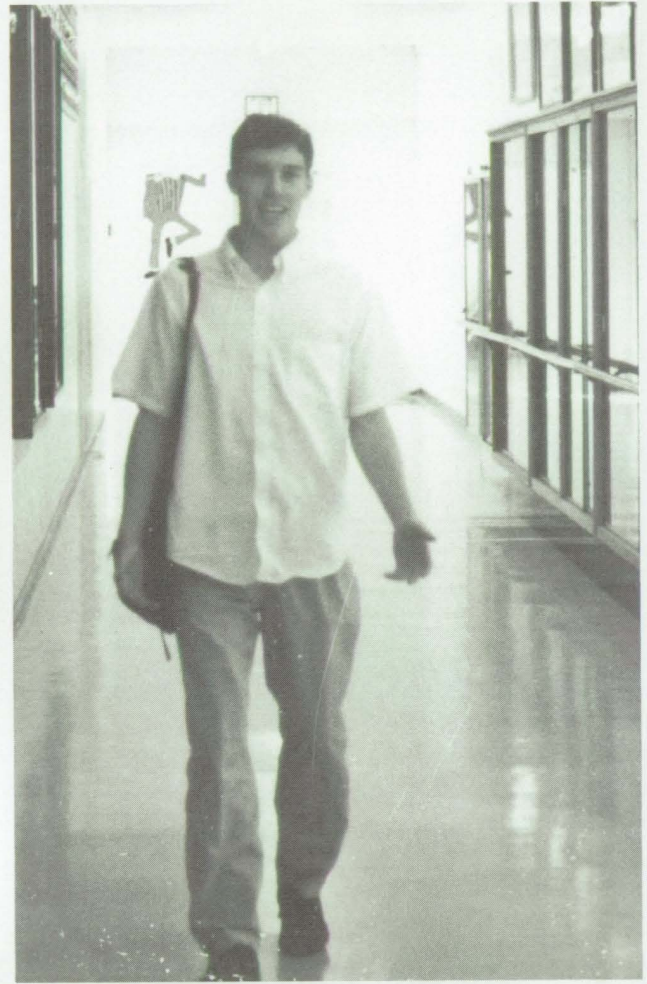


Student Life

Although the class of 1991 is now alumni of Scotus, they will never forget their Graduation Day.



