▲ FOUR MORE YEARS

President George W. Bush was re-elected, defeating Democratic challenger John Kerry. The Republican majority in Congress gained four more seats each in the House and Senate. Voter turnout was the highest since 1968.

▲ ON THE FRONT LINES

U.S. military forces remained in Iraq, trying to stabilize a country besieged by Iraqi rebels. Prior to scheduled Iraqi national elections Jan. 30, 2005, the U.S. increased its troop totals to 150,000, the most since the fighting began in March 2003.

◀ PRIVATE TICKET INTO SPACE

For the first time in history, a privately financed vehicle successfully sent humans into space when SpaceShipOne completed two launches in the Ansari X Prize, a contest designed to spur development in private spacecrafts. The SpaceShipOne engineers won the \$10 million contest when their ship surpassed 63 miles of altitude on two different flights.

▼ A GREEK SUMMER

The 2004 Summer Olympics returned home to Athens, Greece, which was the site of the first Olympic games in the modern era. It was hard to take the spotlight away from the pool, where American swimmer Michael Phelps won eight medals, including six gold.

▲ WINNERS FOR \$400, ALEX

Ken Jennings earned more than \$2.5 million in 74 appearances on the TV game show *Jeopardy!* before being beaten. Jennings benefited from a 2003 rule change that allows players to play until they lose.

▲ TAKE THAT, BABE!

The Boston Red Sox finally ended 86 years of frustration, defeating their archrivals the New York Yankees in the American League Championship Series, then sweeping the St. Louis Cardinals to win the 2004 World Series. In the process, the dreaded "Curse of the Bambino" was finally dead.

