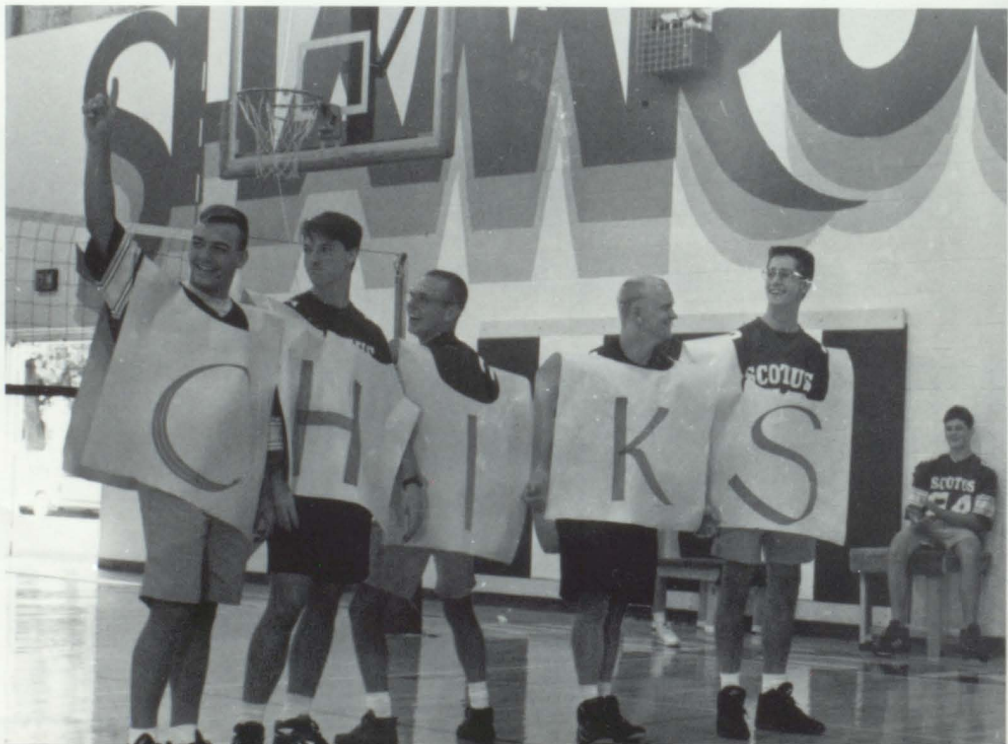

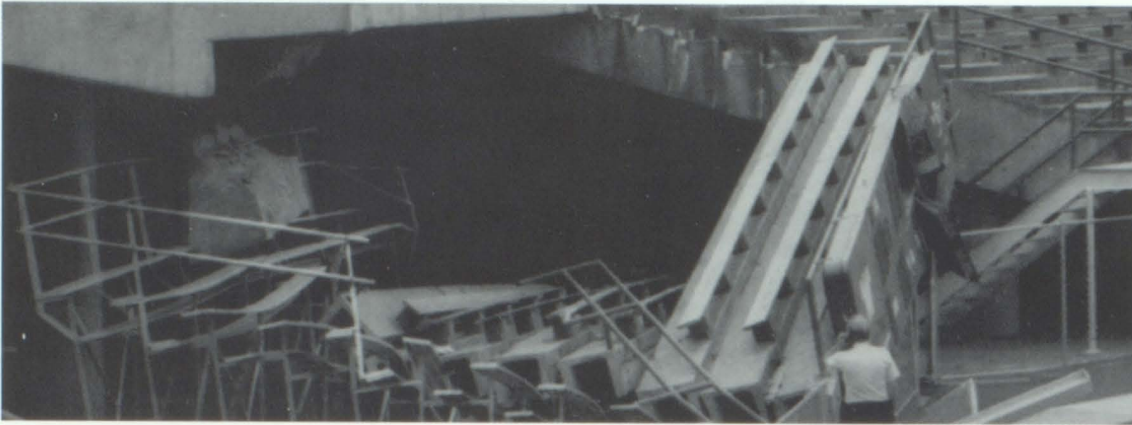

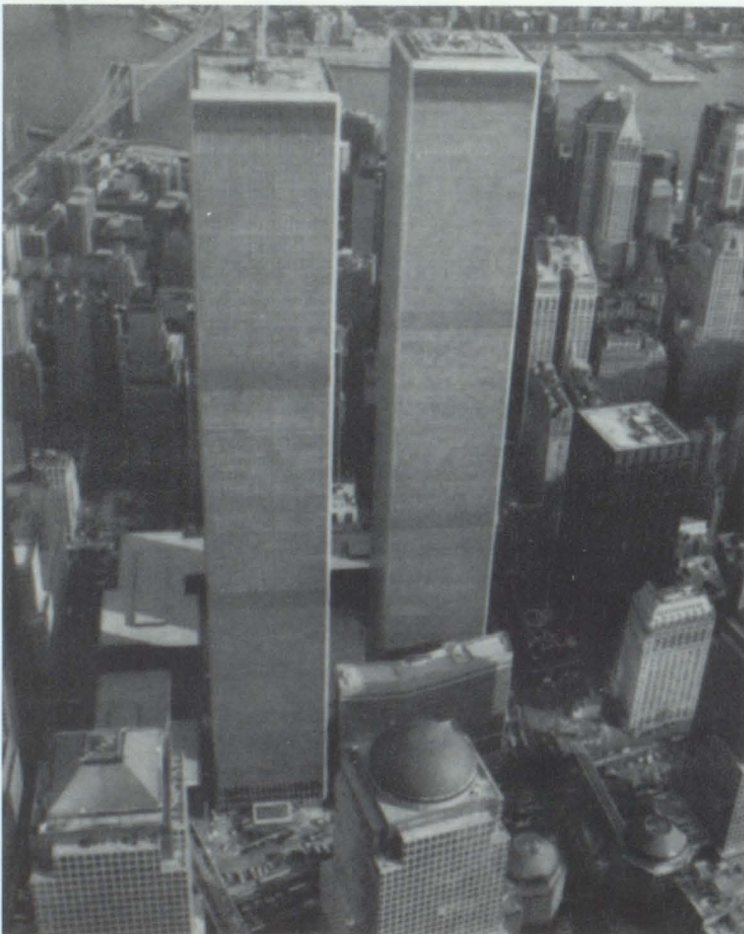

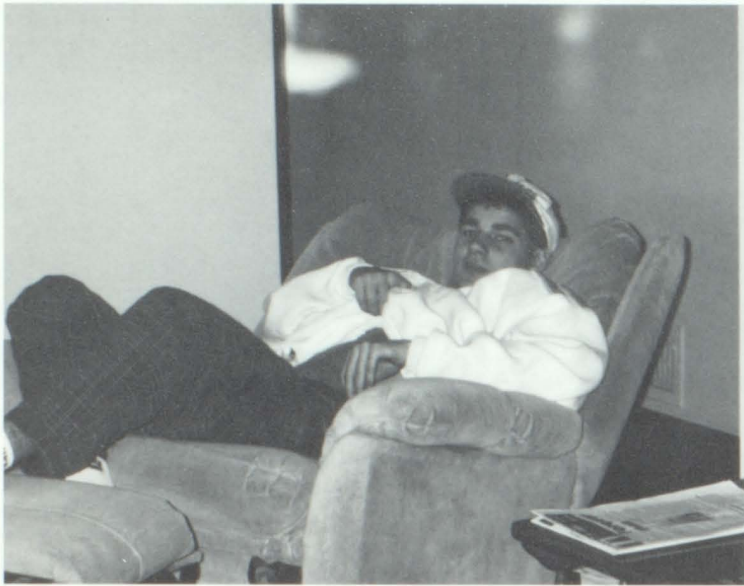

"Perot may not have had any political experience, but he makes money and that's what we need." — Nate Ternus

