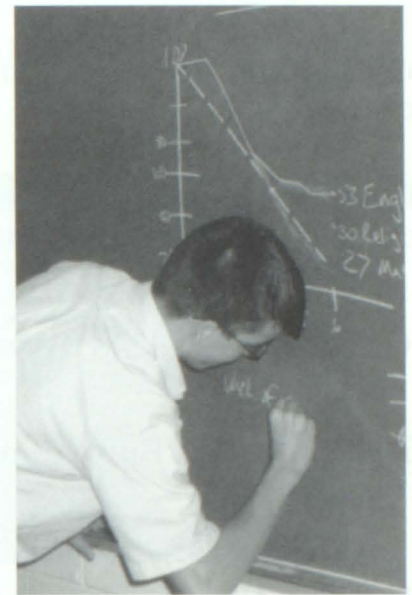
Active class participation

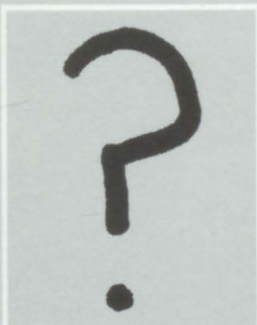

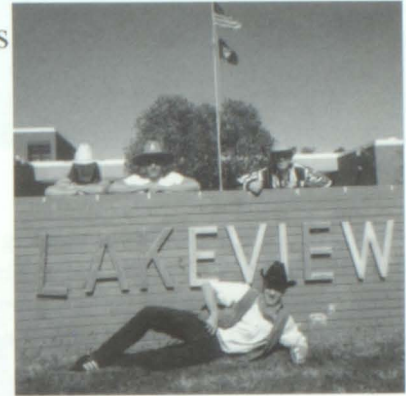

Local Headlines for 2001-2002

Right: 21 - year - old Lucas Helder, the main suspect in the mailbox bombing incidents, was arrested for charges of malicious destruction of property by means of an explosive and using a destructive device in a crime of violence. Behind him were 18 pipe bombs in five states, six of which exploded, wounding four postal workers and two Iowa residents.

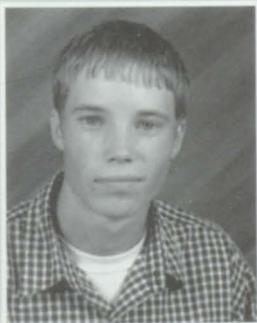

Mathematics and Business

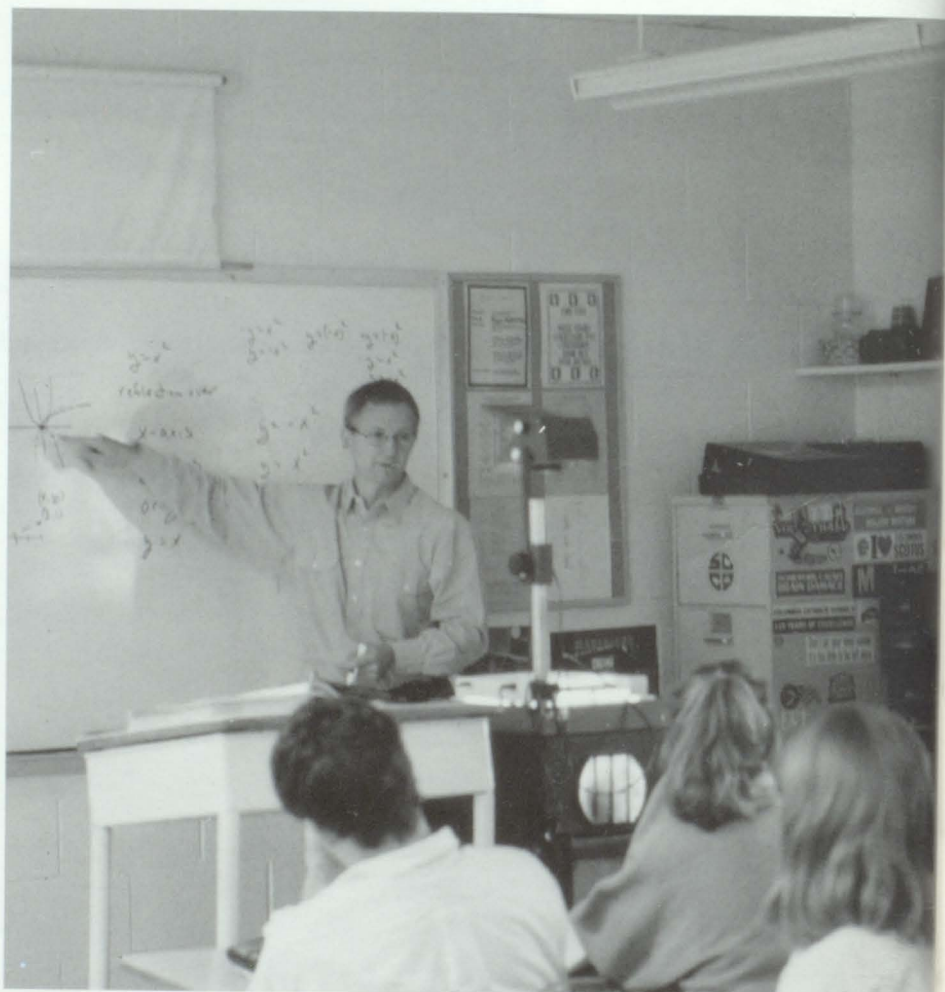
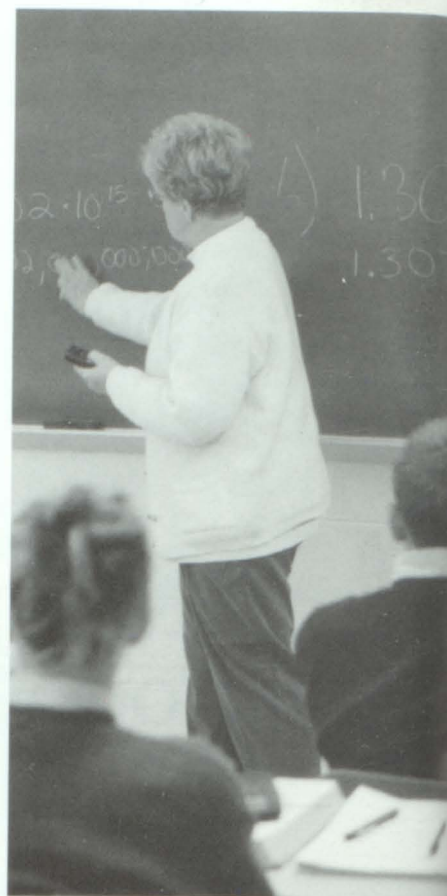
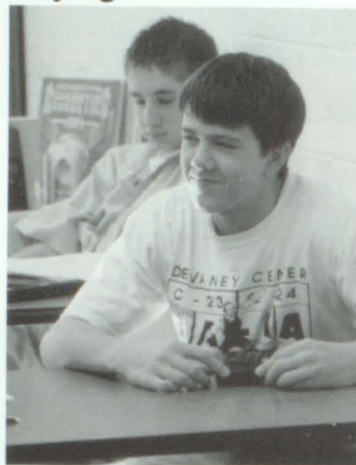