▼ YEAR OF THE SEQUEL

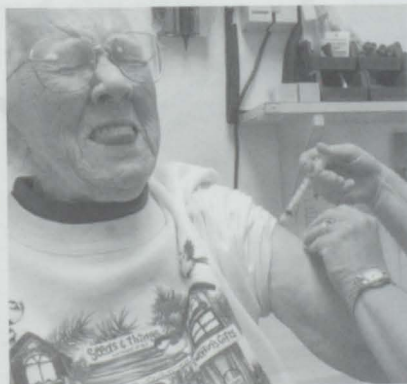

◀ HEALTHY PEOPLE STEP ASIDE

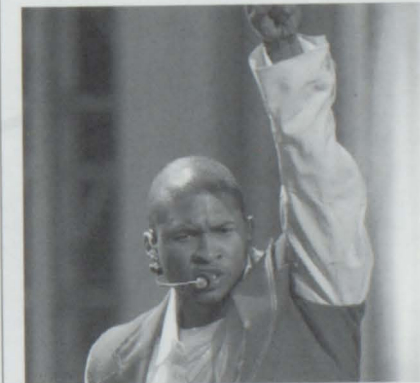

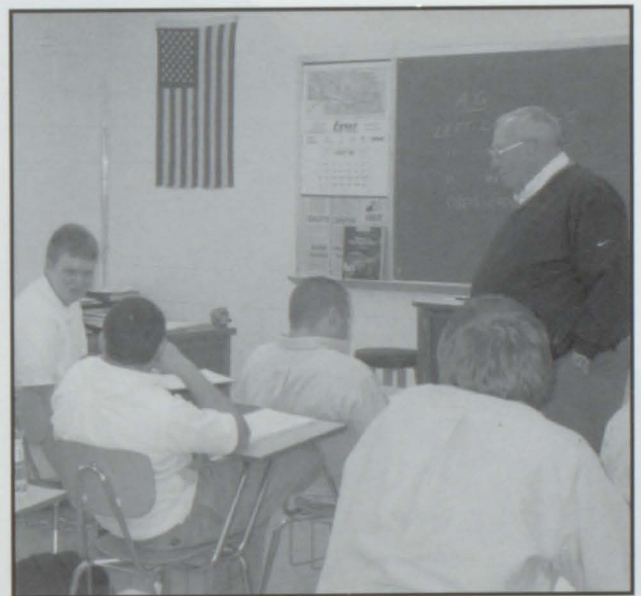
Math, Social Studies, Technology

Religion, Art, P.E., Health

