




Shamrock Pride





Many Scotus students gathered for Teens for Life meetings with their sponsor, Mrs. Rambour, to organize events to fight against abortion. The biggest event the students attended was the National March for Life in Washington D.C. Teens for Life members also went to different abortion clinics in Nebraska and held up signs at the Life Chain in Columbus.

This was the third year that Scotus students have attended the March for Life. The March for Life is a protest against abortion to speak out for those who cannot speak out for themselves. They marched from the National Mall to the Capitol Building, toured Gettysburg, and visited monuments and basillicas. Another key event was the bus ride to and from Washington D.C., which took about twenty-four hours.

Freshman Tori Rinkol went on the March for the first time this year. "My favorite historical part of the trip was going to Gettysburg's battlefield and seeing all of the monuments and learning about the past. My favorite spiritual part of the trip was when we were on the March and just looking at how many peoople were there."


















Many students either participate in Youth Group or Godparents on Wednesday nights.

At Youth Group, teens spend time socializing while learning about Christ. The teens are living a life of Christ through the many service activities they participate in throughout the year. Some of the activities include volunteering at the food pantry, playing Bingo with the elderly, working at a mission house at an Omaha Overnight, and attending the annual mission trips. This year's mission trips consist of over forty kids traveling to Colorado, Indiana, South Dakota, and northern Nebraska; Trey Stuthman will travel to Jamaica by himself for a mission trip.

Some students, on the other hand, choose Godparents. During Godparents, teens come together with volunteer couples to socialize and learn about Christ's life. Each week, teens get the opportunity to play games with each other, journal and receive responses back, eat food, and, of course, have a good time with the friends that are in their group.











Yearbook consists of ten hardworking senior and junior students. They are often seen at sporting events and other school activities with cameras around their necks waiting for the perfect picture.





"I enjoy doing Shamrock Factor because it is fun to see myself on the 'big screen' every week," senior Hannah Spenceri said.
















time, and the dance came to a close.









"Being a part of the musical is the highlight of my year, and it's hard to believe it's over," Ostdiek said of his final Scotus musical.










Competition is Key





"I still wish we could have made State, but we had a good season, and I was proud of the team," senior Steph Jarecke said.



Junior Allison Smith said, "This was the best year we've had in a long time, and we had a great group of seniors. Next year is going to be tough, but we're ready for the upcoming season."




Stutzman did not quite make state, but he made it to the heart-break, which is the last round determining whether the wrestler makes it to state or not.