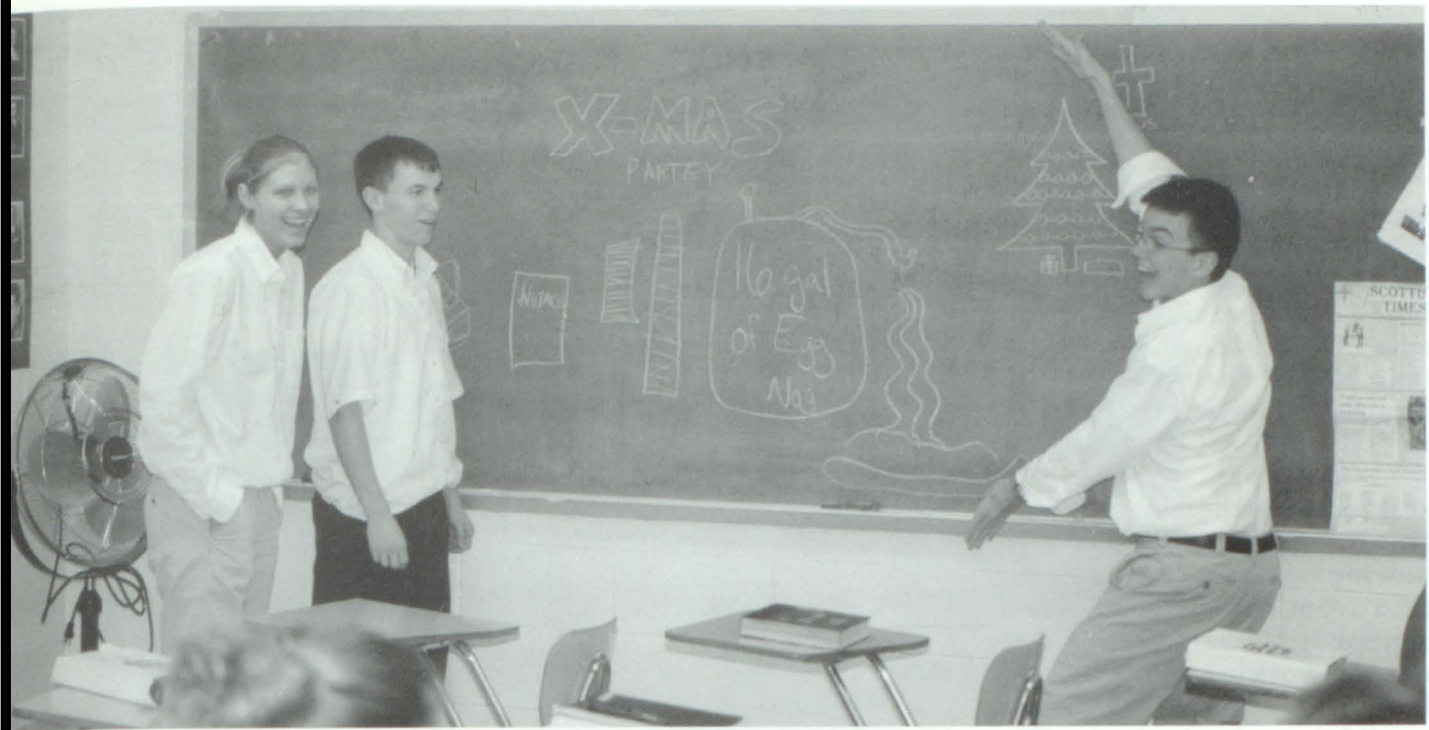

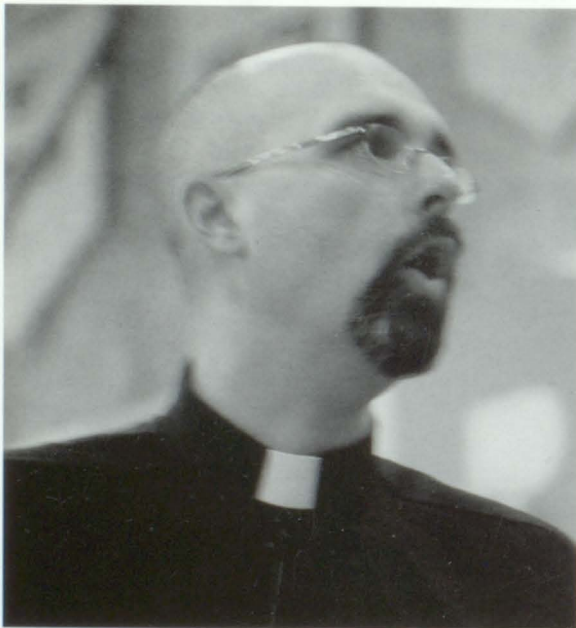
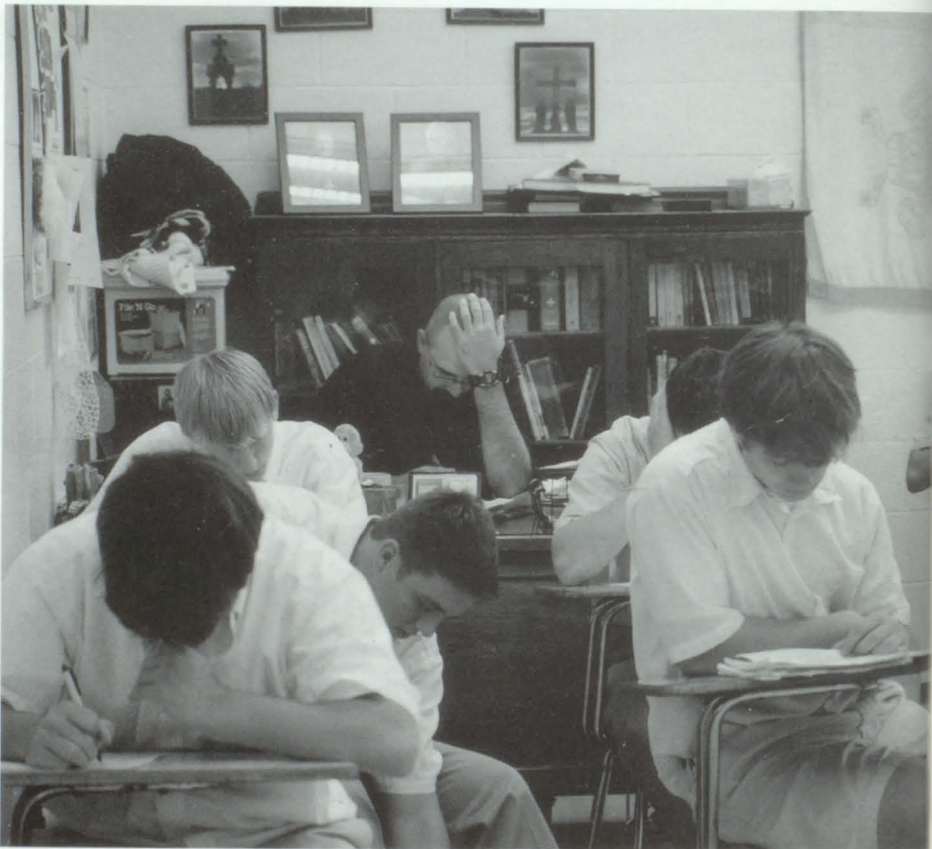
Religion