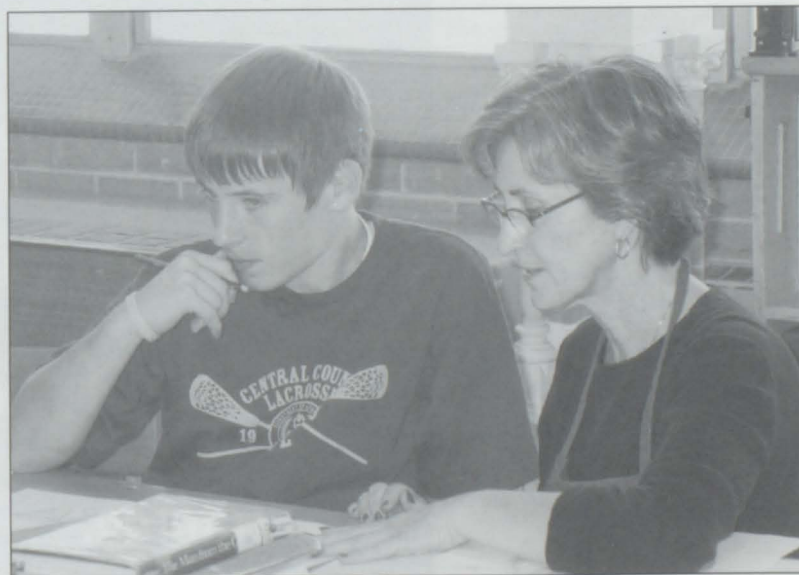

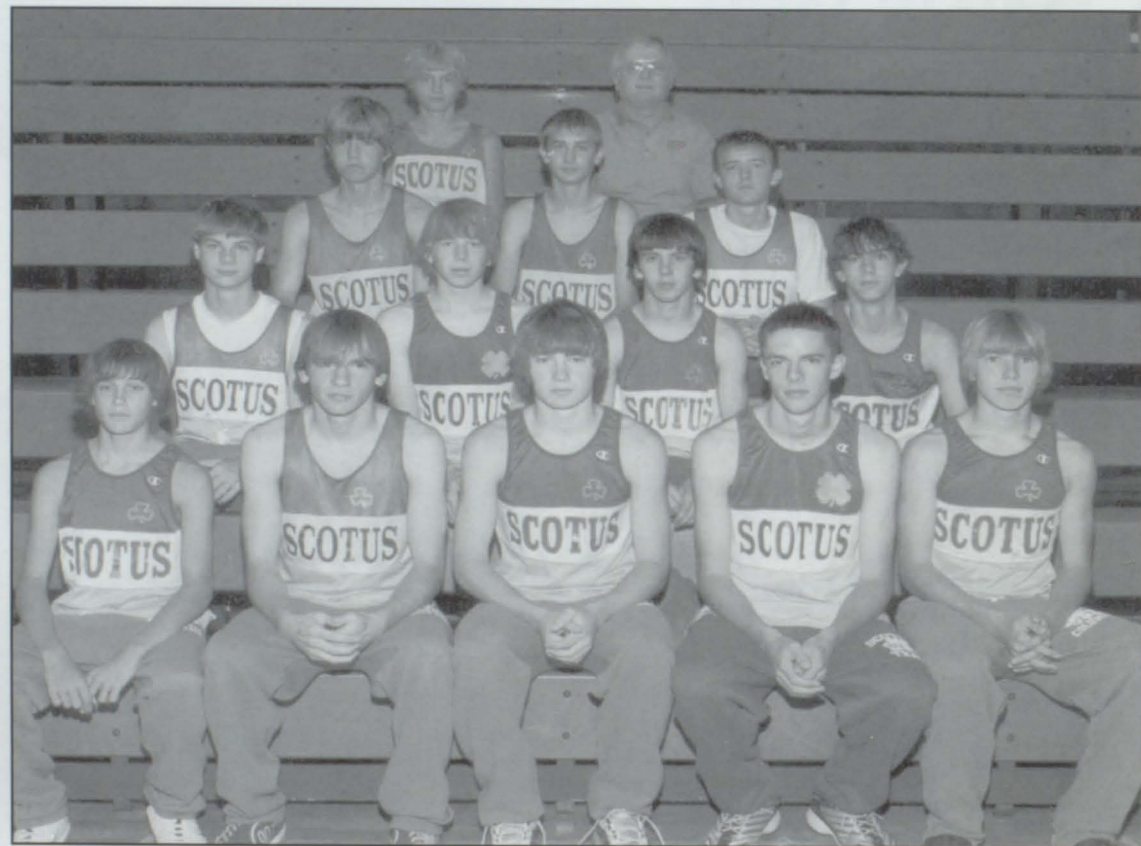

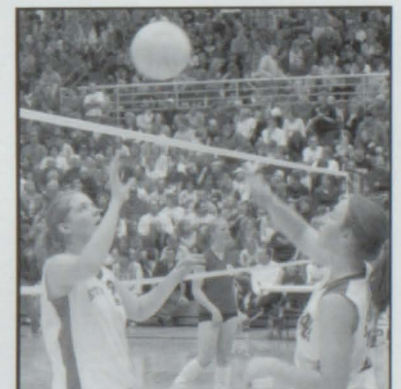

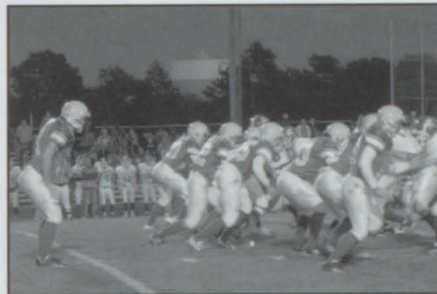

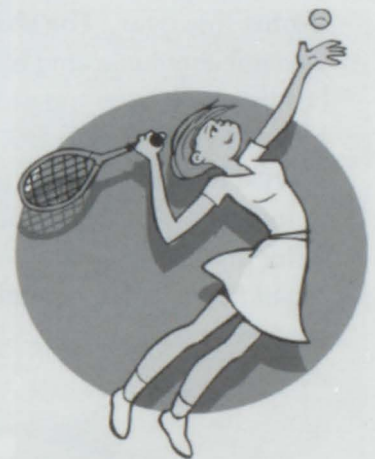