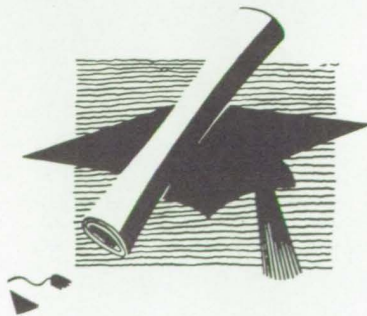

BUILDING FOR THE FUTURE

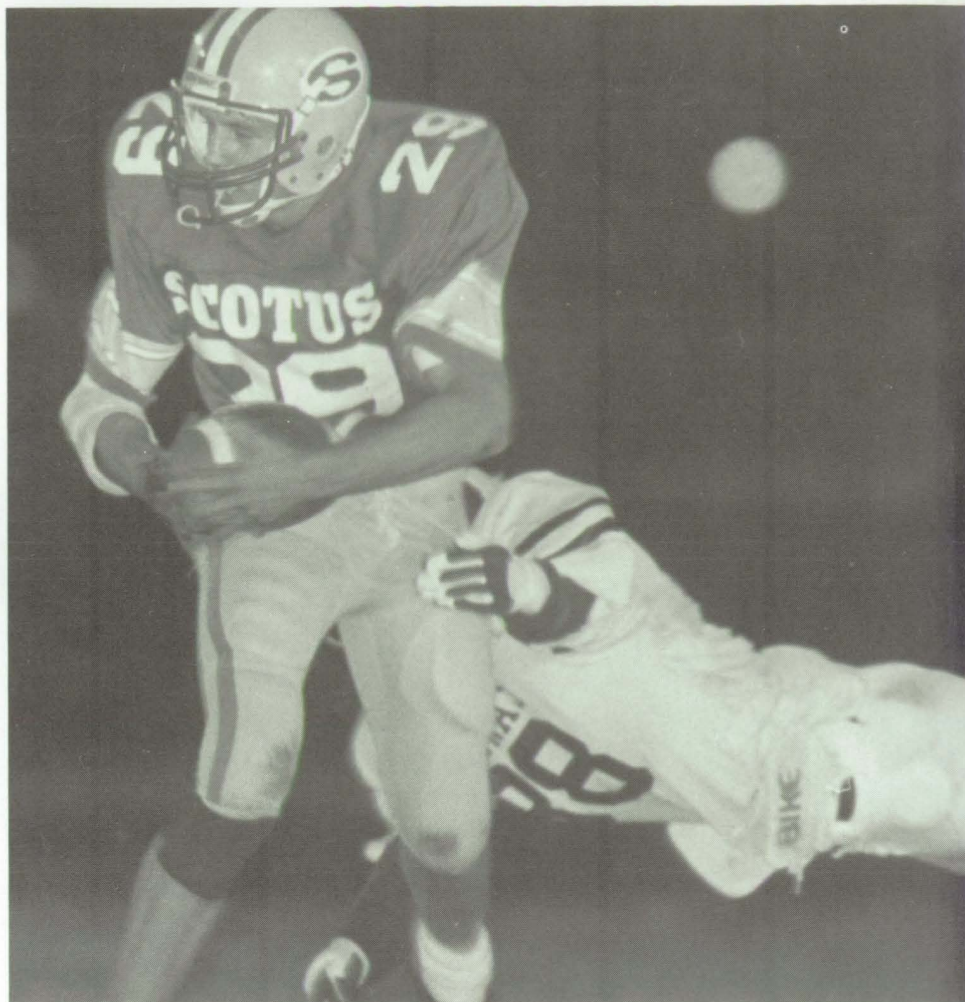

Sophomores Jesse Kosch (starting halfback) and Daren Buettner (defense) led their class to a greater level of involvement than in previous year.

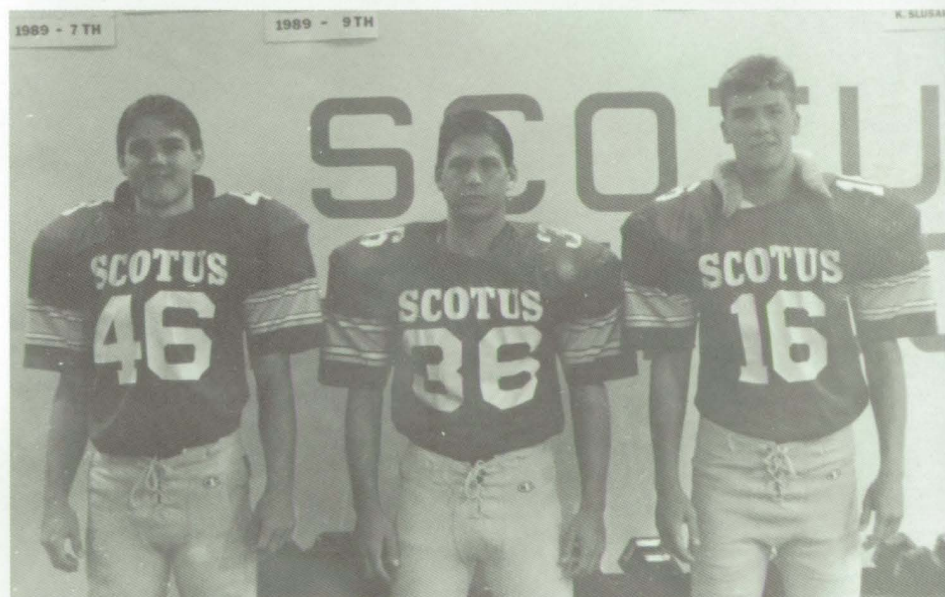
The junior athletes honed many of their skills in the season and promise to be a powerful force next year as seniors.