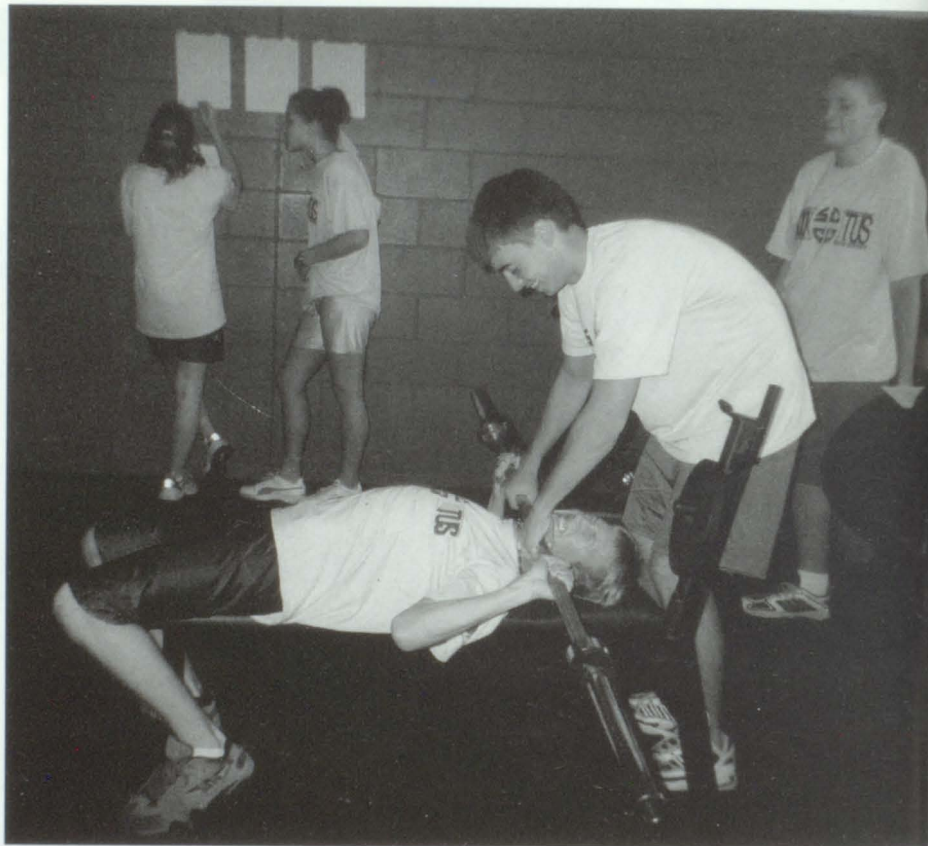

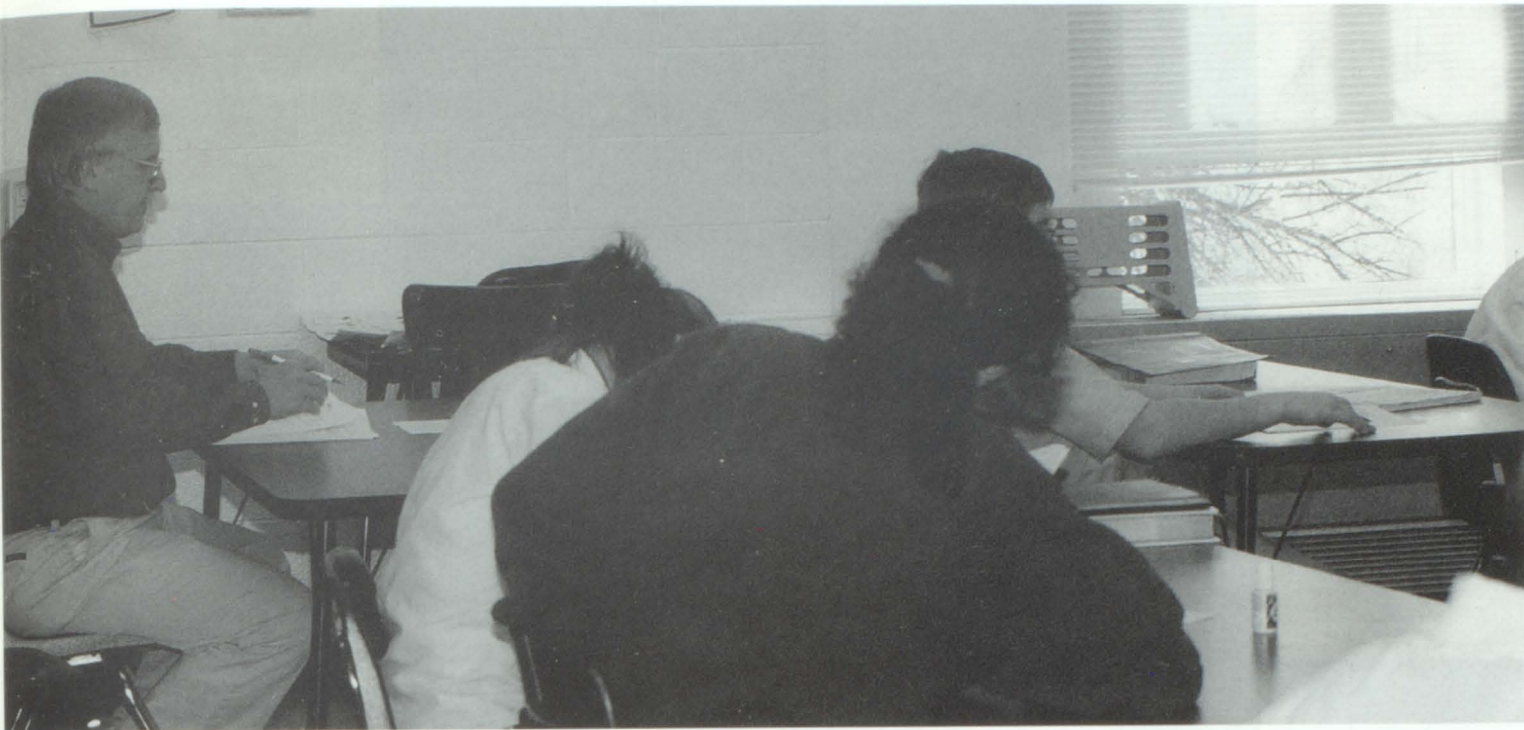

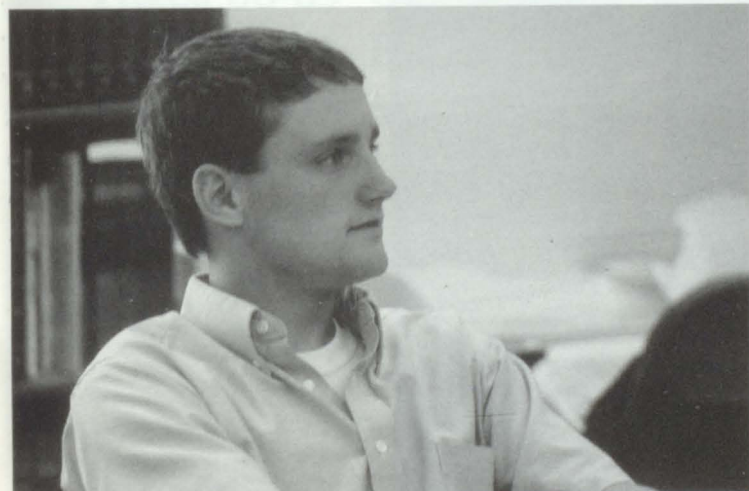

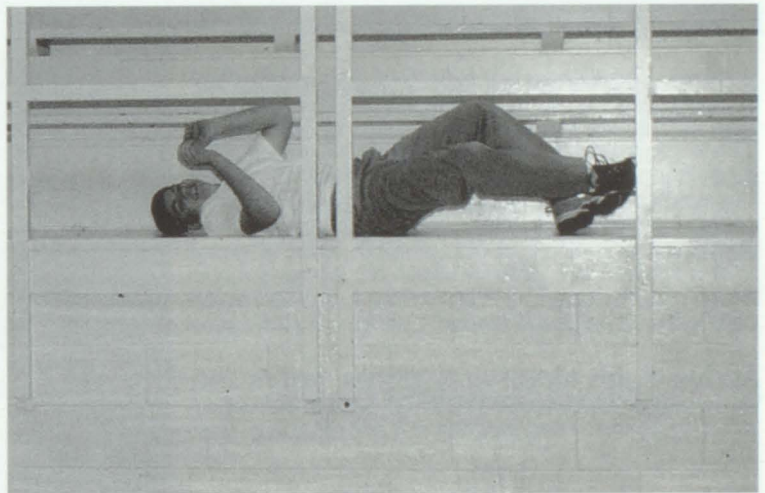
Fellowship of Christian Athletes

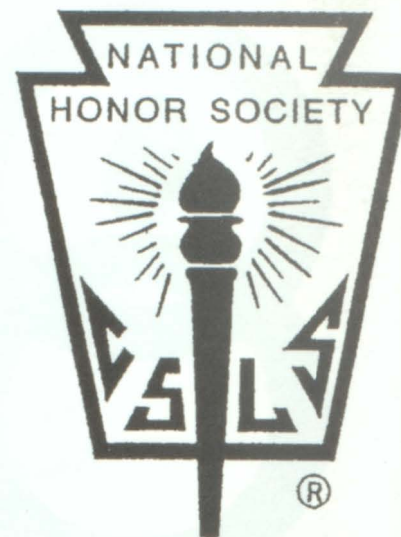

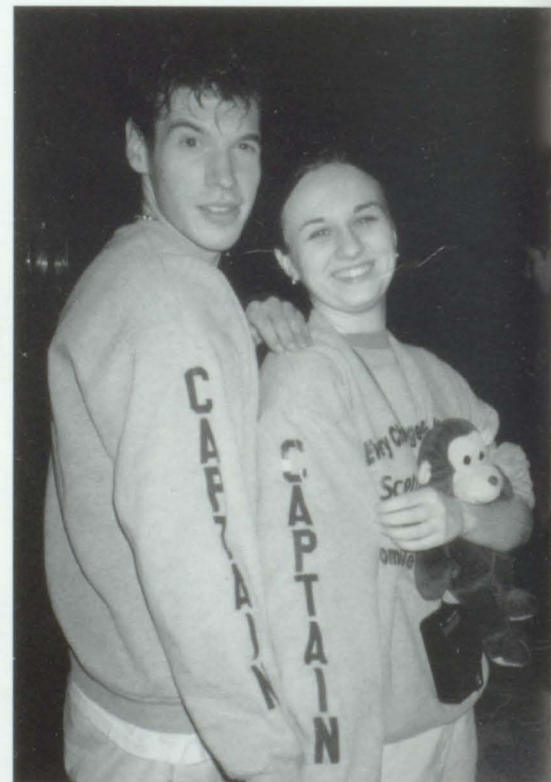