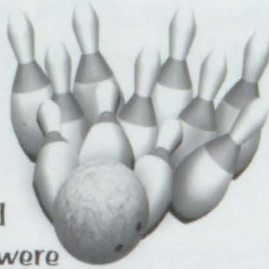

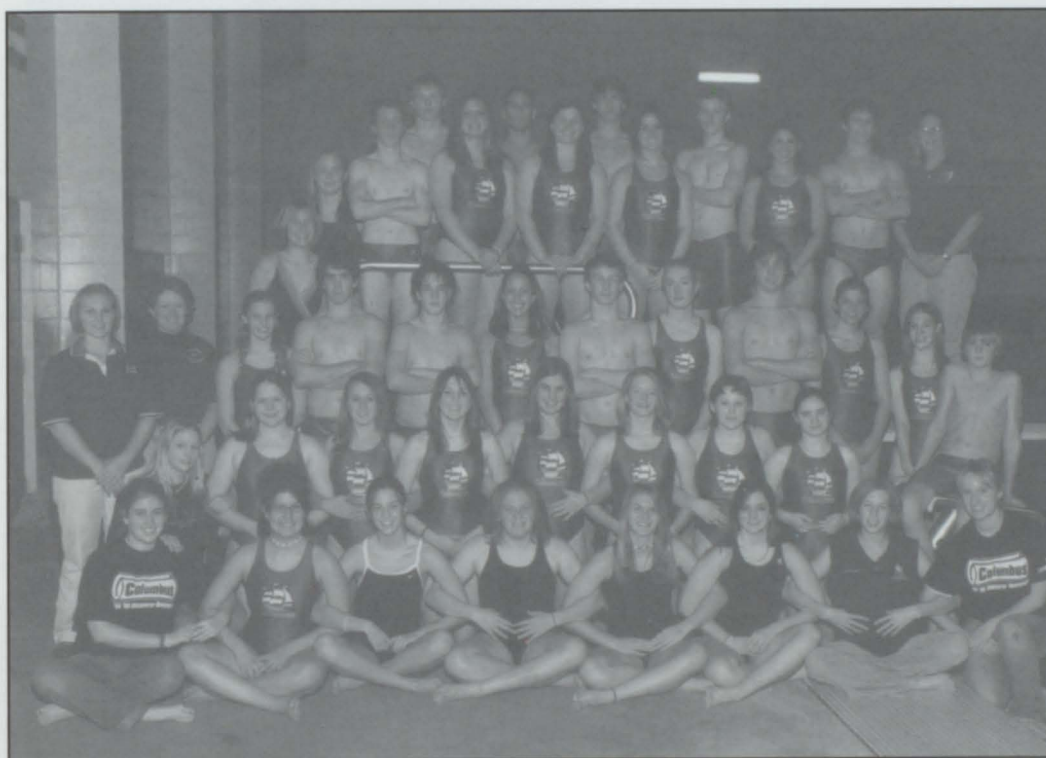
Swimming

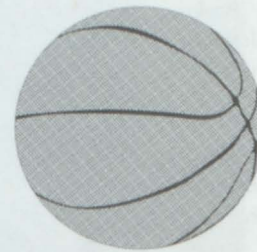

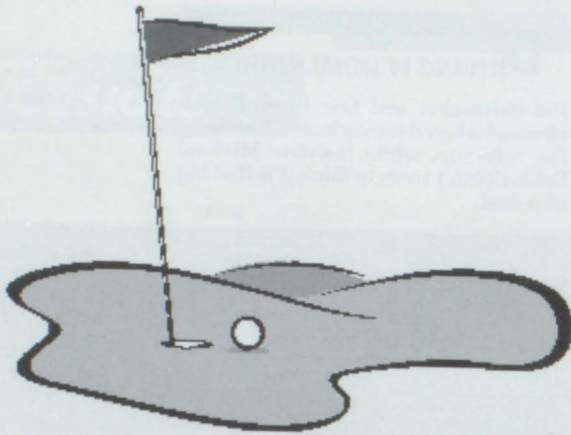

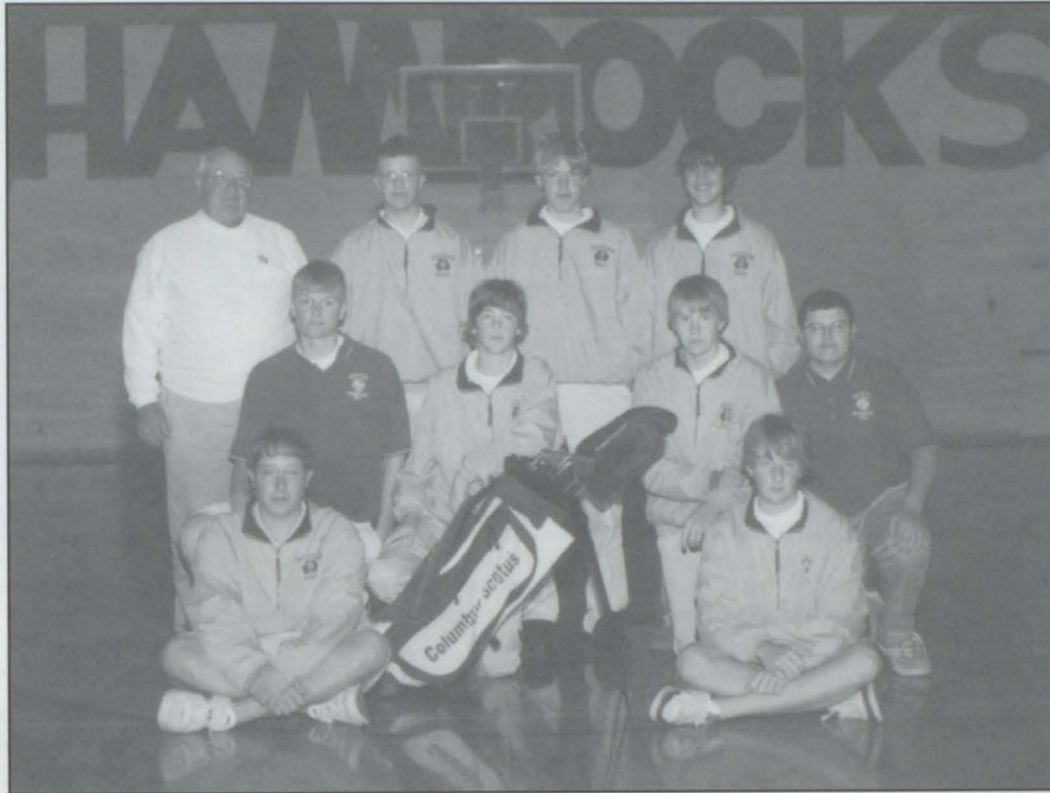

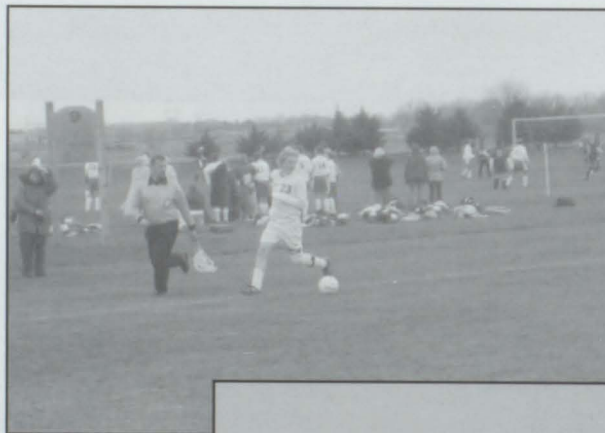