SCOTUS SWEEPS CLASS B STATE CHAMPS

The 1990 Scotus Shamrock Volleyball team captured the Class B State championship and ended their season with a perfect record of 26-0. The team was led by five seniors who helped rewrite the record books and established the best season in the history of Scotus.

Senior Kristi Sobota led the Shamrocks in the hitting department by compiling an amazing 530 ace spikes in her three year career at Scotus. Kristi was also named to the Nebraska Super All State team, the first Scotus player to receive this award. 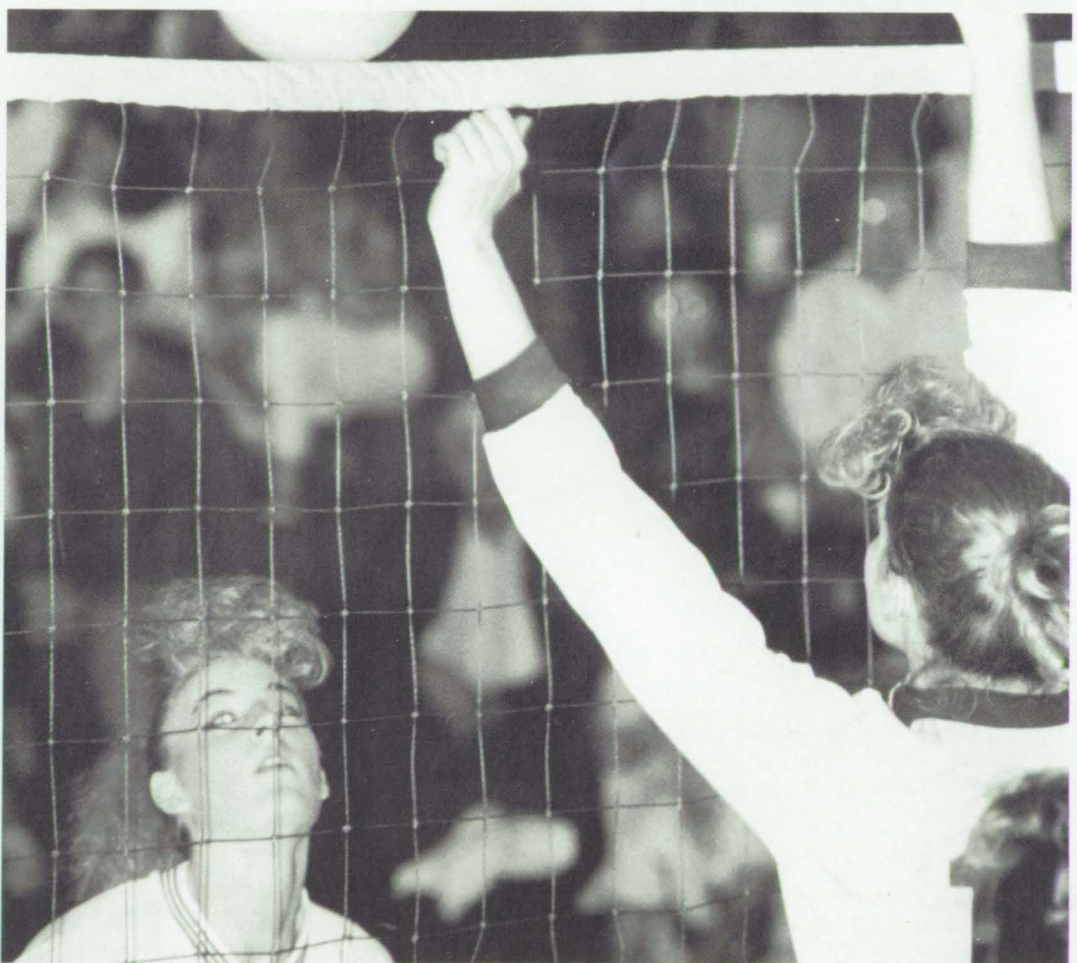