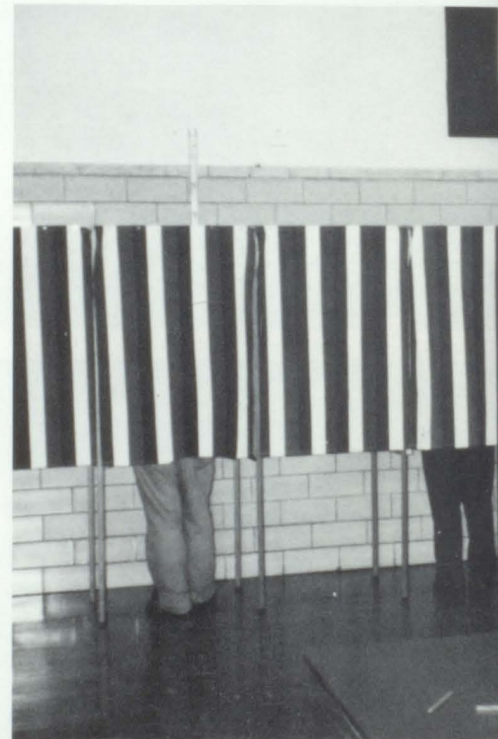

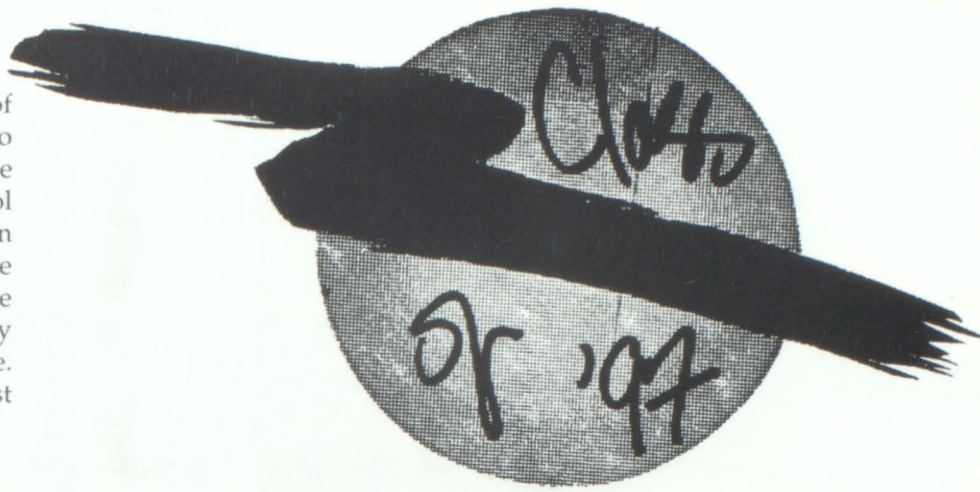
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Eighth graders have some fun in the sun, while others work on improving their English.

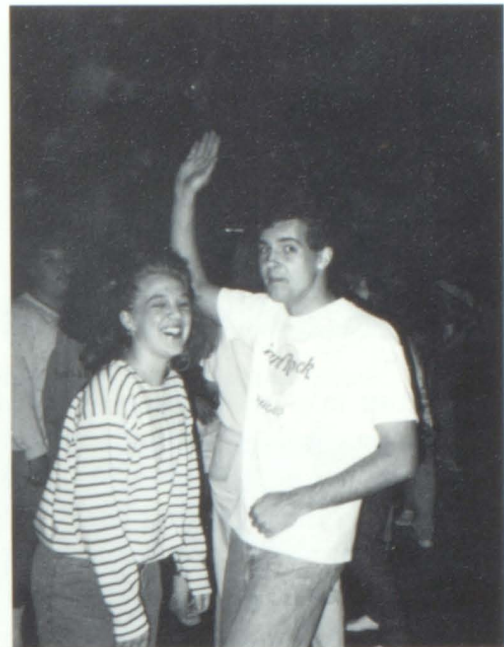
They also give students a chance to get together and relax. "It's something to do on the weekends besides just driving around," says Stacy Swierczek.

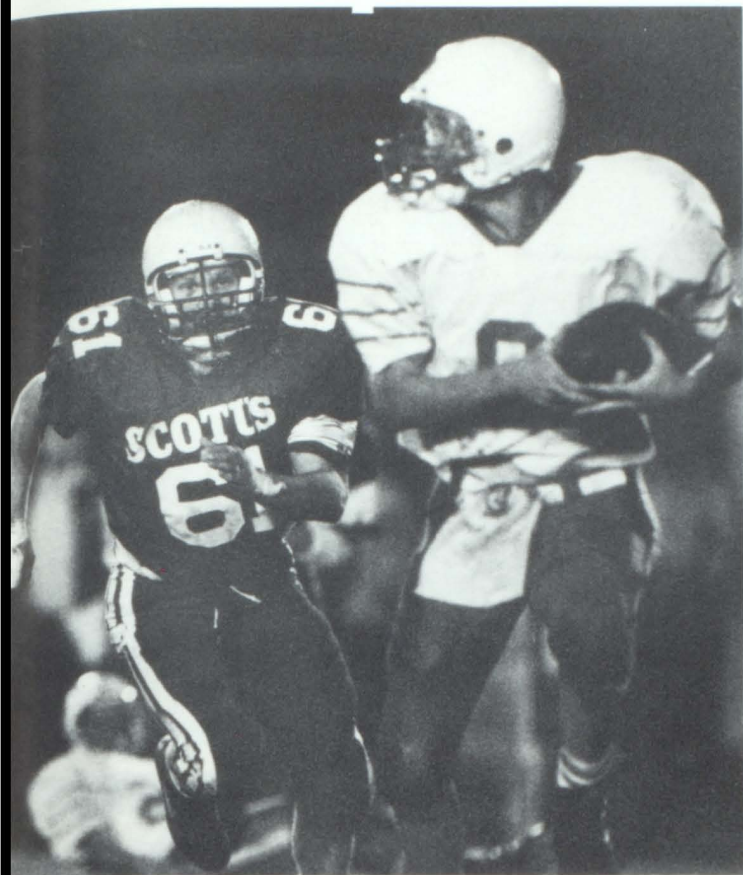

Success for the team began with practice and lots of it, which included summer weight lifting, volleyball camps, YMC leagues and plenty of after school practices.