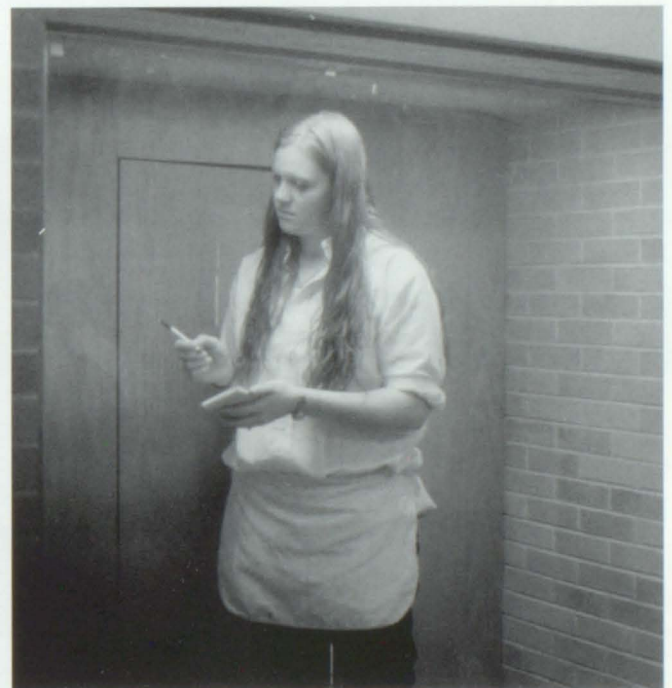

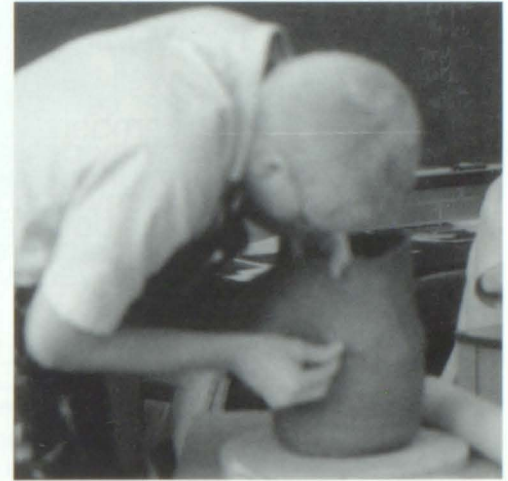
Art Club

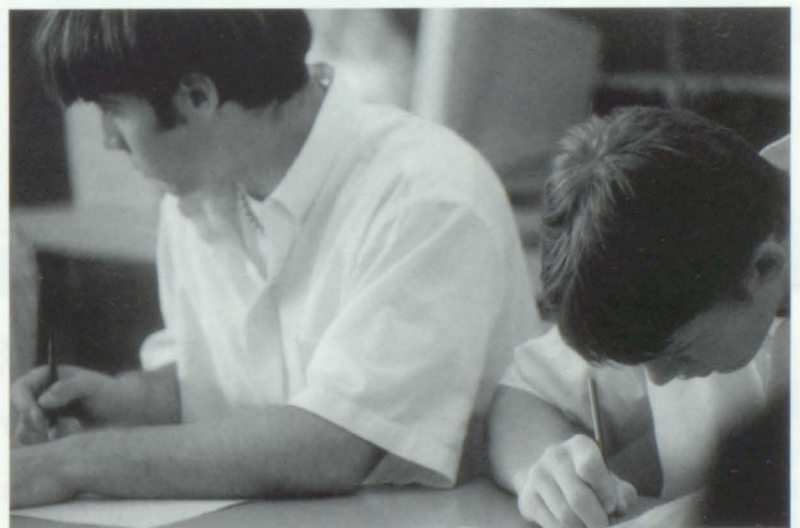

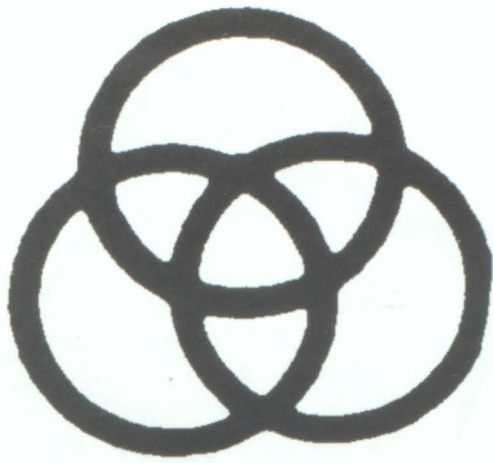

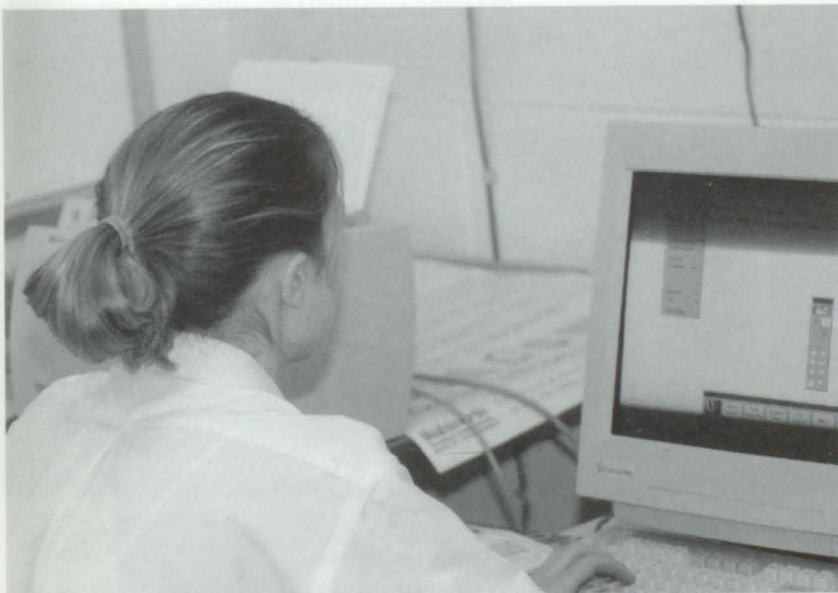
Yearbook

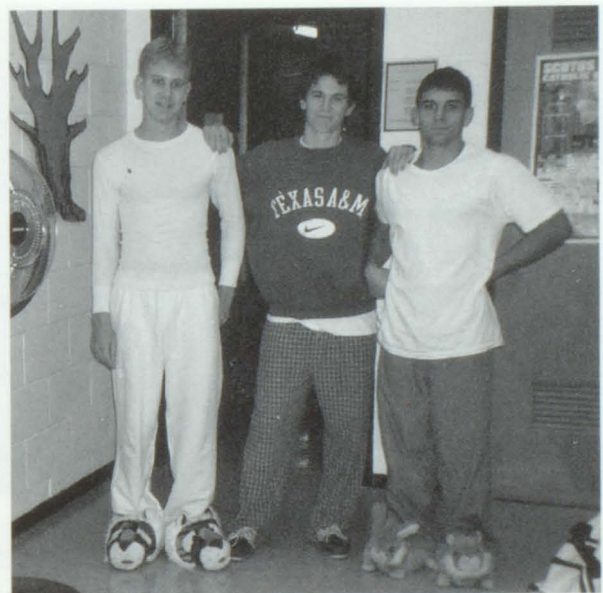

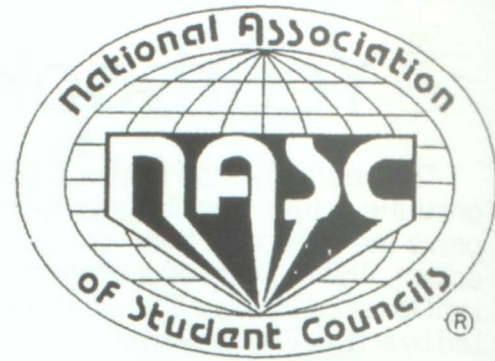