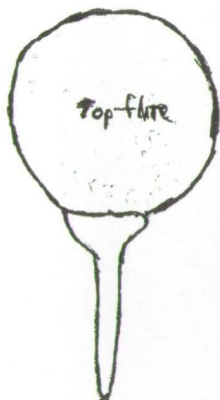
RECORDS FALL TO LADY 'ROCKS

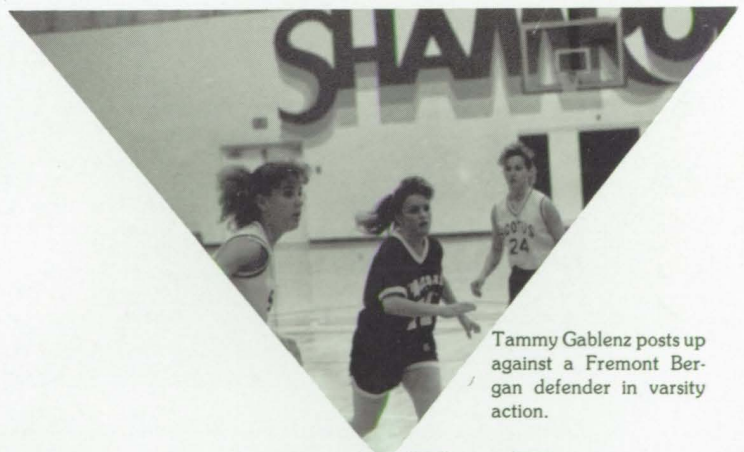

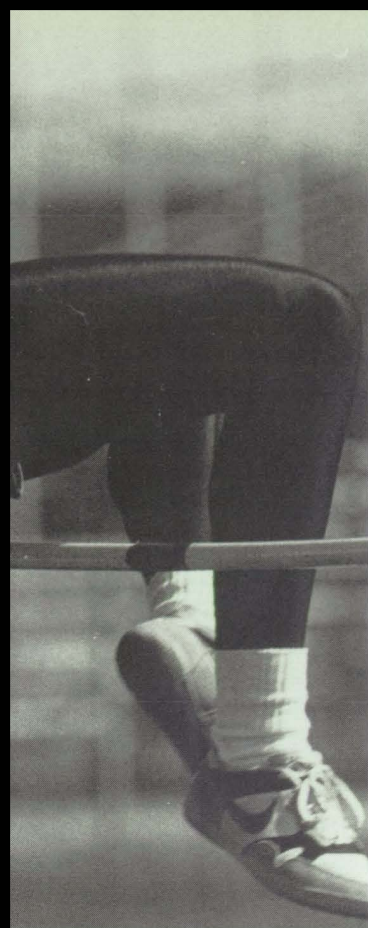