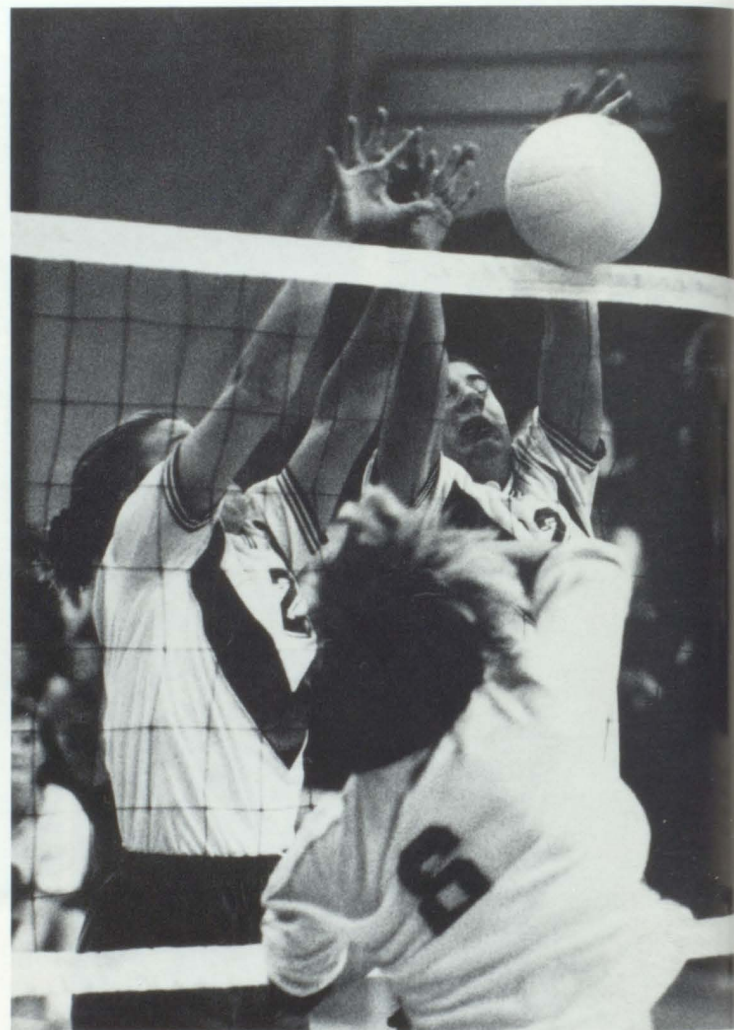

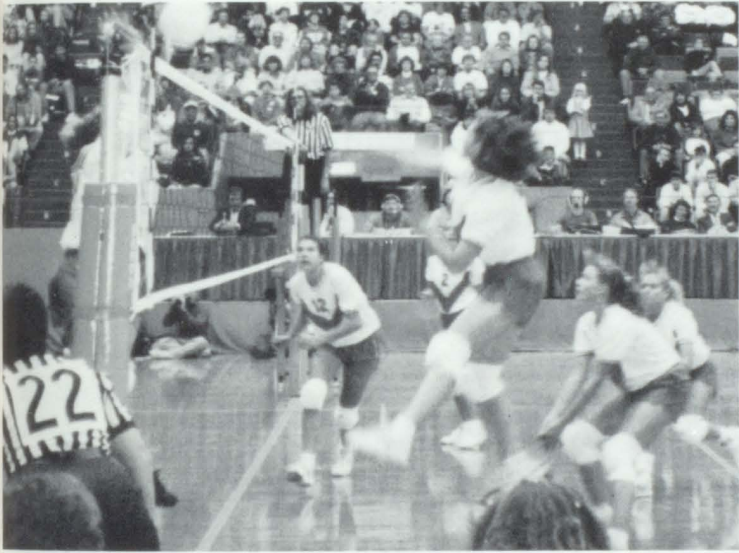

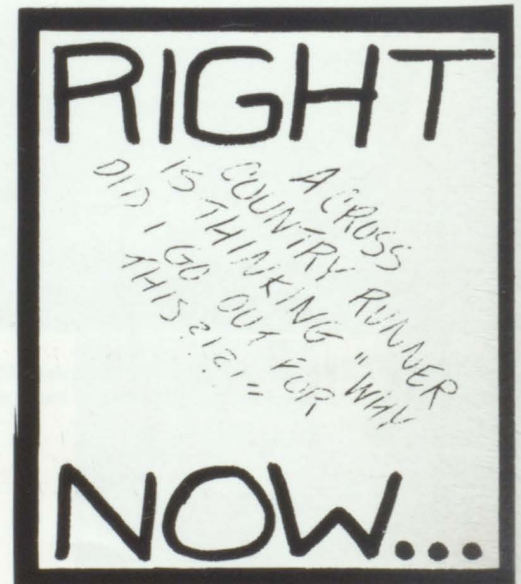

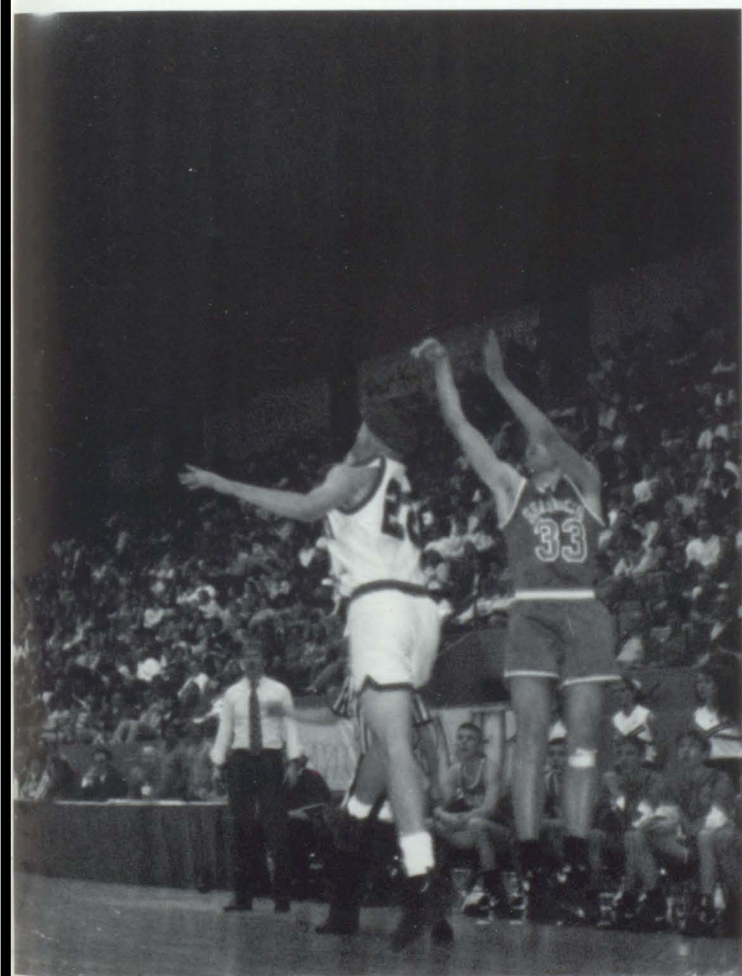

