



Robert Hanssen was discovered and arrested in February 2001 for spying on America and reporting back to the Russians.



Senior Retreat.













Up to Speed...






Changing gears...






Religion






Fine Arts





















Being the last season for head coach Chris McGill, it seemed only fitting to bring home the state championship and the boys did just that. It was an awesome way for Mr. McGill to go out.





The Flag Corps team self-choreographed every routine and performed during halftimes of both football and basketball games.