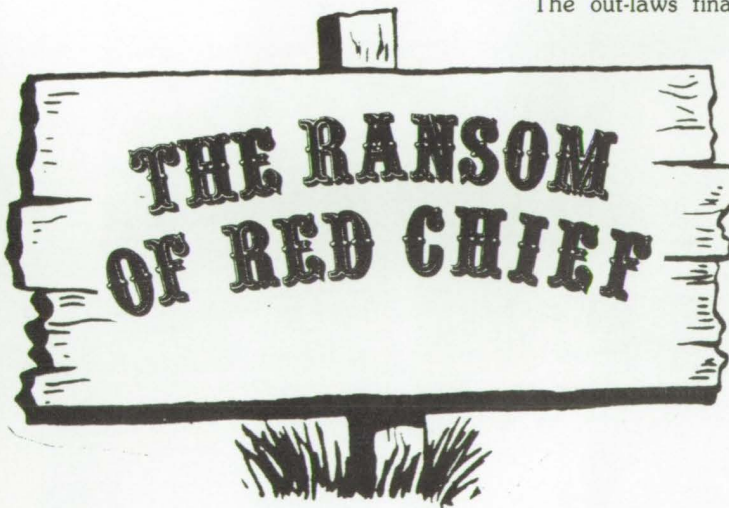

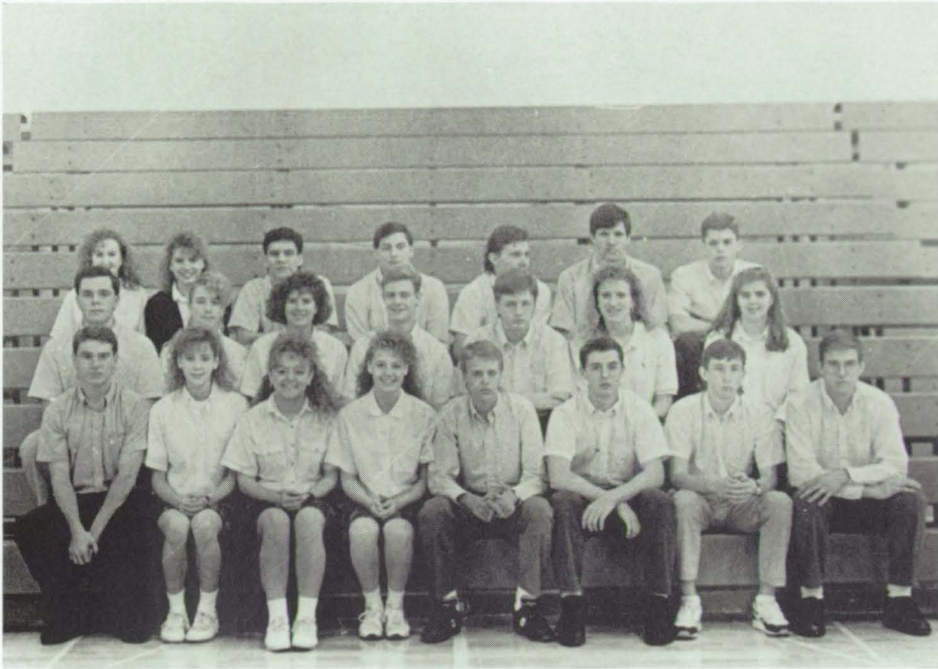

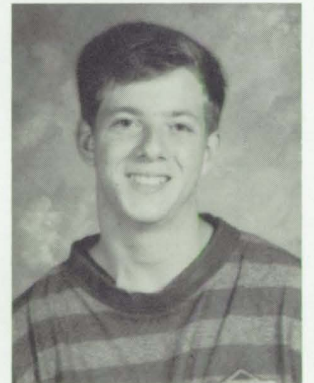
JUNIOR LAW

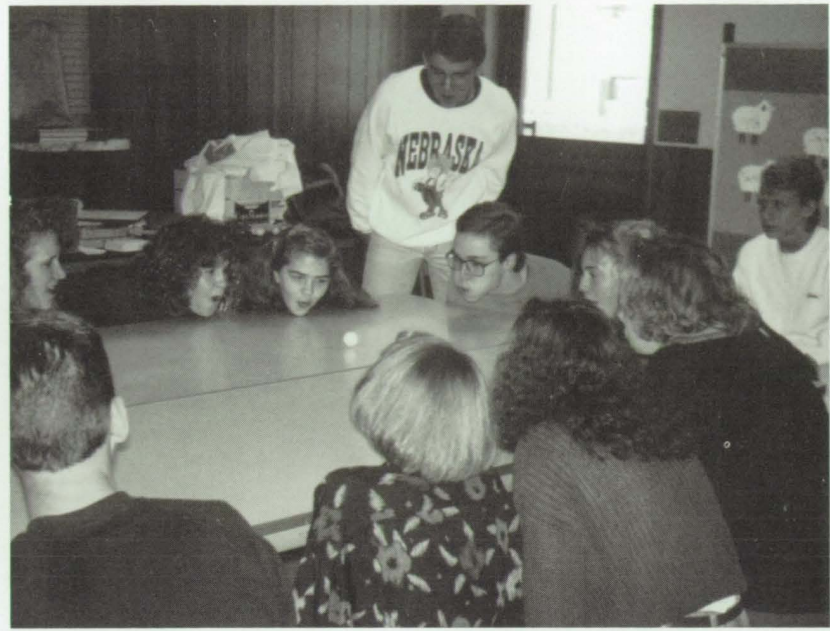