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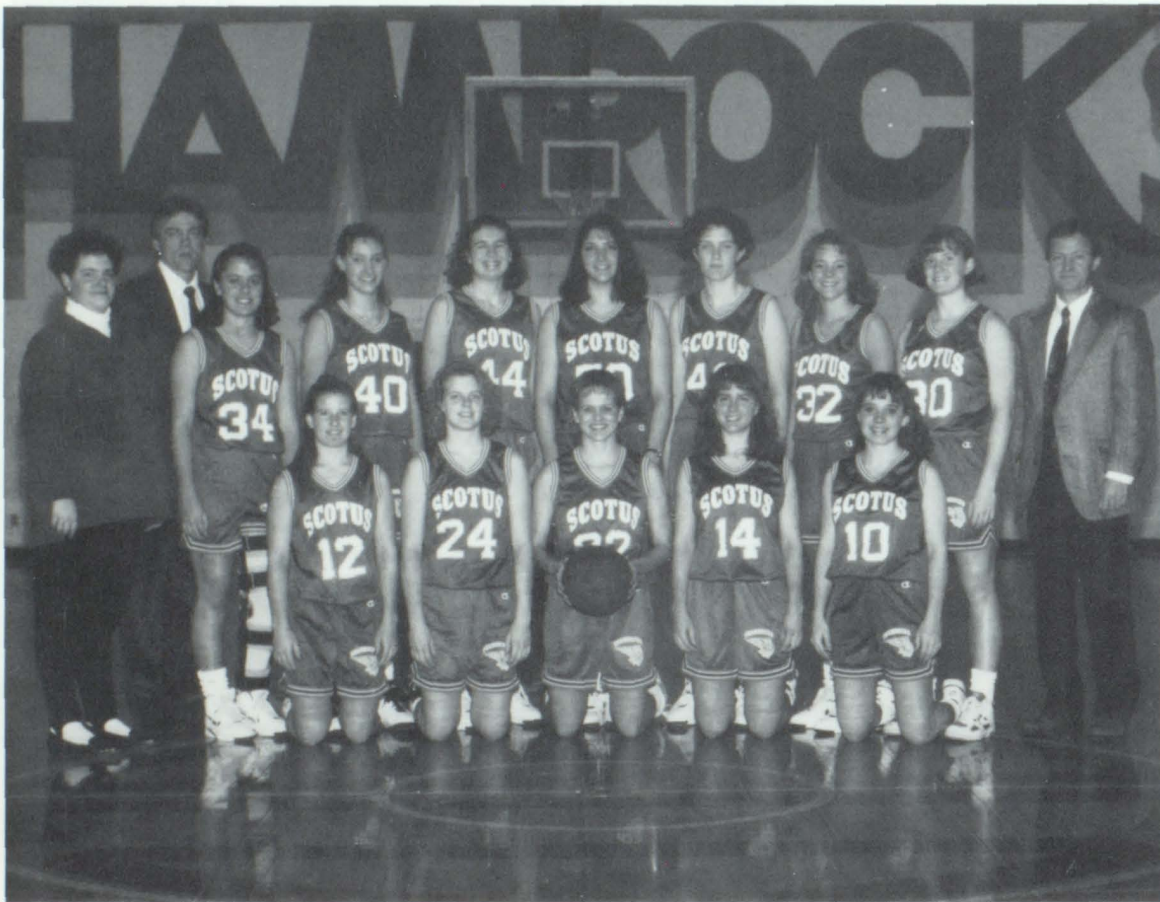


GIRLS BASKET BALL

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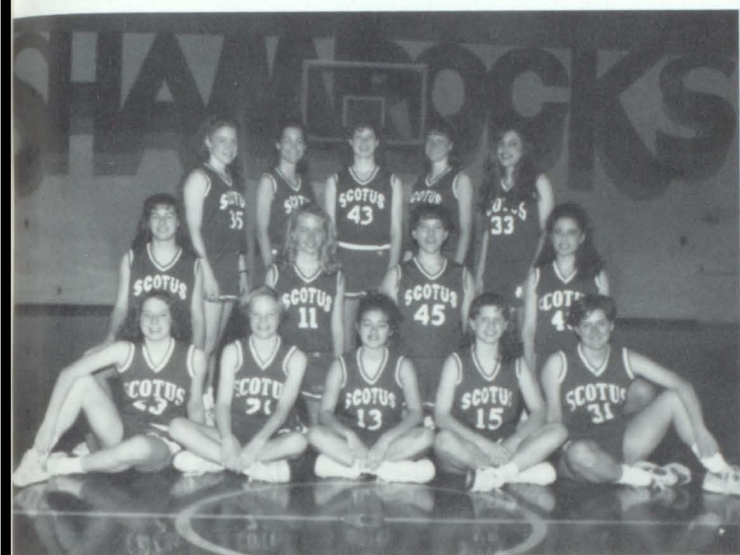

