complete success. Upon arrival at Timberlake Ranch in Central City, we were let loose to explore the paths, where our "15 minute nature walk" somehow turned into an hour....


an hour and a half for Paul, Chris E., Amy, and members of the senior class loaded onto the Jason. The day's activities included a prayer of













There is a possibility that new sports could also be added and talks are underway to determine if their will be more opportunities for Scotus athletes to compete with Columbus High.










