

TAKING-A-CLOSER-LOOK

Since opening in 1884, Scotus has had many changes.

From 1884 to 1964, Scotus Central Catholic High School was known by two different names. St. Francis Academy was the first name given to Scotus by the Sisters of St. Francis Seraph of Perpetual Adoration when the school first started in 1884. The school was named after St. Francis of Assisi because he is considered the founder of all Franciscan Orders. In 1925, the name changed from St. Francis Academy to St. Bonaventure High School when the St. Bonaventure Parish purchased the school and renamed it. St. Bonaventure was chosen because St. Bonaventure was known as the "seraphic doctor" of the Church because of his warmth to everyone. The name changed one final time because a corporation was formed to establish a central Catholic high school supported by nine Columbus area parishes. On

July 1, 1965 the school's name was changed to Scotus Central Catholic to commemorate the Franciscan Scholar, Blessed John Duns Scotus, and in tribute to the Franciscan tradition of the school.

Not only has the name changed, but the purpose of the school has also changed. In 1884, St. Francis Academy did not teach grades seven through twelve as Scotus does now. St. Francis Academy used to be a boarding school that welcomed grades first through tenth. In 1910. St. Francis Academy finally started offering all twelve grades while still being a boarding school, but in 1925, St. Francis Academy finally stopped being a boarding school. Twentyseven years later, the elementary grades moved to new parish elementary schools that had been created.

Today, Columbus has three elementary schools and Scotus as the Catholic schools.
















Throughout the years, uniforms have changed. In the past, uniforms were oxford shirts with an option of cardigan sweaters for girls. The boys did not have a specific uniform but just a dress code that required slacks and a button down shirt. Today, both boys and girls can wear the school polos, short or long sleeve, with an option of a sweatshirt; students can wear shorts or slacks, and girls have the option of a skort.














The cheerleaders have also changed throughout the years including how many girls are on the team.





The first sport played at Scotus was basketball in 1931. When basketball first arrived, the team competed wearing "Tooley Drug Co." because Tooley's financed the athletic equipment. The uniforms were green and white, which is how the school colors were established. The "Shamrocks" derived from the first team also. Since Irish ancestry predominated, the reference to the "Irish" was a natural, but in the 1960's after the school name change, the Shamrocks seemed to be the perfect "mascot" name.








One change that specifically affected the boys was the addition of stalls in the boys' bathrooms.


"I think that [the walls in the boys' bathroom] brought us boys closer together as one family, and it was a great story time," freshman Derek Slegl said.







Many times students go into


classes thinking it will be easy and enjoyable, but sophomore Tanner Spenceri found out the hard way in P.E.


'Mrs. Tooley's tests are really hard! And when we are in the weight room she is always pushing us," Spenceri


With only losing three regular season games, the girls were ready to take on the conference and districts tournaments.


'We were conference






"Pierce was a fun game because we had not beaten them in a long time, and Homecoming made it that much better," senior **Cody Zimmerman** said.


Two straight wins against David City and Madison put the team in good shape for the last season game and the playoffs.








STUDENT COUNCIL

Sophomore Marcus Dodson, who finished second at the state tournament, enjoyed the team's state experience.








FAIRYTALES




It was a red carpet event. We



qualifiers that would compete at Burke.


"State track is unlike any other meet. There are so many people there, and it takes a lot if you want to medal there," senior Ivan Chilapa said.

"My funniest bloopers can't be printed in the yearbook," Scotus President Wayne Morfeld said.


After some persuasion, other faculty members shared their humorous classroom stories.