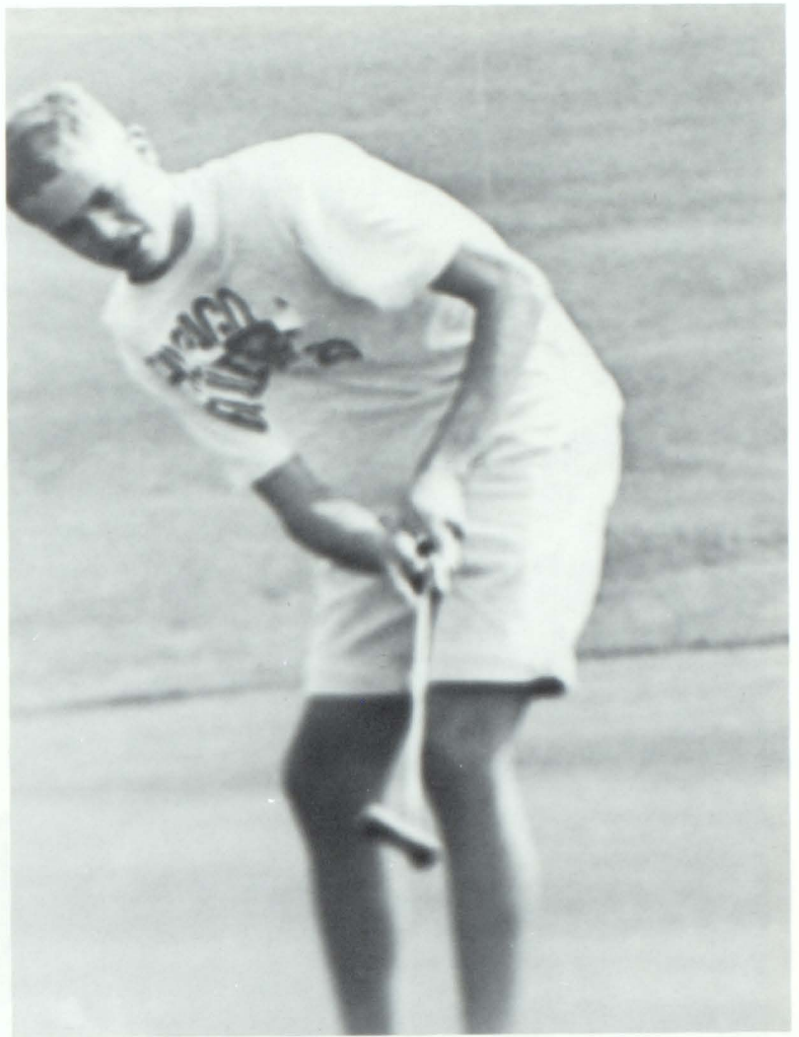

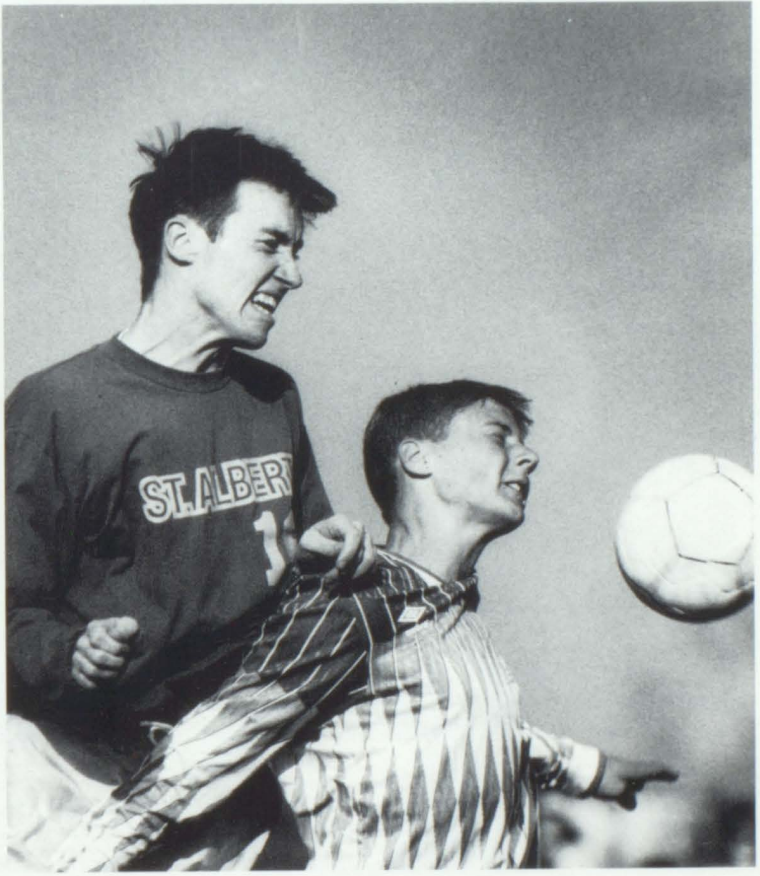

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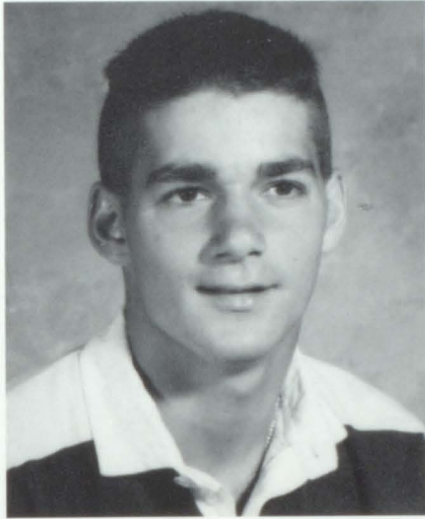

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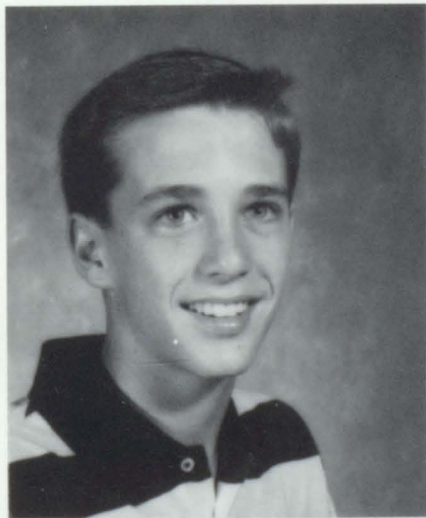