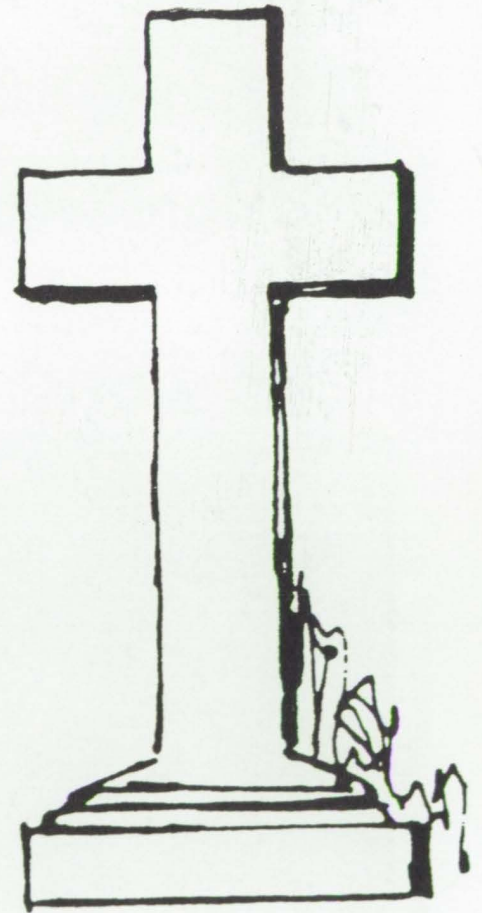

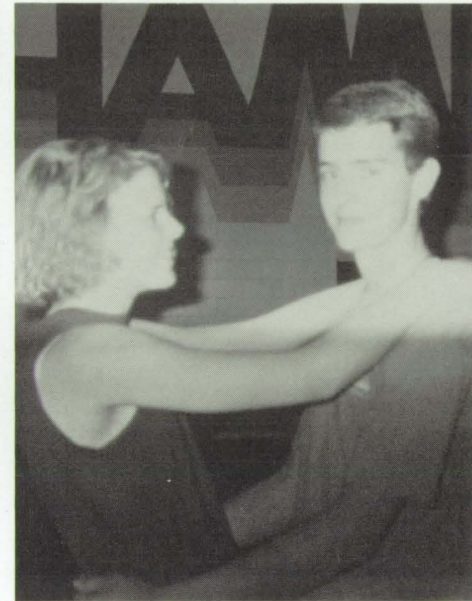

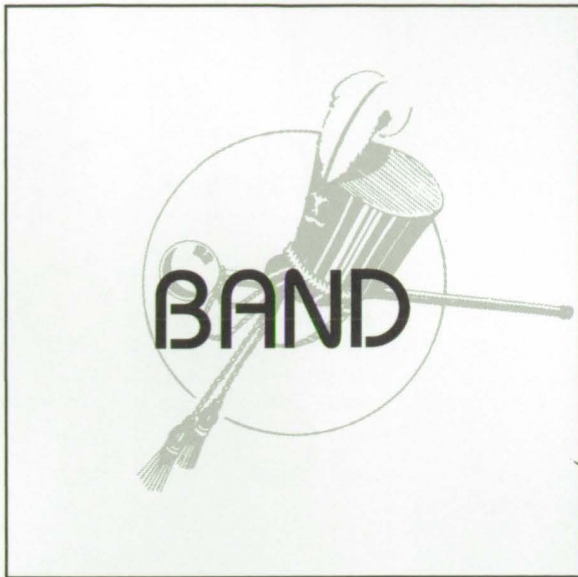

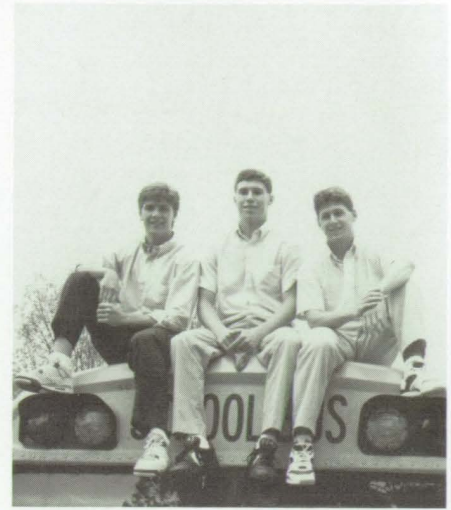