Soccer team's long hard hours pay off with a trip to state

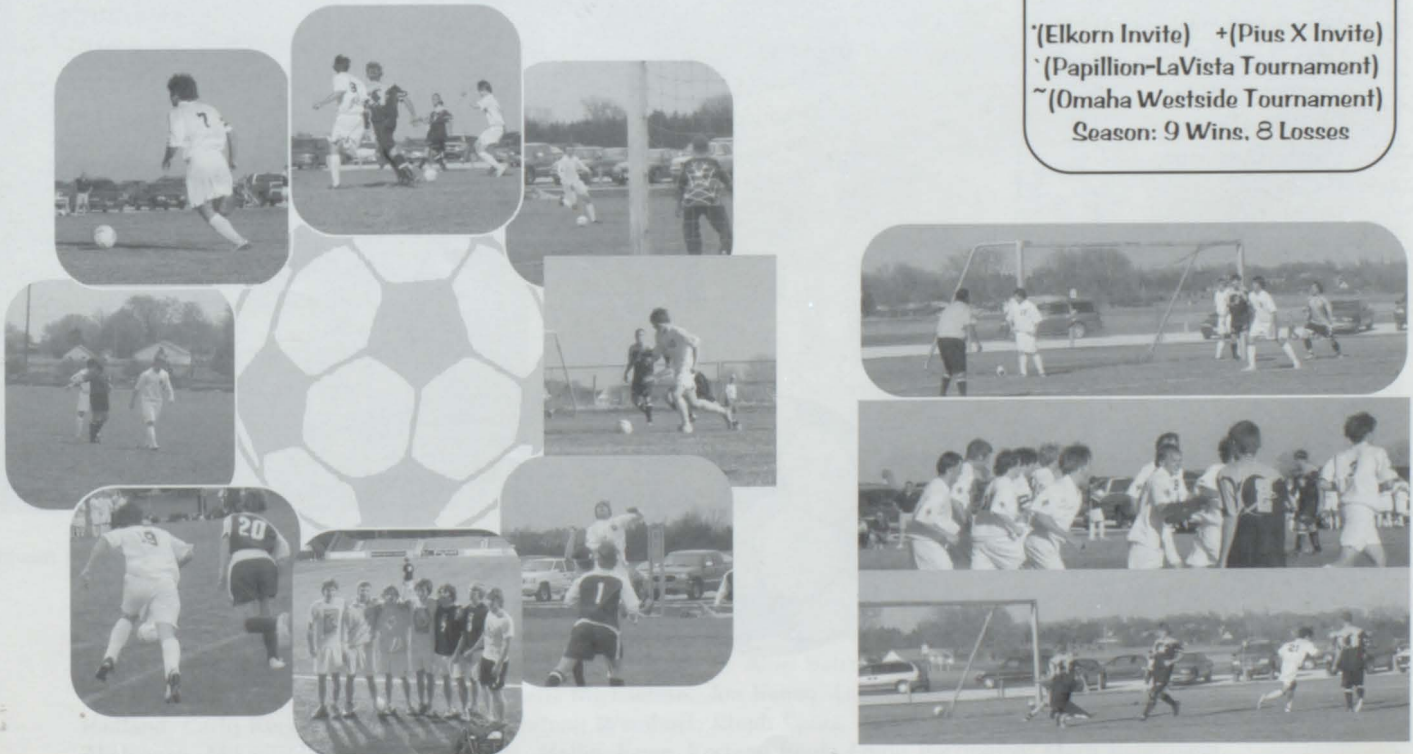

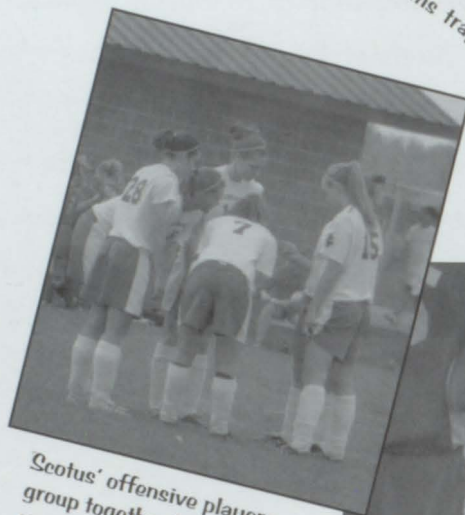

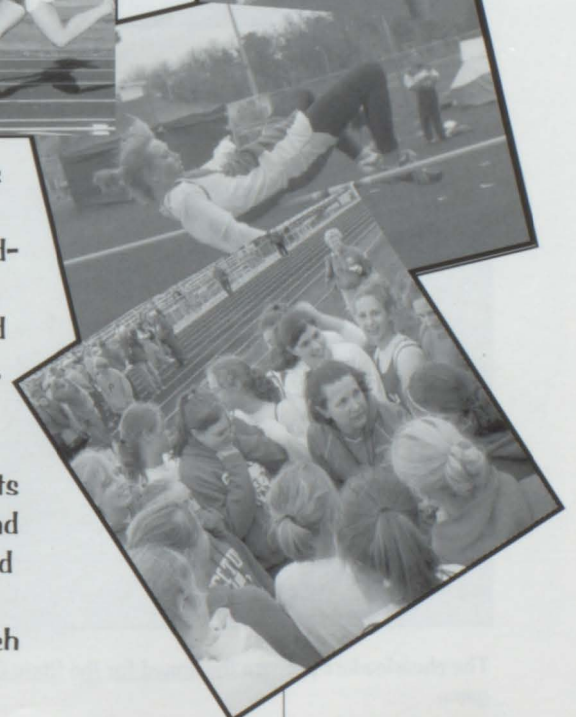

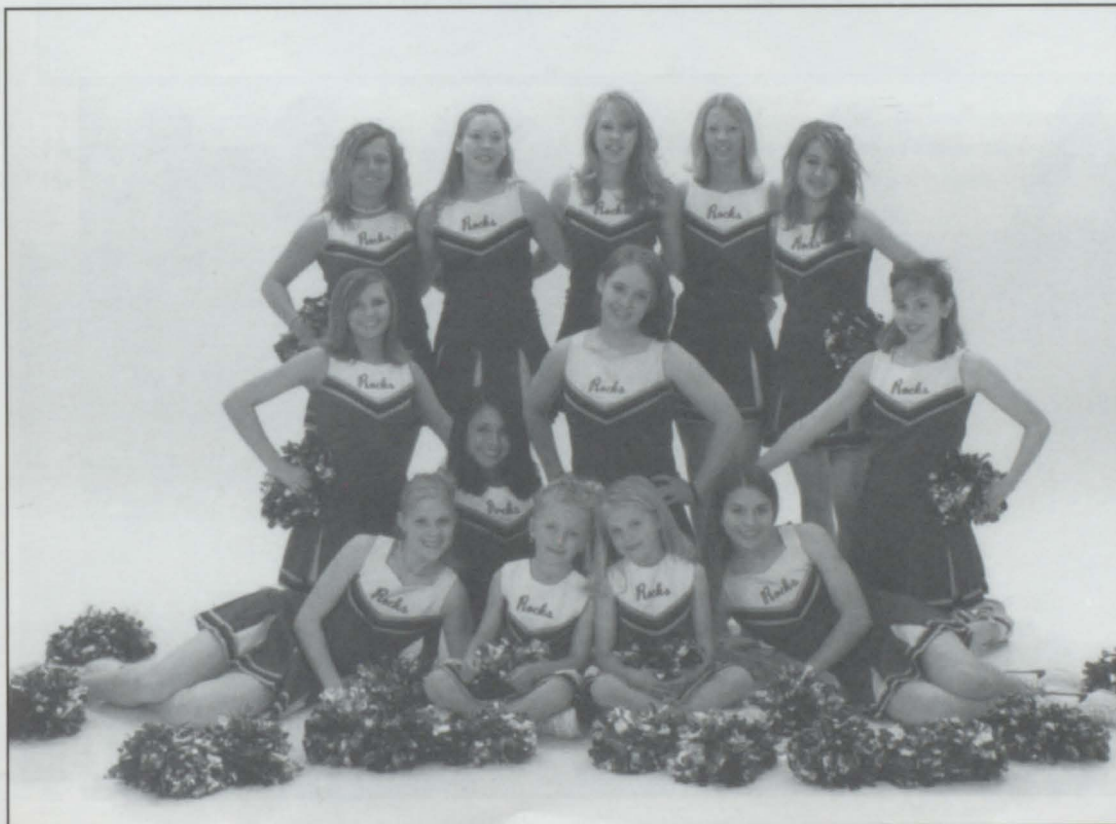