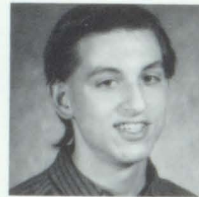

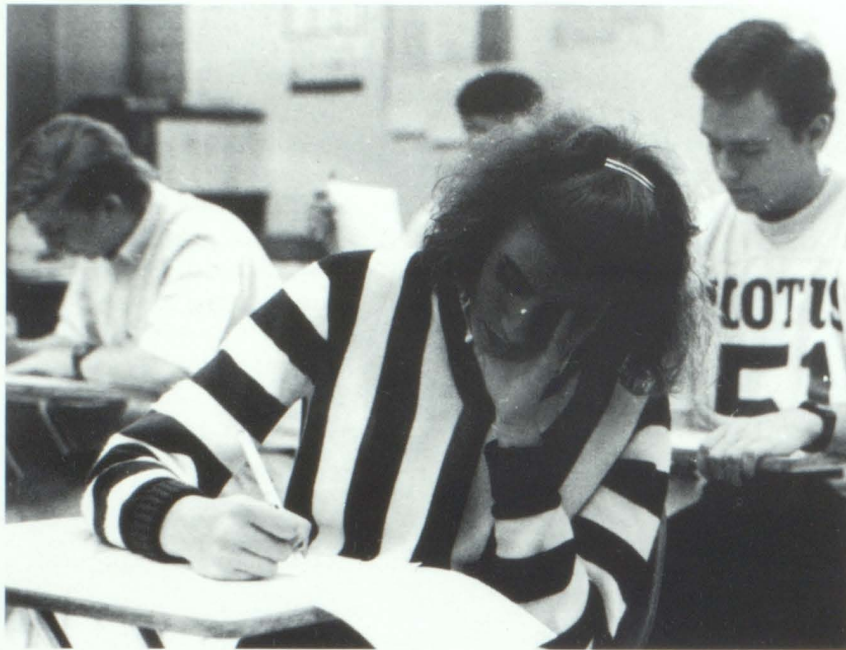

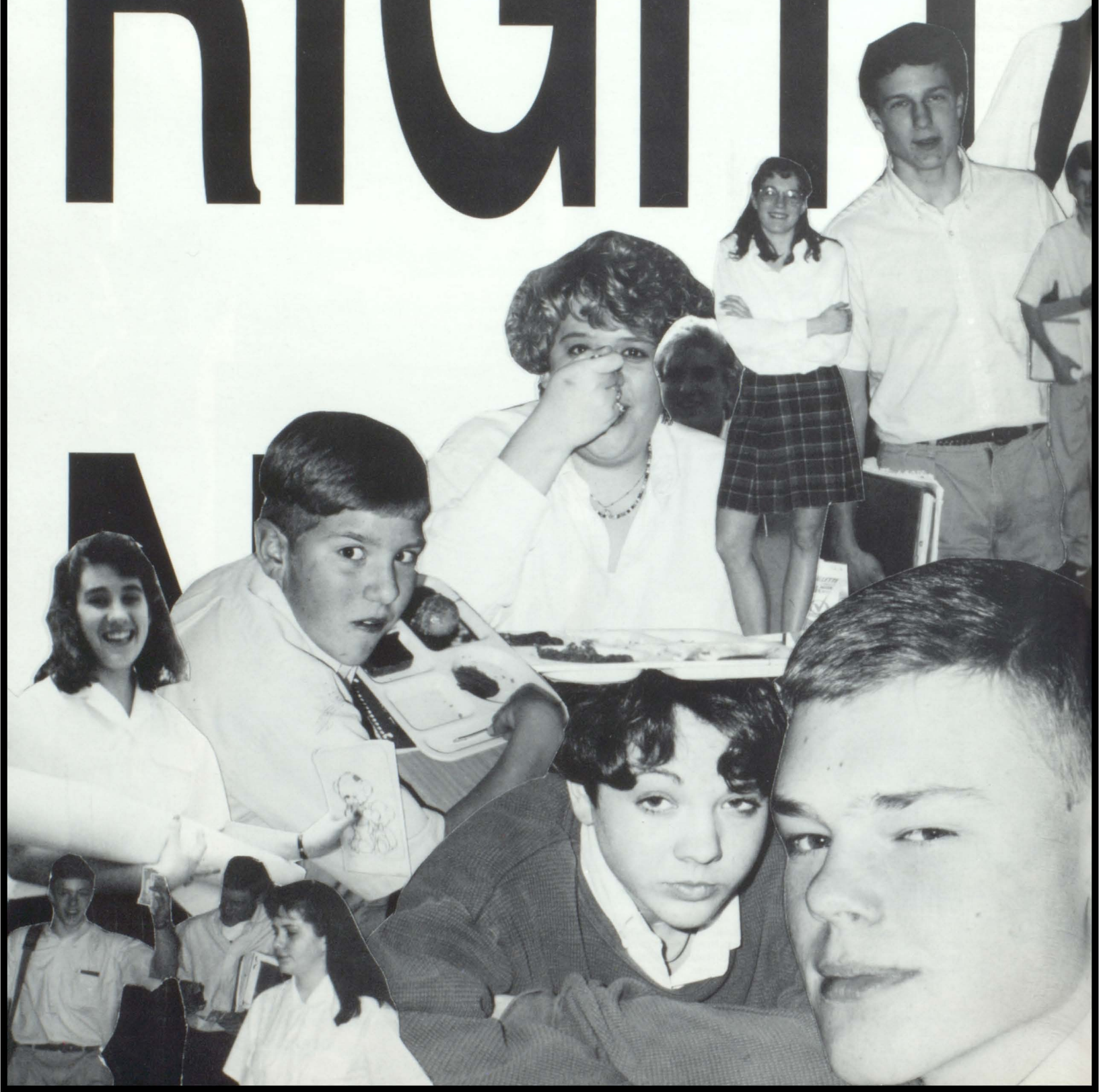

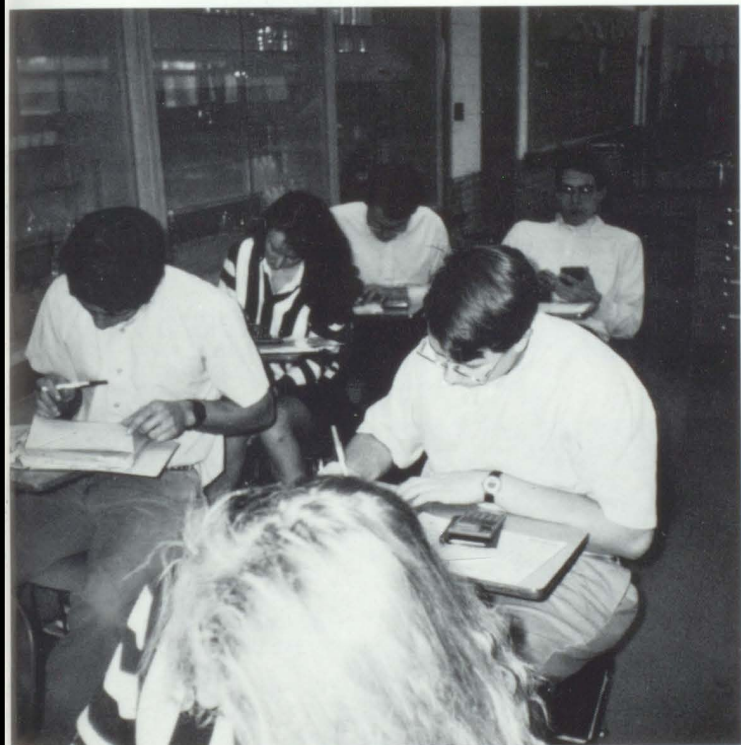

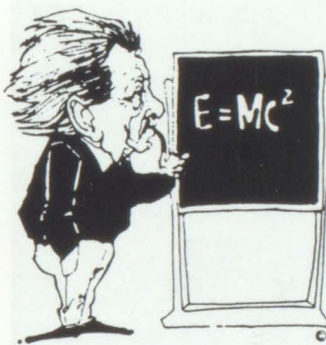

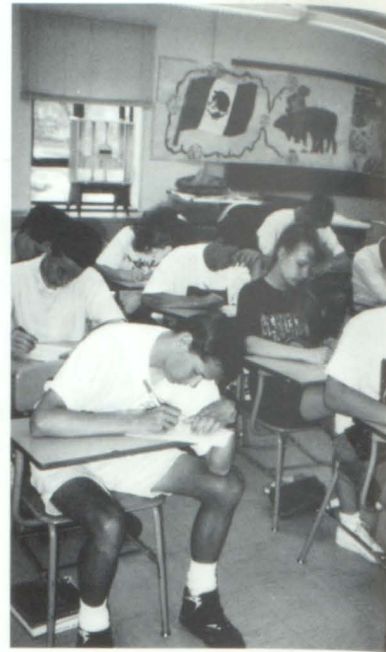
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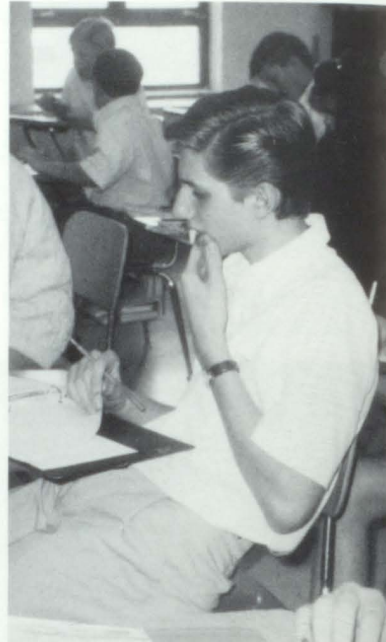
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LANGUAGES

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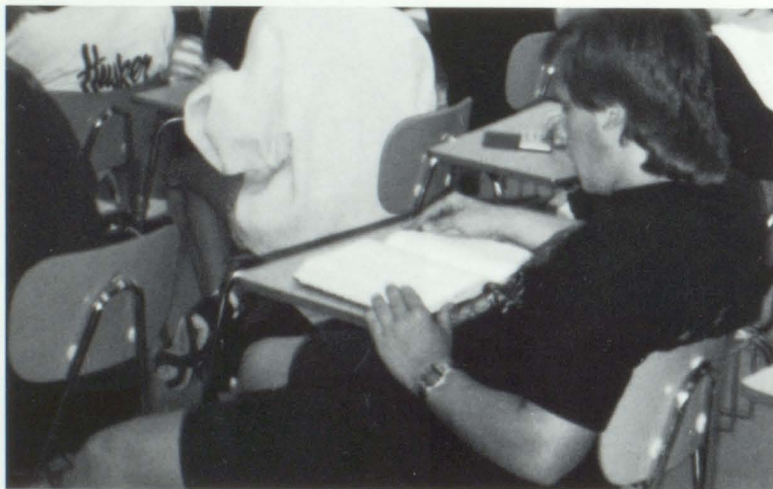