Student Council

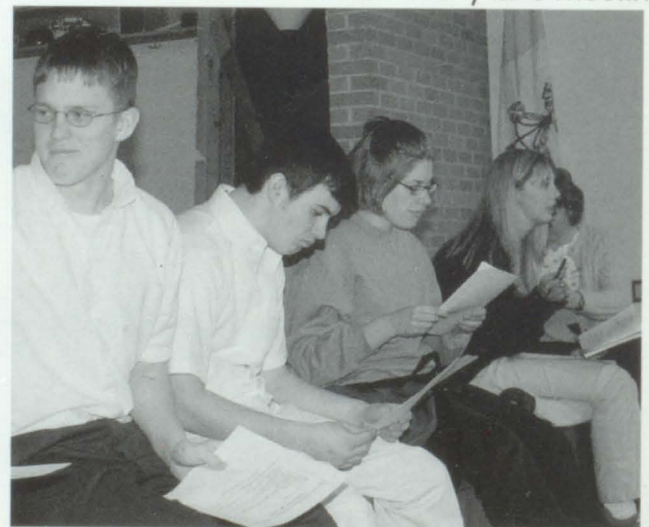

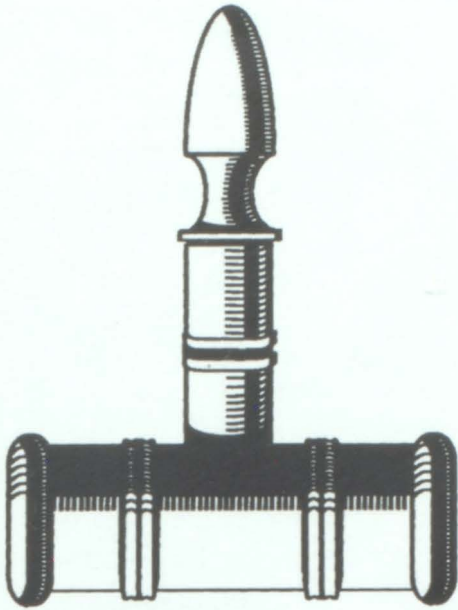

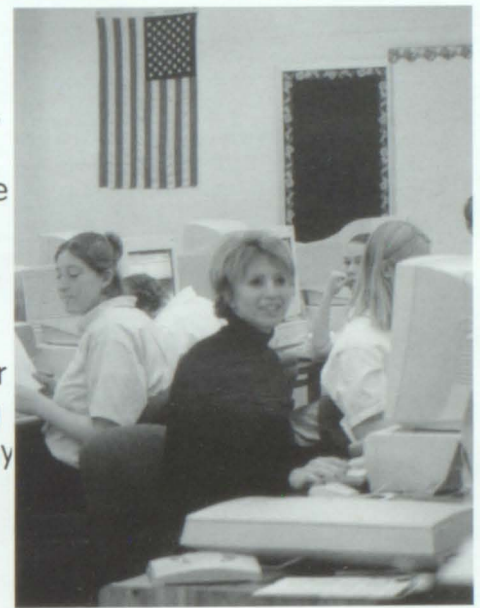
Mock Trial

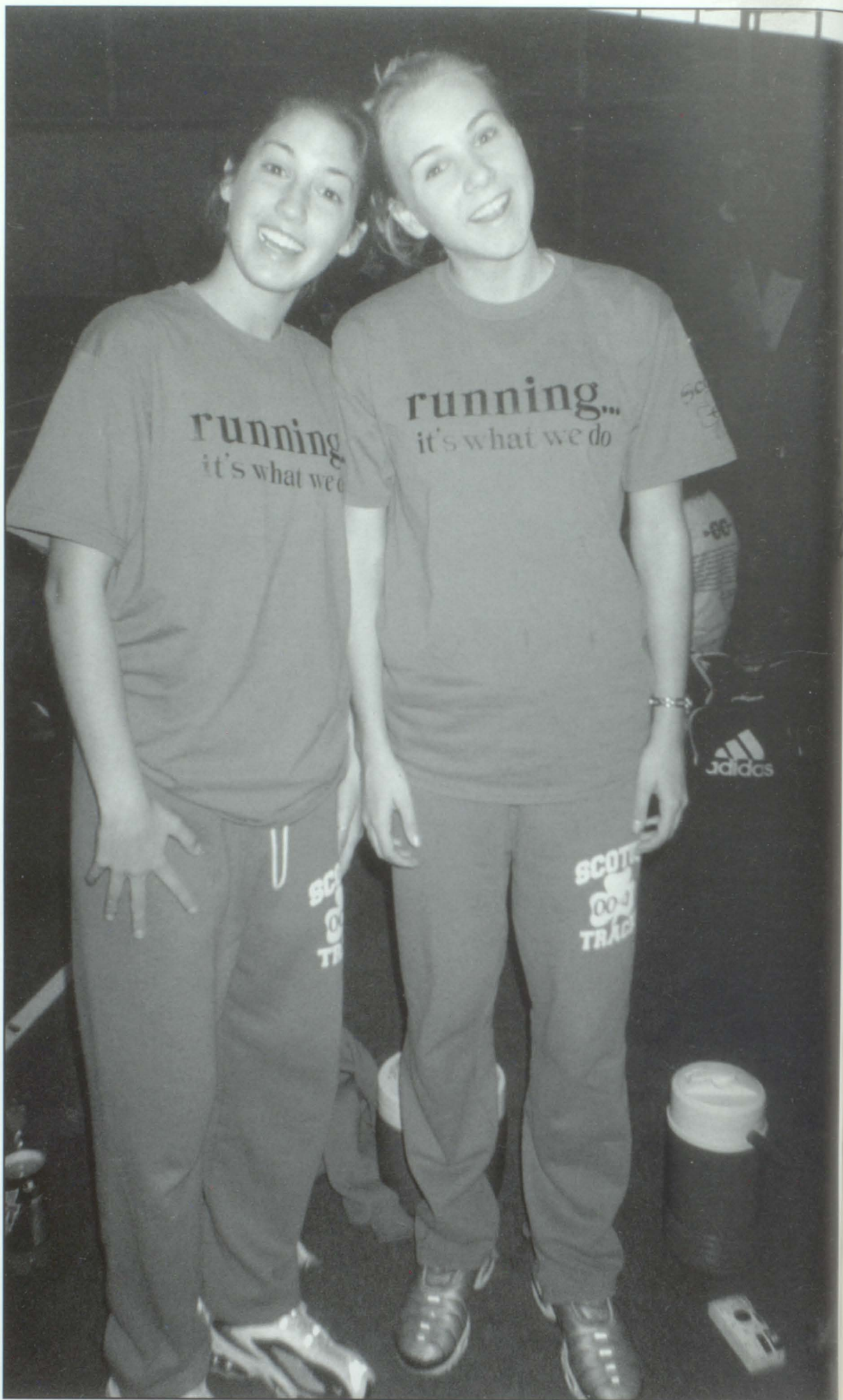

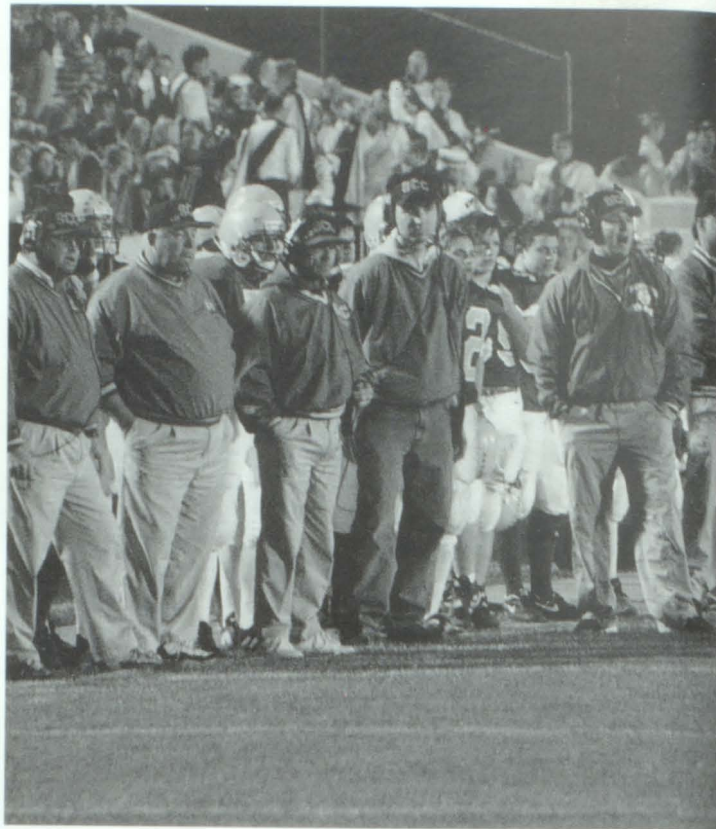

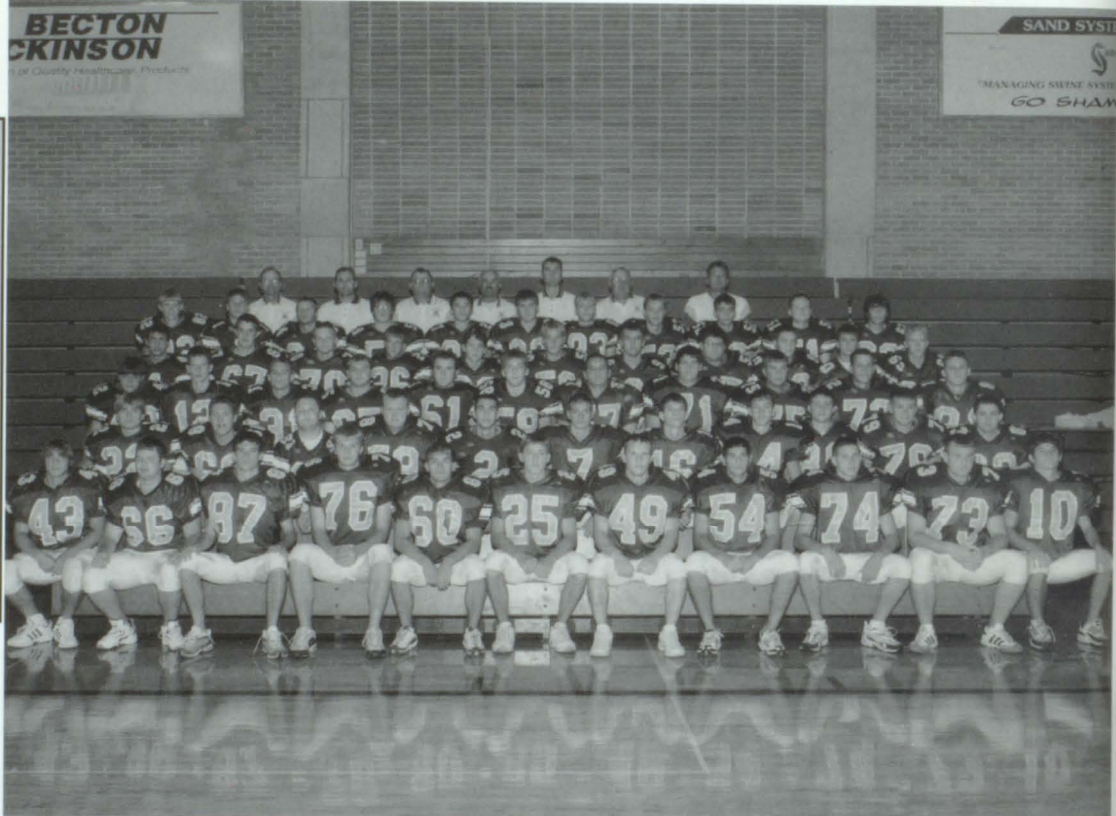


Shamrock Football