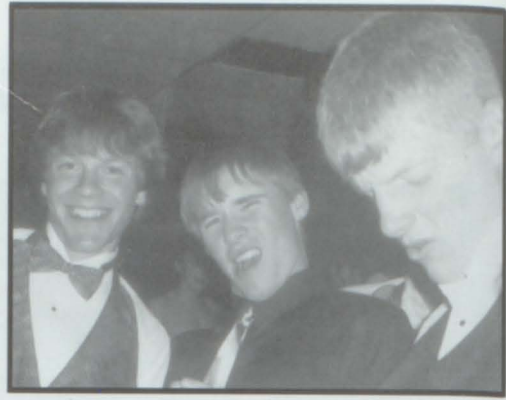

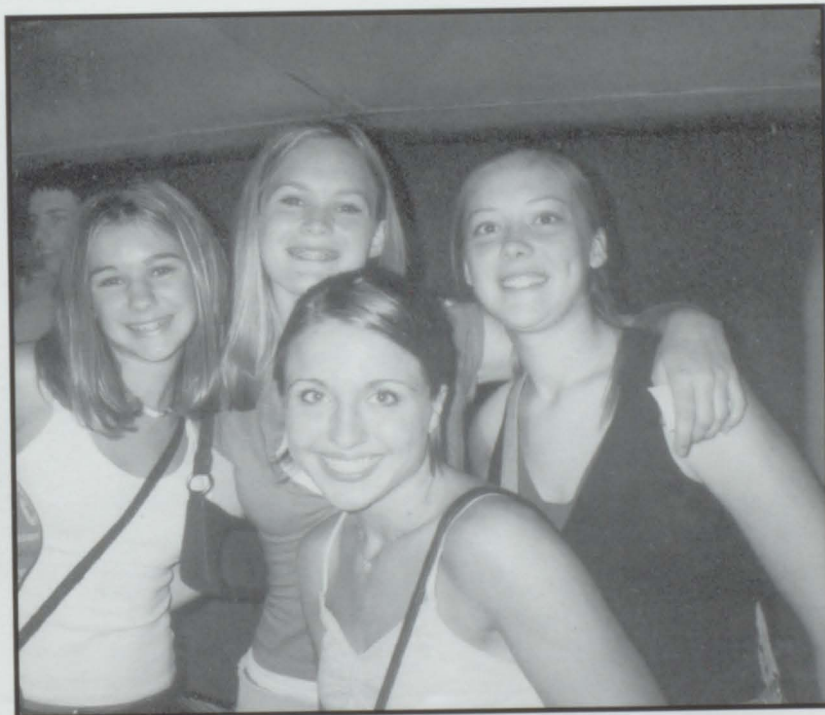

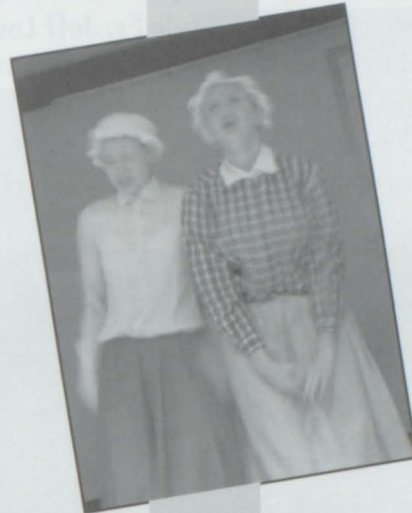

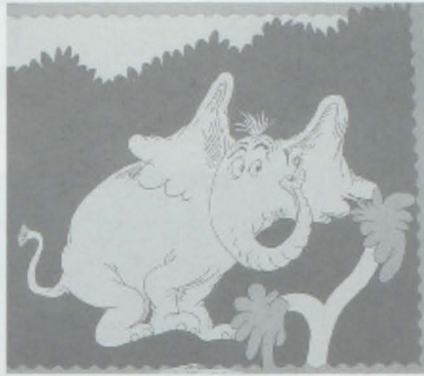

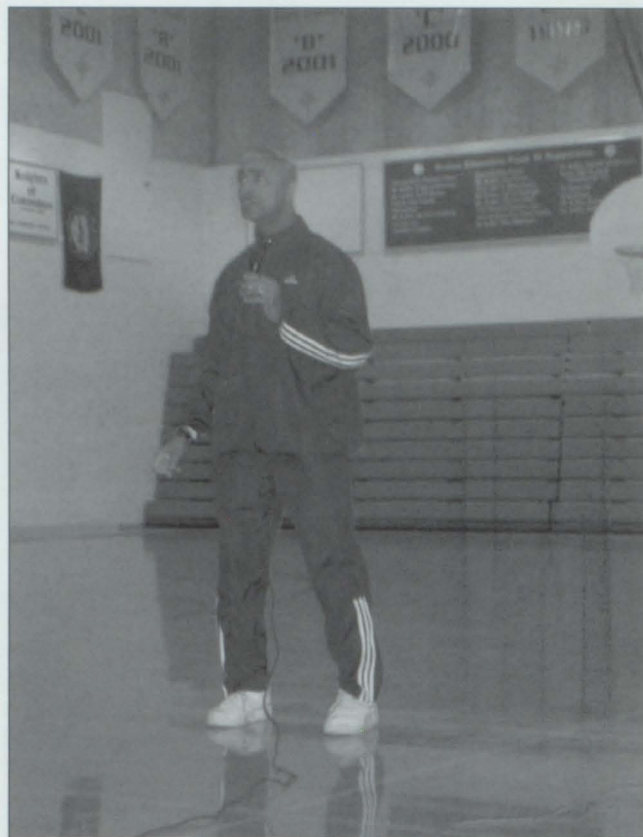

