




News

After spending five years of commentating, Magic Johnson decided to return to the LA Lakers, coming back strong.














The English department flourished with new books and expanding horizons to literature.


The Senior Englis classes were busy wi writing on Indian culture "1984", "Of Mice and Mer etc..

In Geography, many students learned about the different climates of the U.S. including Savanna, humid continental, steppe and Mediterranean.


In civics, the students learned about the balance of powers in government and how the branches of government operate.


The Science department was exploding with new discoveries and experiments everyday.

The Physiology class learned about the human body very detailed and graphically. Their field trips included visits to the mortuary and hospital.


Finally, the biology class studied hard and tested their nature skills by doing the annual insect project. They also took a trip to Pawnee Park to identify different leaves.

Cimpl took 4th place at state, the highest individual placing ever. The varsity placed 3rd, also a highest placing and only the second time making it to state as a team.


It will be interesting to watch what happens next year with only one returning varsity player. If they are as determined and reach their high set goals they could have another great season.






















The 3200m relay team ended up taking 3rd at state and Renee Boman and Julie Trouba both brought home silver medals in the individual events.






Senior Retreat