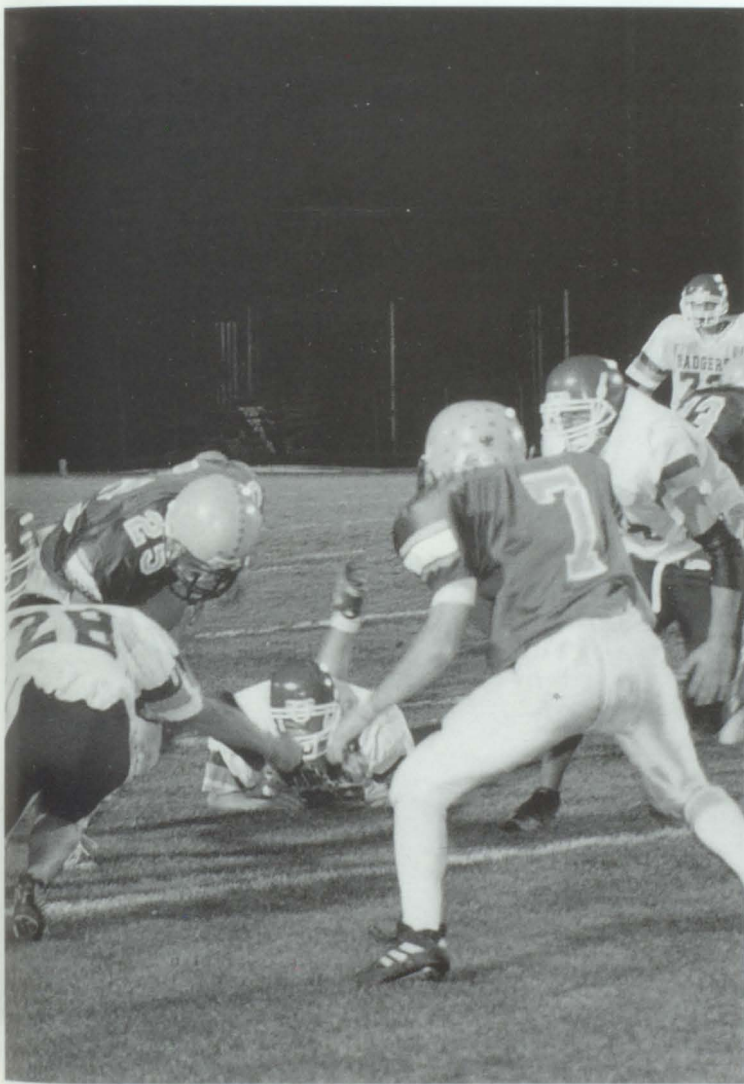

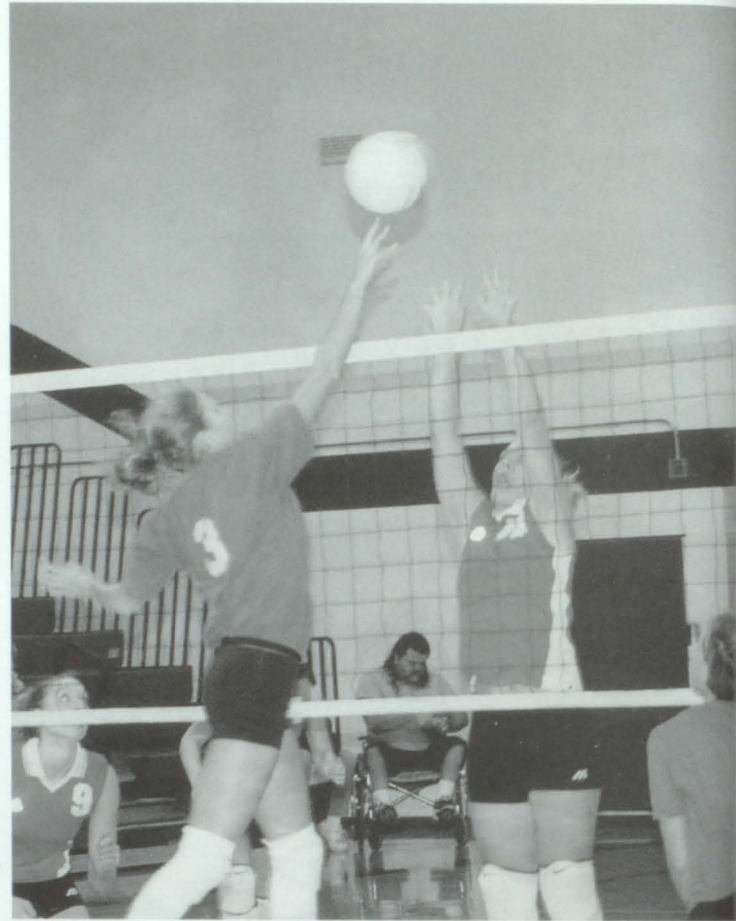
Volleyball

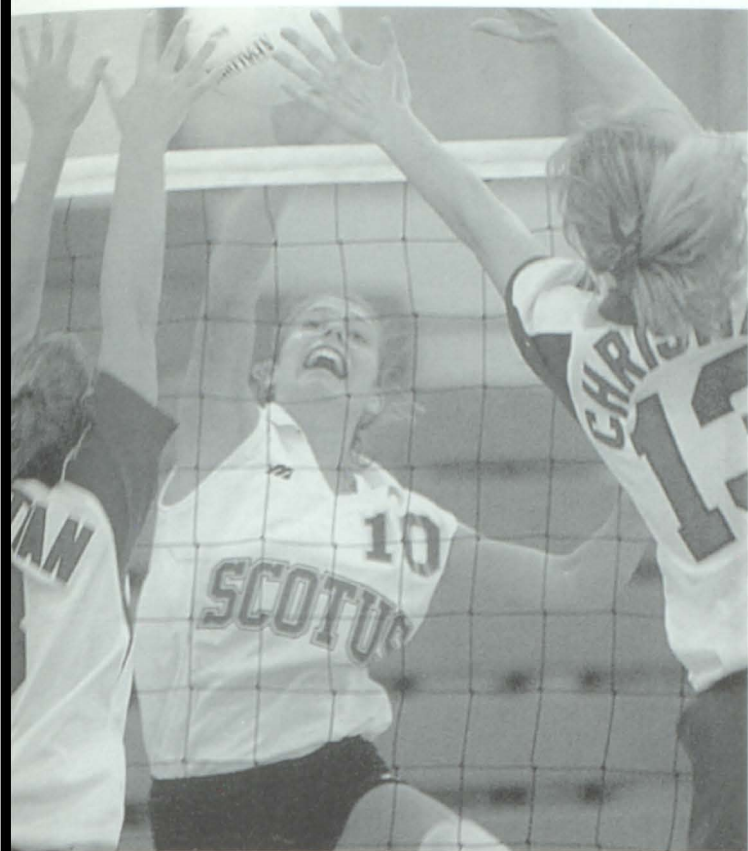

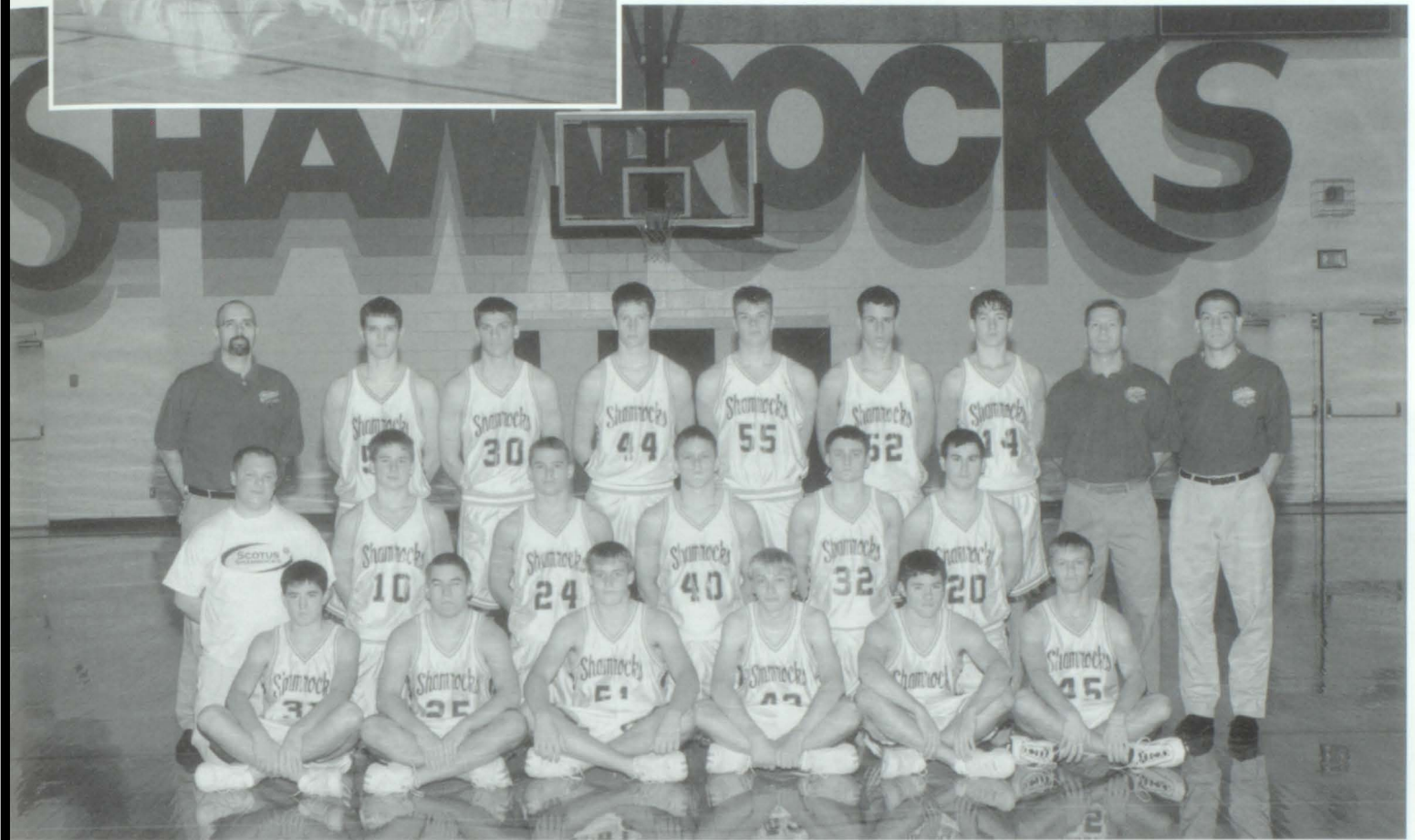

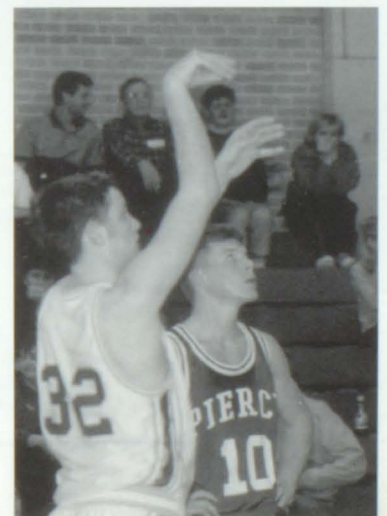

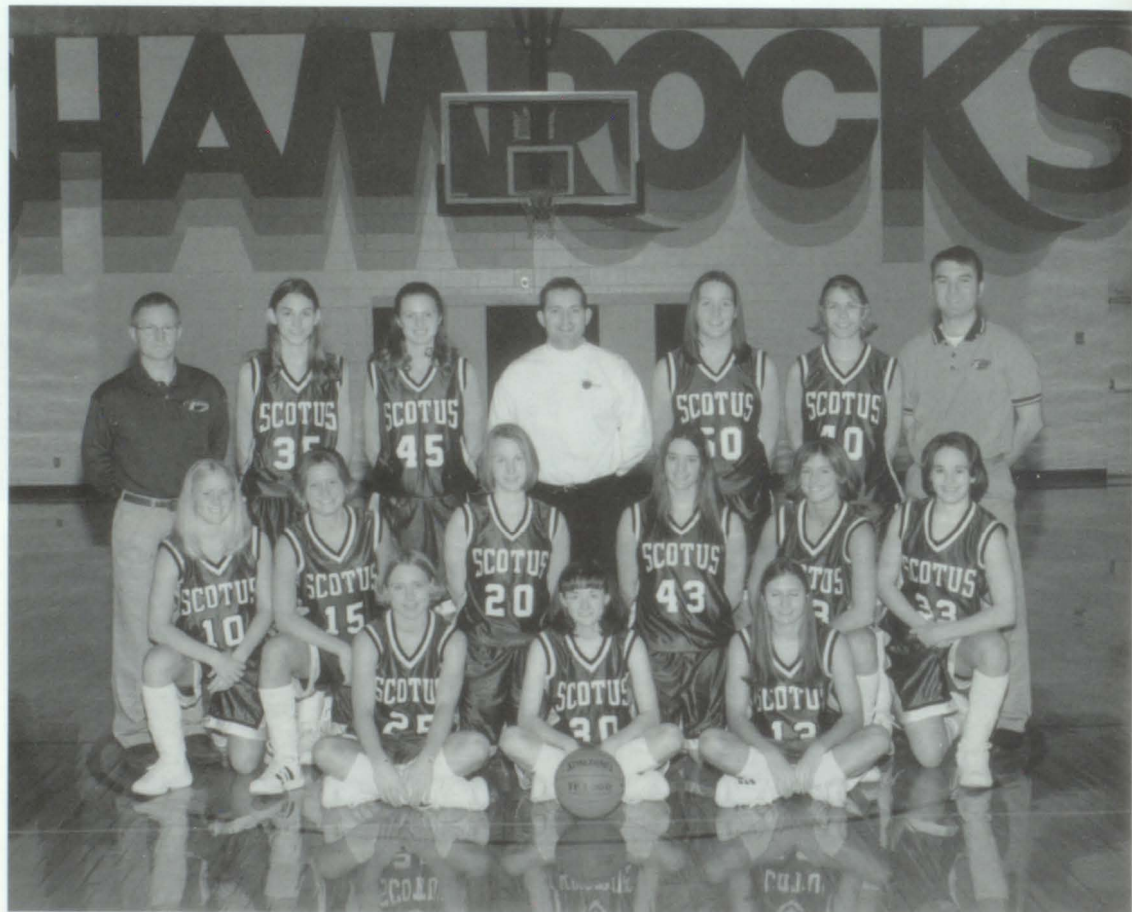

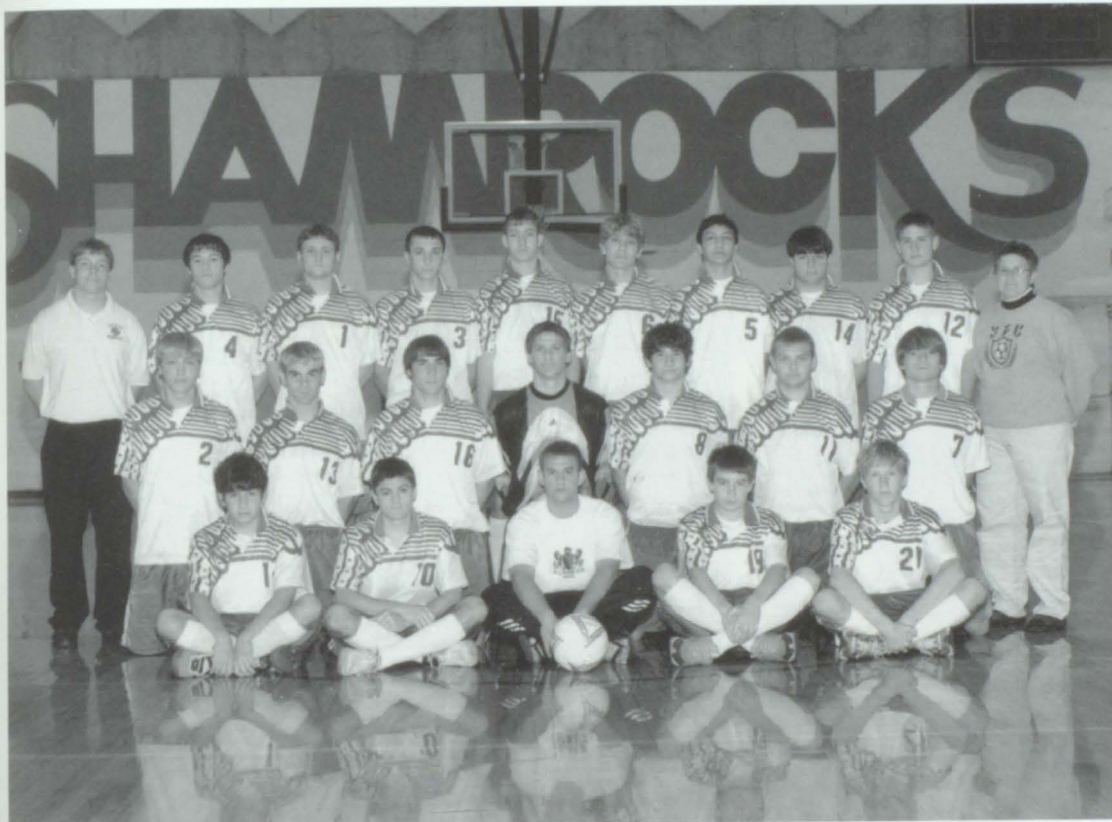