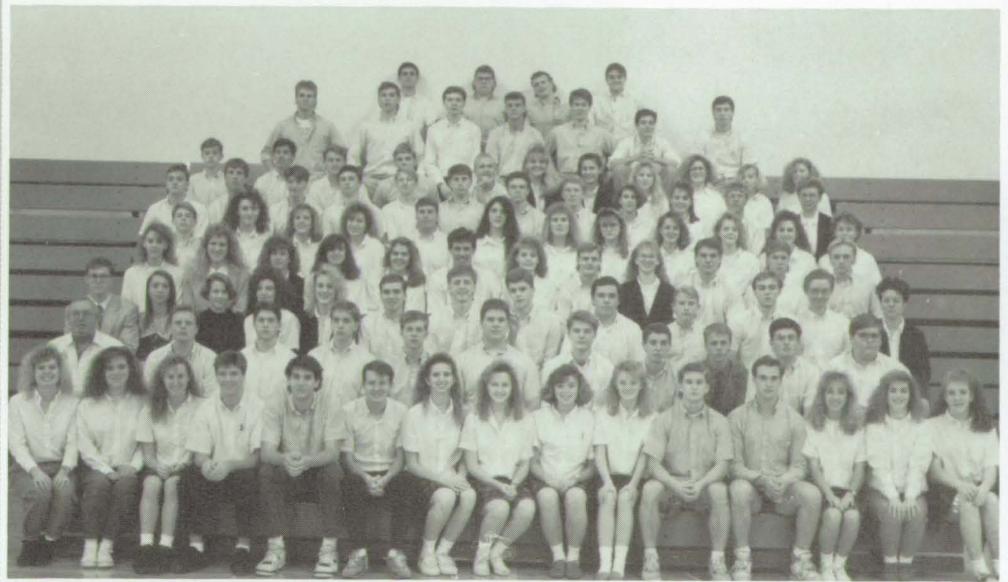

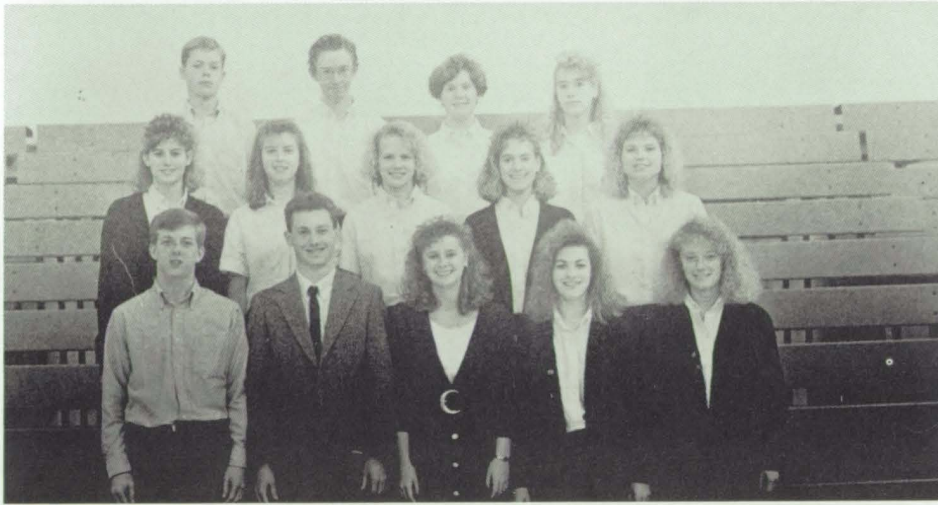

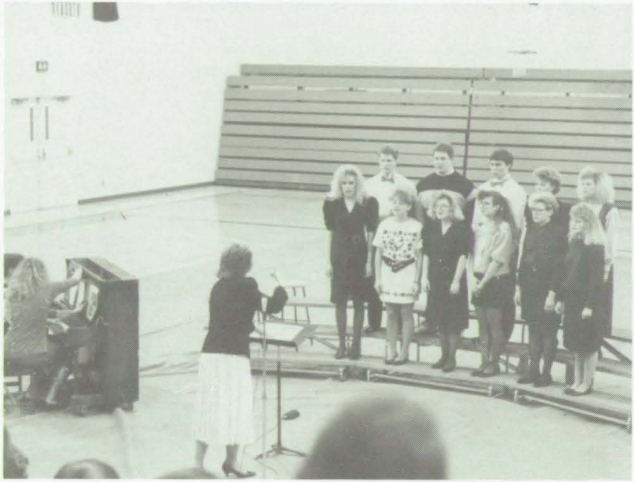


MUSIC