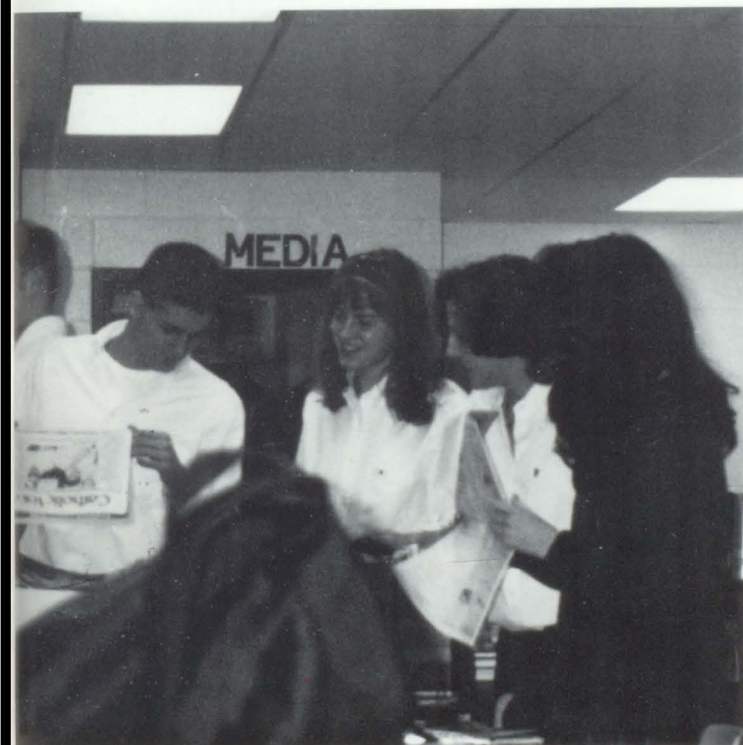

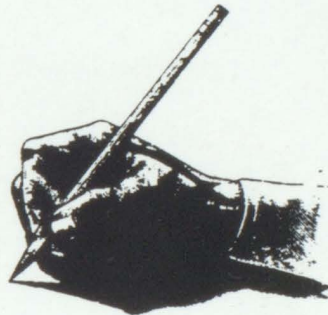

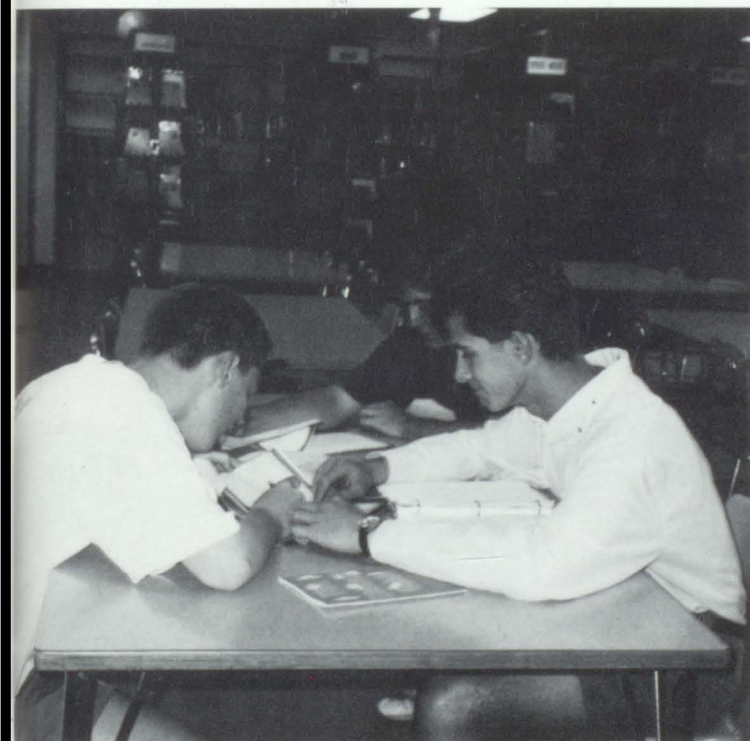

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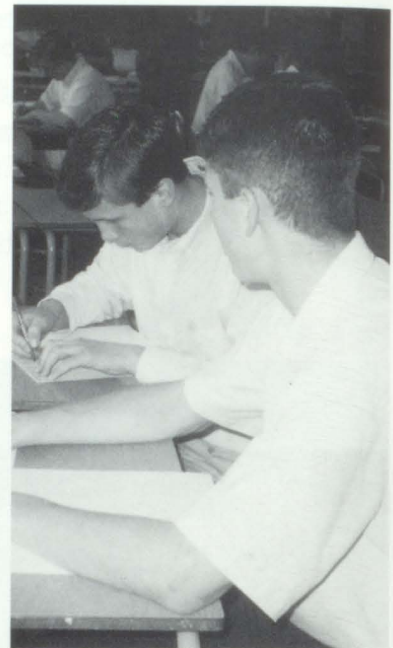