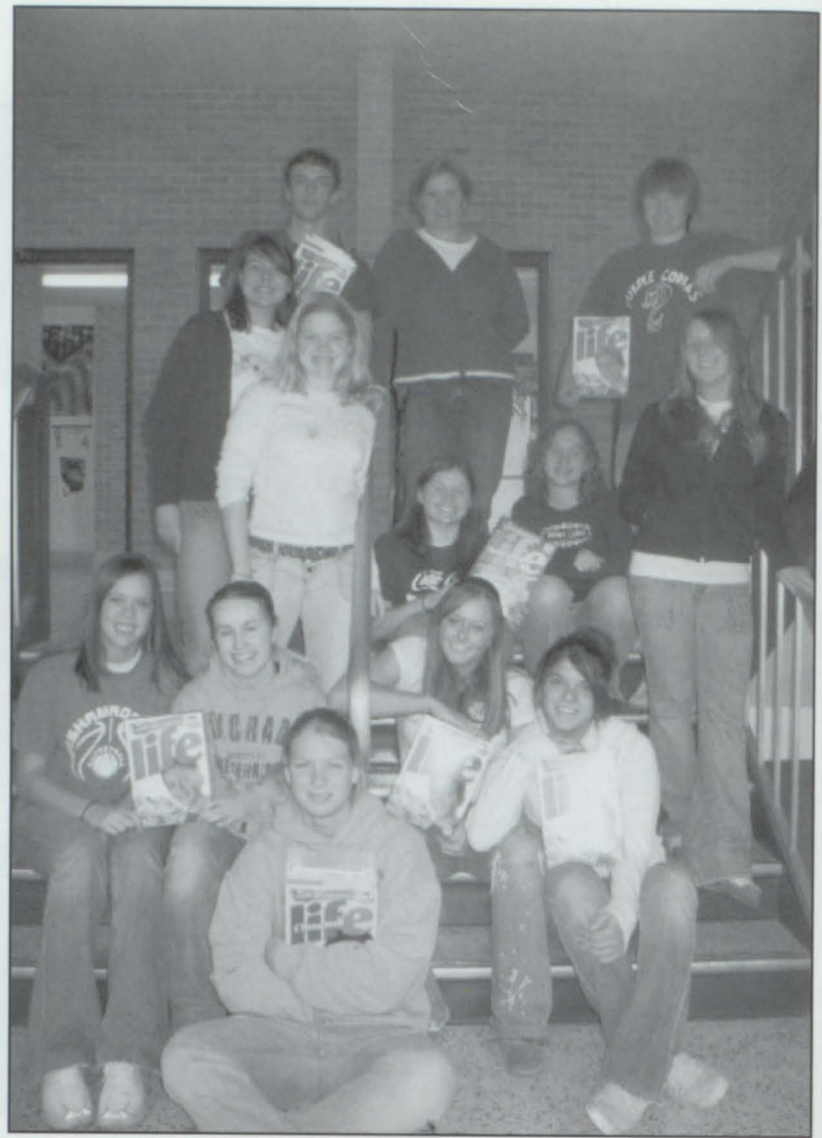

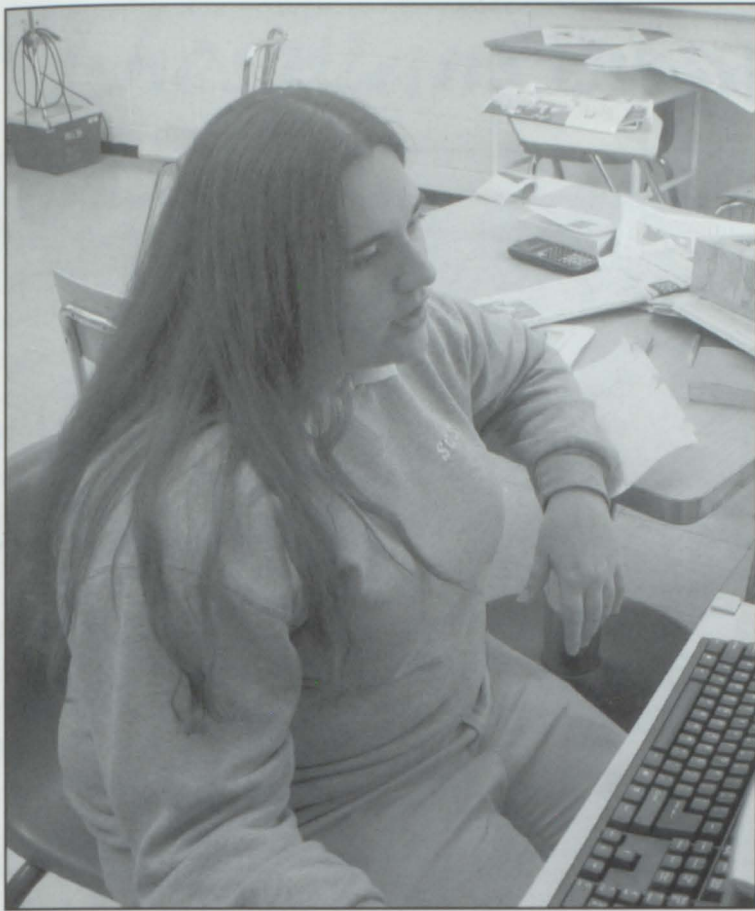

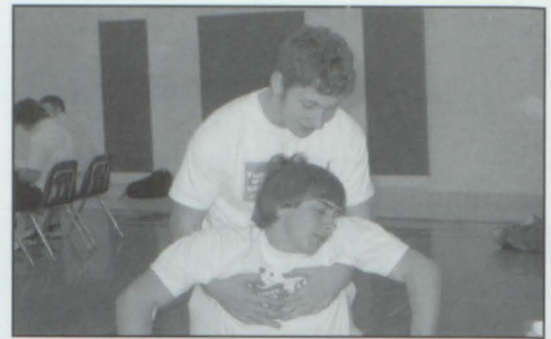

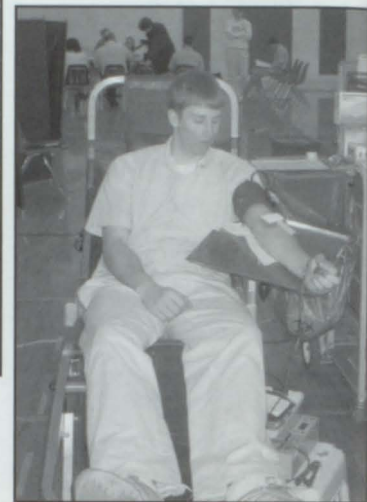

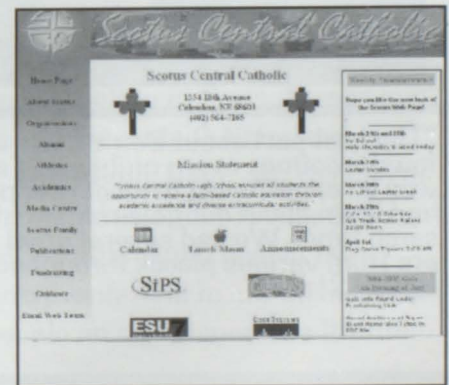

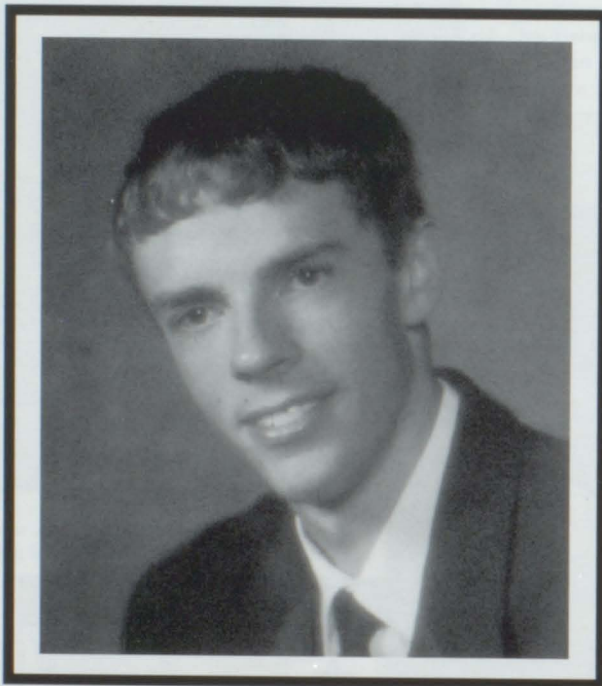