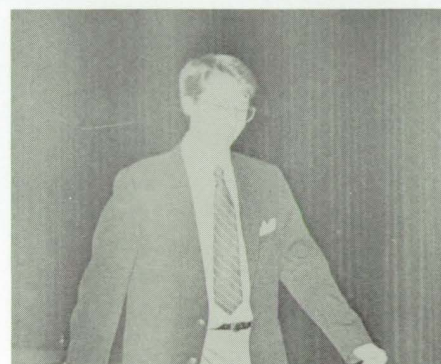

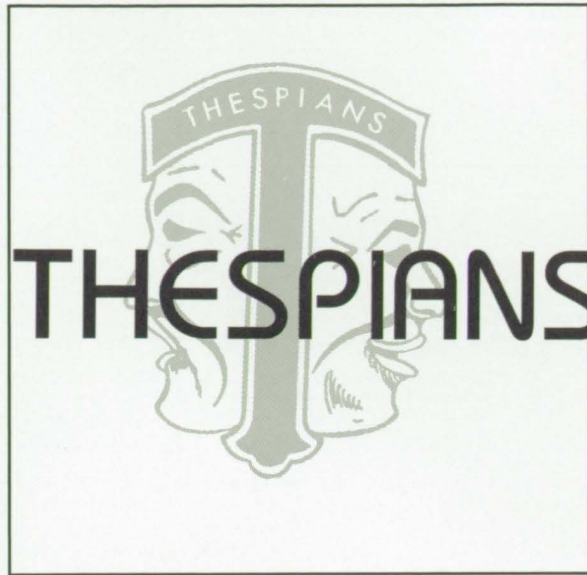



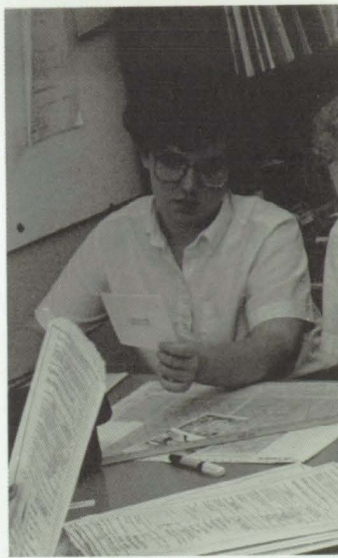

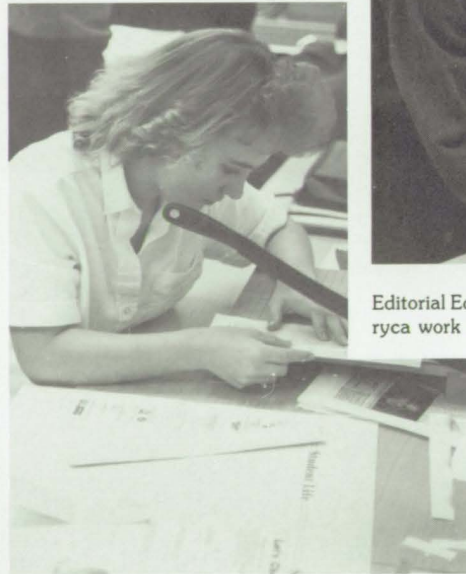