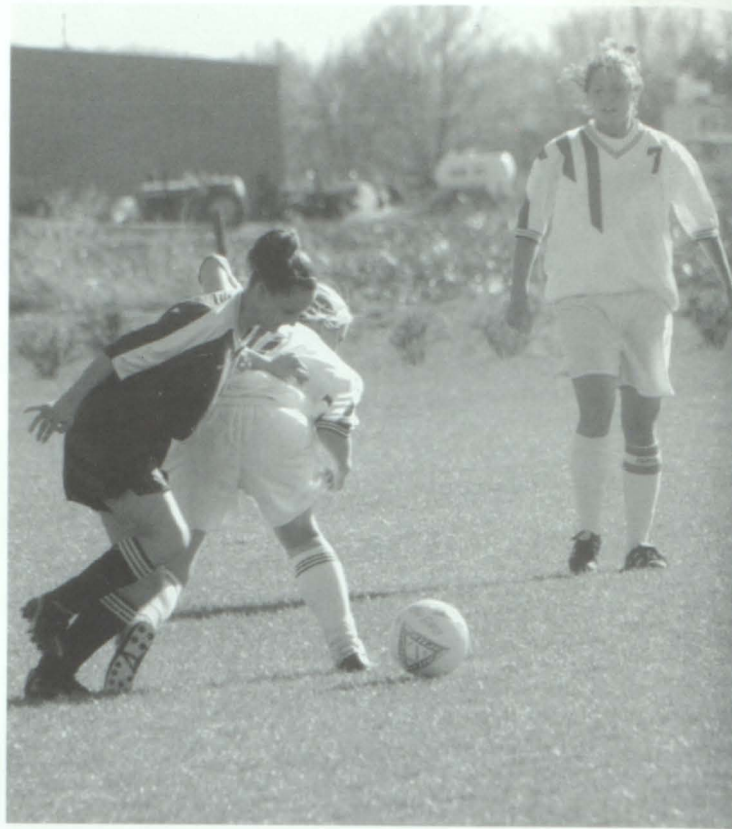

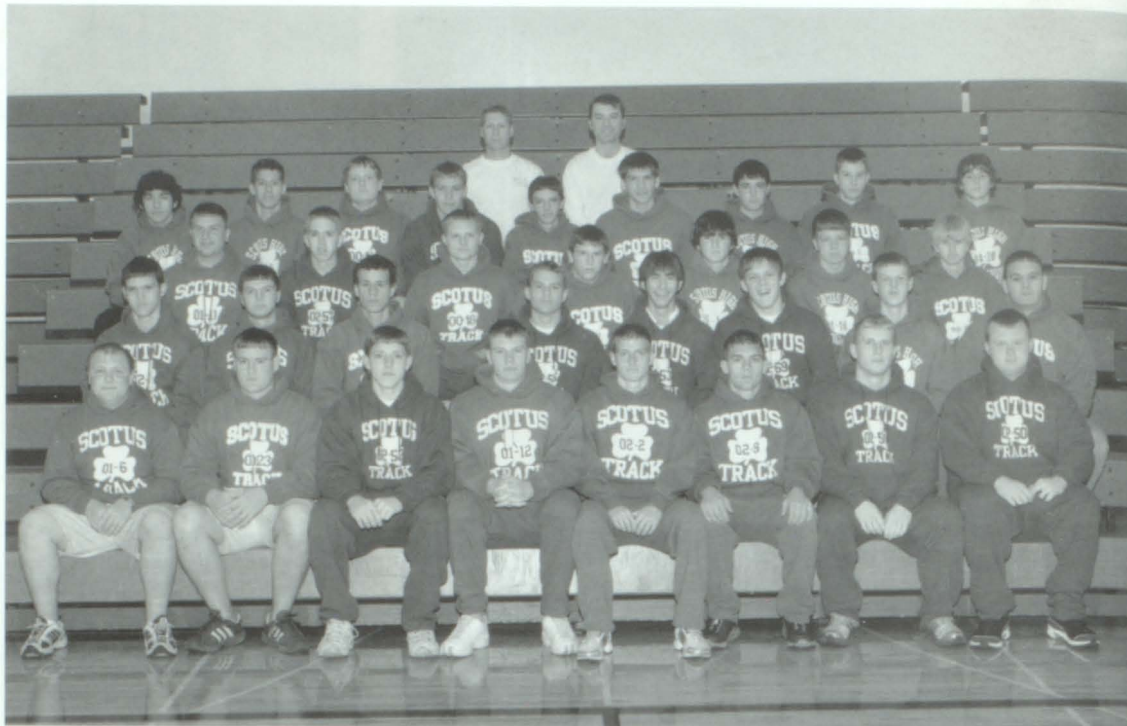

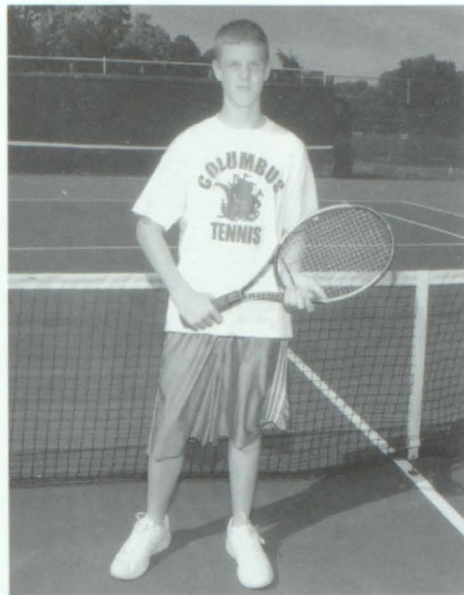

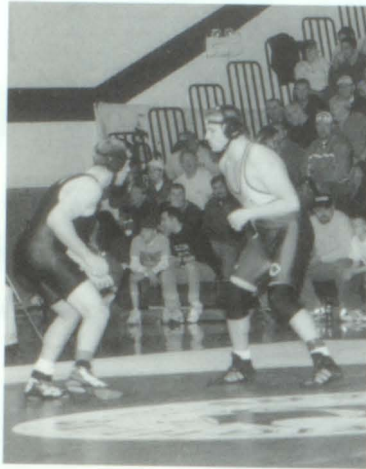

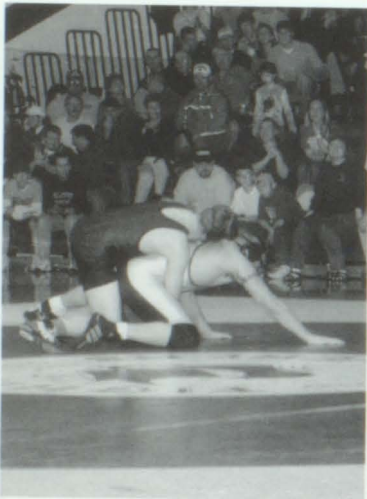

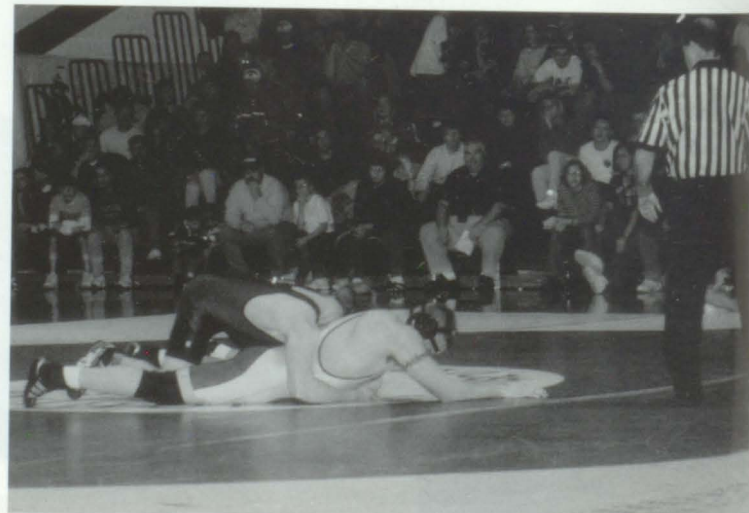

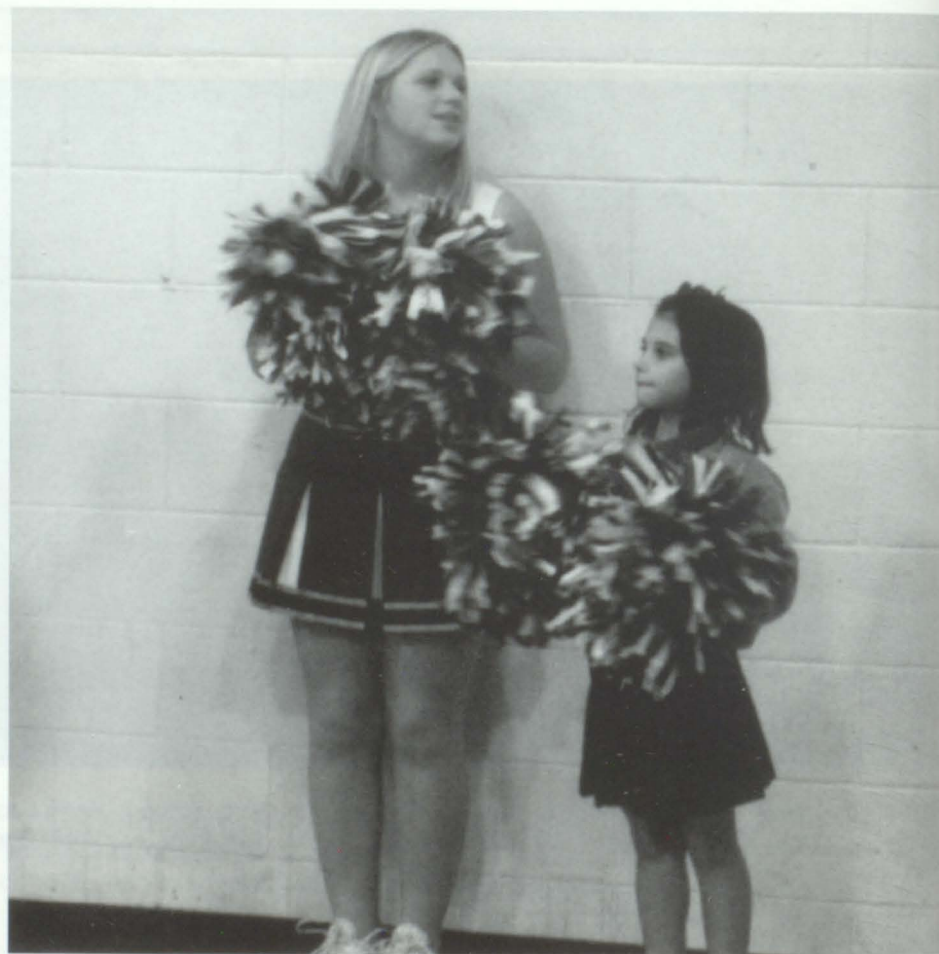