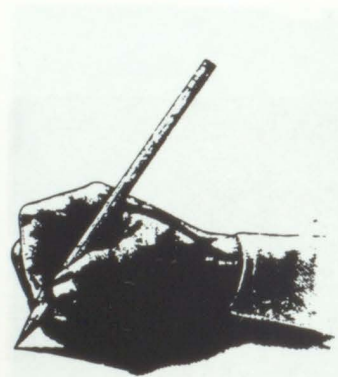

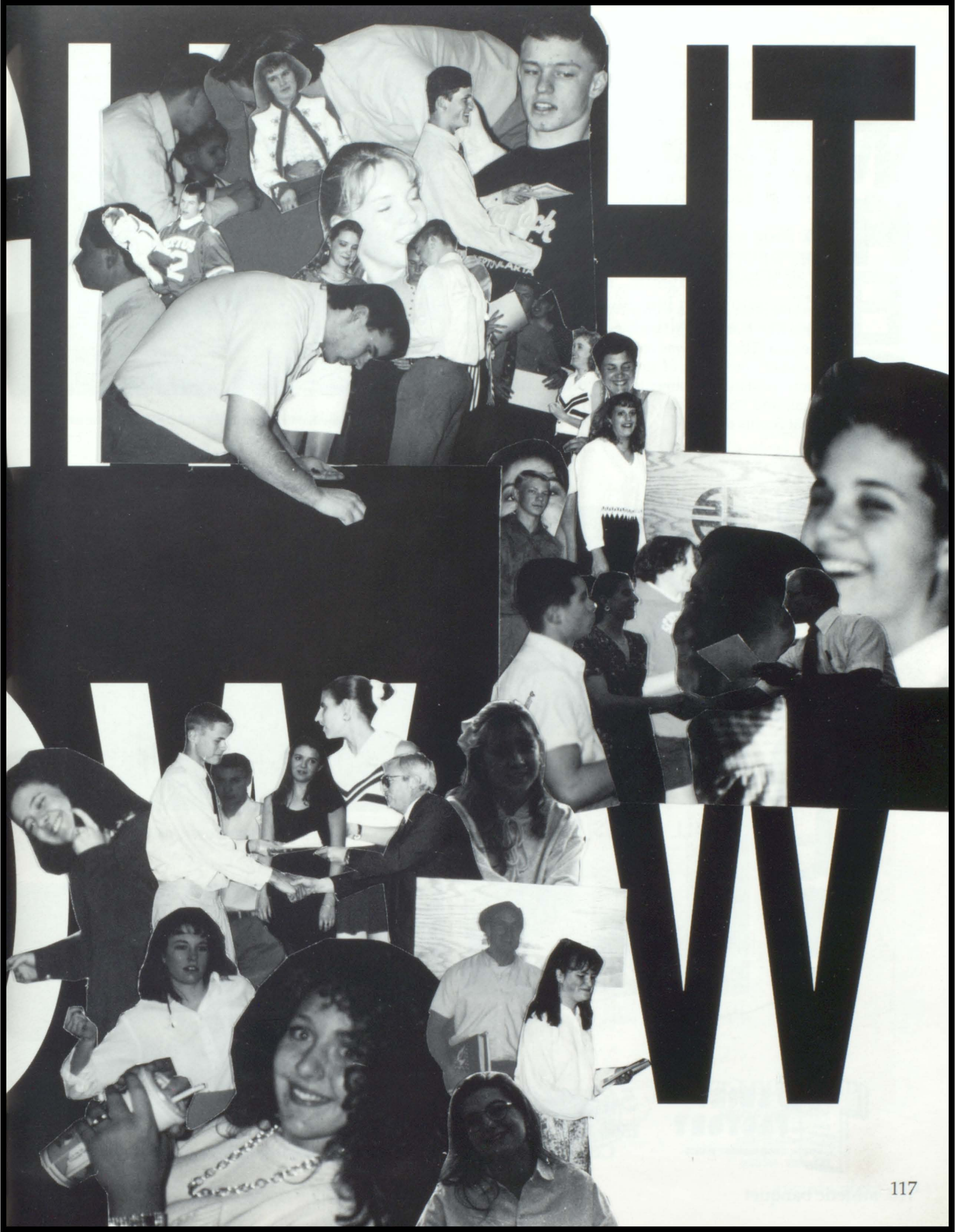


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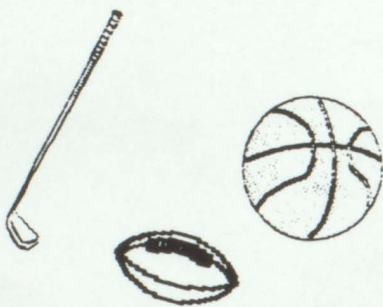
ATHLETIC BANQUET

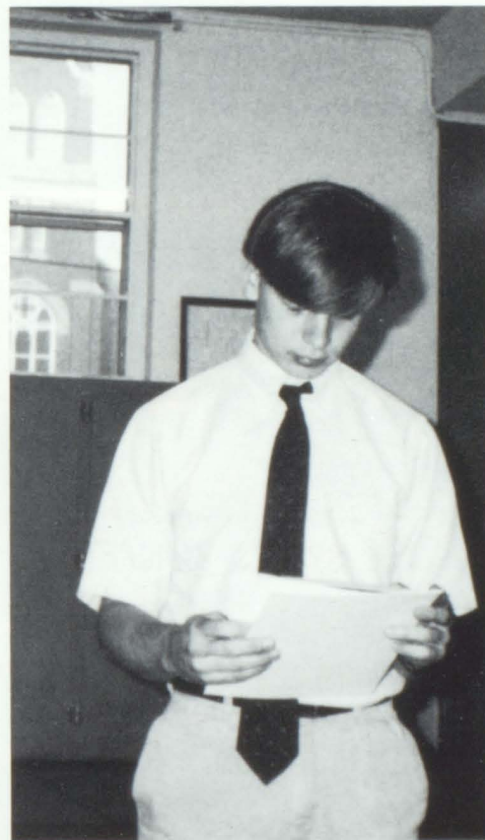

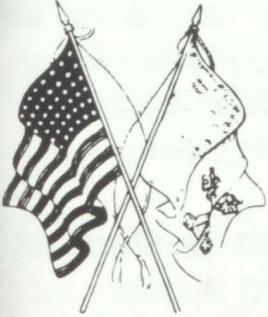

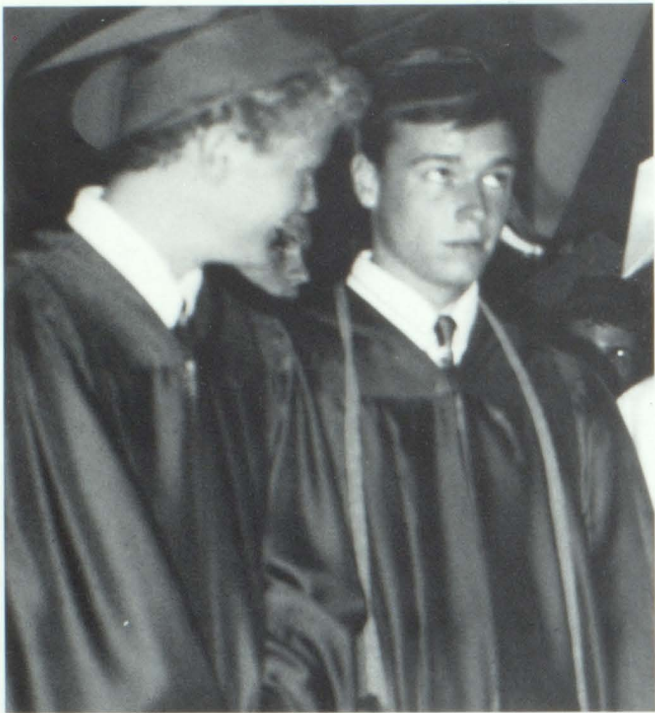

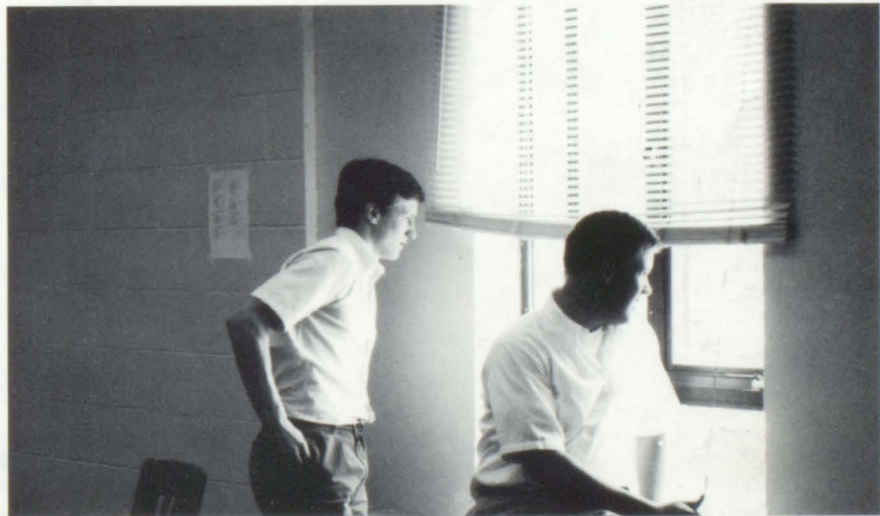
