announcing that he is HIV positive. He now goes OUT to speak to groups about AIDS awareness.




Magic Johnson talks to his fans at a New York Knicks game after releasing to the press that he is HIV positive.








## Seniors JUST CANT ST



## Underclassmen













Mrs. Kiser gives the opportunity for talented students to take independent art classes. This gives students a chance to express their feelings


in many different ways. "I wanted a chance to express myself in whatever way I deemed necessary without the directions of some one else," said senior Shawn Diederich.










"I try to make the class challenging," AP English instructor Kathy Ewers stated. "The classes are more than just a preparation for college, they can actually help the students complete a college course."





# Sports
