Girl's and Boy's State

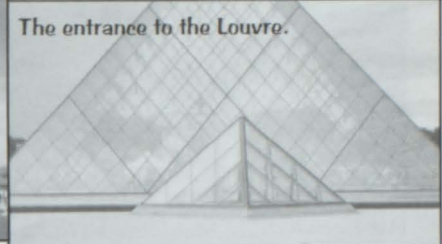

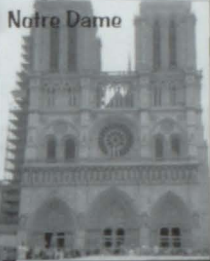

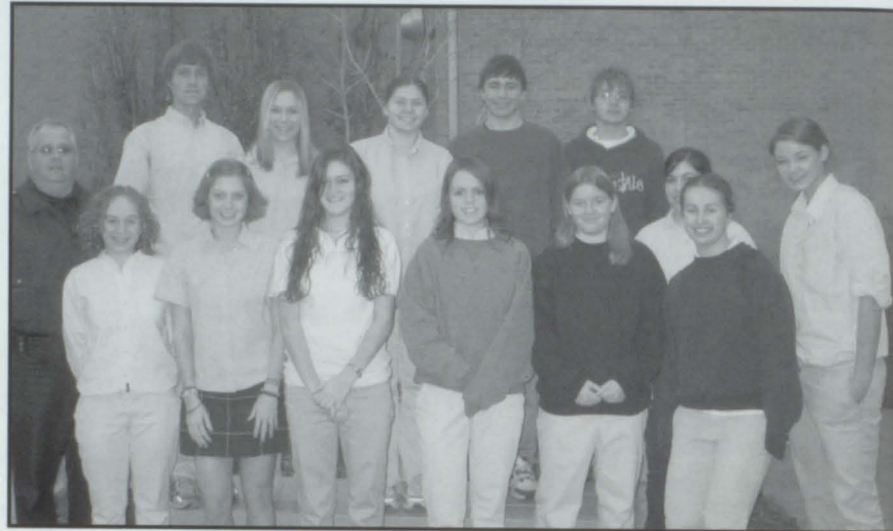

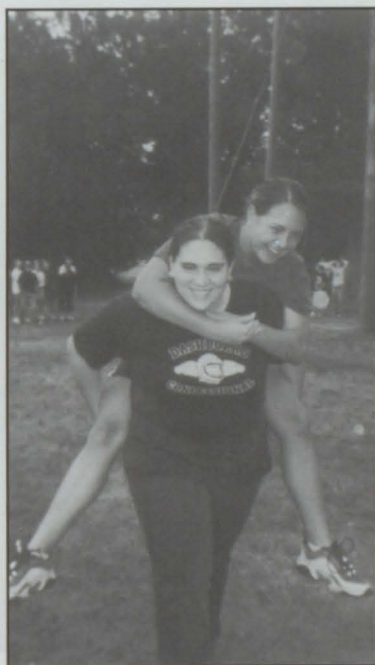




Senior Retreat