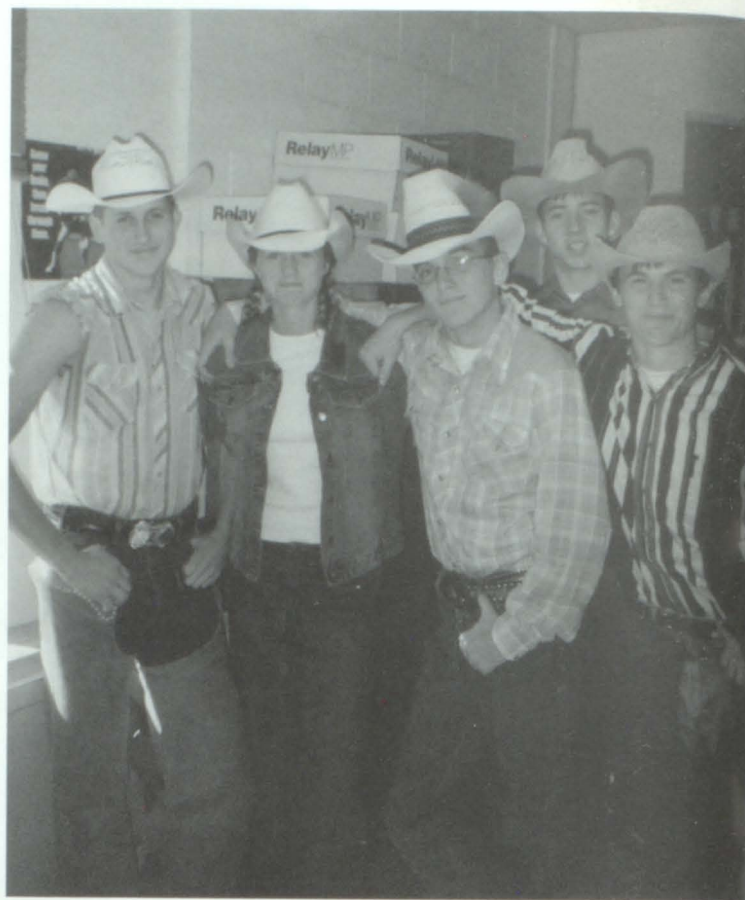

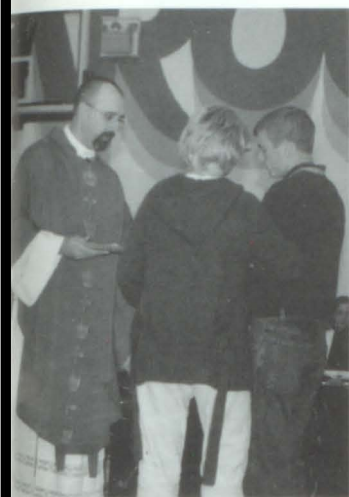

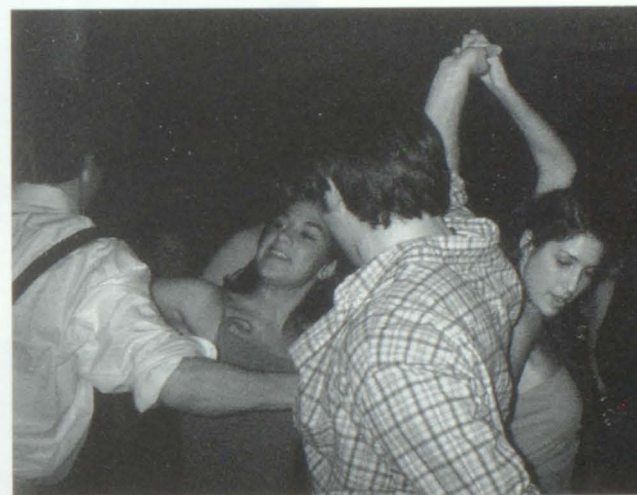

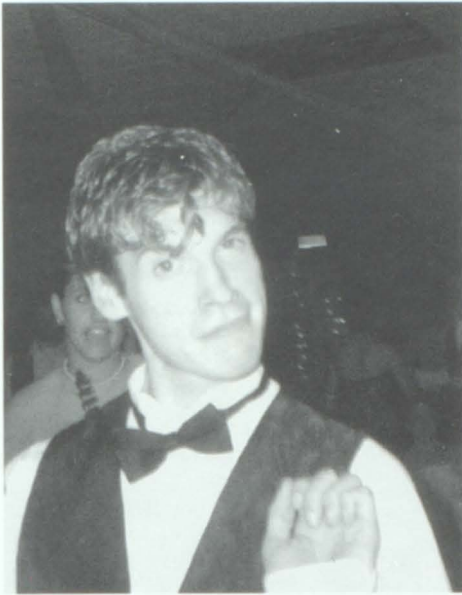

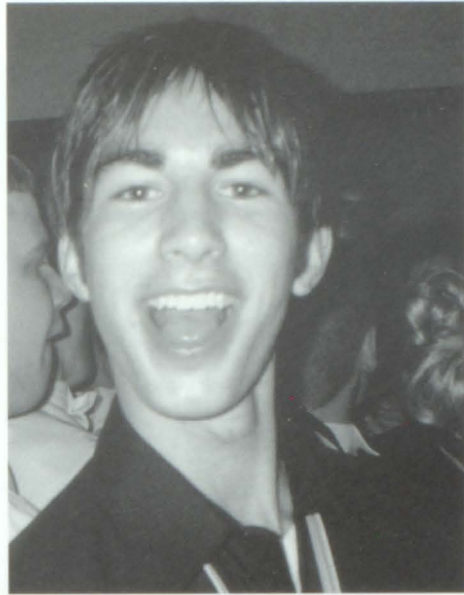

Calamity Jane

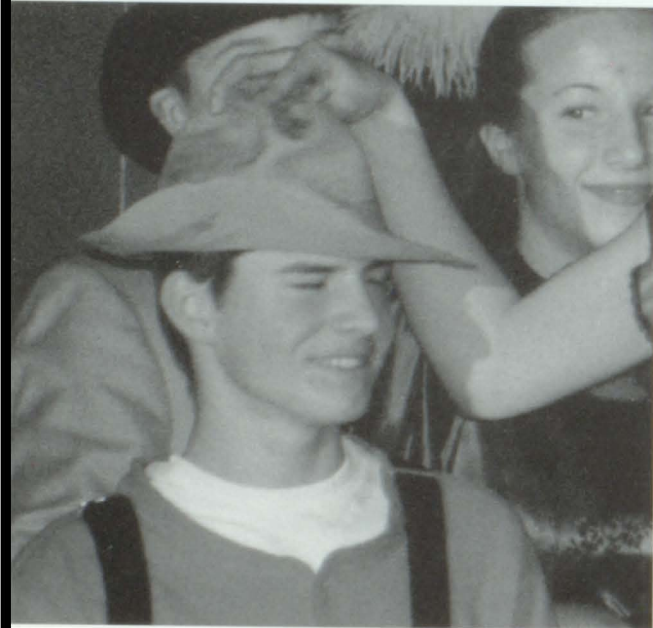

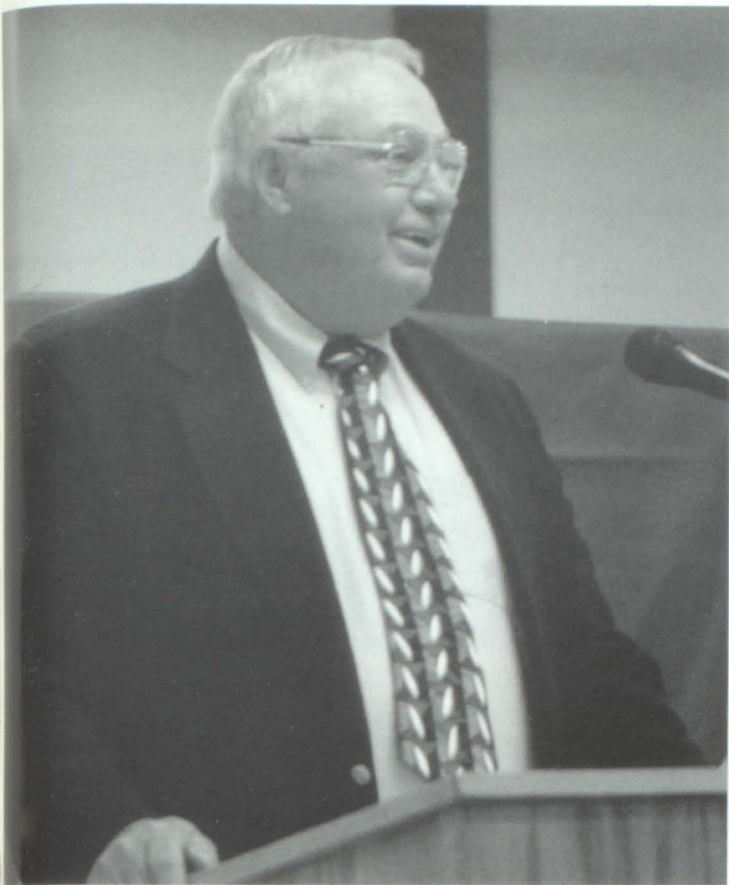
