Scotus grad, local unit sent to Iraq

They all stood there, waiting for the answer. It had been so long; they were ready and anticipating a break to go home. But the announcement was not quite what they had been hoping for.

On July 10, 2004, Josh Birkel, a 2002 Scotus graduate, and the rest of his National Guard unit were shocked to hear the news that they were called for "Operation Enduring Freedom" and would soon be traveling to the Middle East.

At first, this was not part of his plan. Birkel signed up for the National Guard in October of 2000 because he thought he could use the extra money to help pay for his college tuition.

"I never thought I'd go anywhere," Birkel said. "I figured I would just go and do my monthly thing."

He has wanted to go since March of 2003. Once he received the shocking news on that July summer day, however, he had some mixed feelings about actually going. He was unsure as to if he still wanted to go to another country for a year, away from his family and friends.

"You realize the reality of it all," Birkel said. "There's a chance you might not come back, or you come back different."

He knows he has no choice, so he looks at the positive side of the matter.

The troops in Hastings, Nebraska knew their lives would all be affected by the news they received that night. Some were down, some were excited, but most were shocked and speechless.

"I was scared," he said. "I kind of sat there, staring off into the field. It's hard to explain. The reality of it all sets in."

That night Birkel's unit had two That night Birkel's unit had two hours to make their phone calls before lights out. The first person Birkel called was his mom. When he told her, she burst into tears in fear of her son's future safety. As any mother, she did not want him to go.

"I really don't want to hear anyone cry right now," he told his mother. So she stopped.

His dad was sleeping, so he left him a quick message and talked to him the next day. Birkel said his dad did not have much to say about the situation.

In the event he would not come back, Birkel tried to see most of his friends at least once before he left. His time for doing all of the fun things he was planning was cut short because he was put on the ten-percent list. This means that ten percent of his unit (about 15-20 people) is told to prepare the unit's gear to be shipped out.

"Everyone else is at home doing whatever," Birkel said, "and you're there boxing up everything, putting it on crates, and loading it on trucks."

freaks you out," Birkel
said.
"For the first week I

freaks you out," Birkel said.

"For the first week I knew [of going overseas]," he said, "every single day I thought about, what if I die?" I thought about that nonstop. It wears you down to think about it all the time."

It was complicated to write down everything in the will, so he said just to give everything to his mom. It's easier not to think about it too much while overseas, Birkel said, because if you do, then you will not have much of a drive to try to survive.

Because of security reasons, they were not told exactly what they will be doing and where they will be doing and where they will accompany supply convoys as a mechanic. It is just a matter of how far the troops will be going and how dangerous it will be.

One of the possibilities is delivering supplies to the troops. Anything from ammunition and fuel, to juice boxes and batteries can be

"I want to volunteer [to drive into Iraq when needed]," Birkel said, "just because I don't want to stick back in the shop all the time. I think I'd get bored.

the motor pool all day."

It's a dangerous task with which he's willing to assist. Roadside bombs are always an obstacle on the route. They come in numerous disguises, whether they are in pop cans or cardboard boxes. And if they are hanging from the overpasses, it is many times too late before they can be noticed. In addition to these bombs, the convoys often become targets of enemy fire and ambushes.

Besides the money he will receive for his duties overseas, Birkel said he is looking at the positive side of the situation. The experience he will soon encounter will aid him in his future career.

"I'm going to teach history," he said, "so when we talk about this stuff in class, I've actually been there. I'll have pictures and stories, first hand accounts, so it will

be more beneficial to [the students]."

Tim Siegel, a 2002 Scotus graduate and a good friend of Birkel, said it will be weird without him, given that they have known each other ever since they were two-years-old. He will try to keep in touch with Birkel whichever way he can, though, by sending care packages or writing letters.

It will most likely be a year before Birkel completes his term. He said he is not looking forward to missing his friends and family, and being gone for a year means he will have to get used to the change that has taken place over the course of that year.

"but I don't know if he understands what he is all promising."



All moving the dumpsters did was cause problems. Now the doors to the weight room always have to be closed, otherwise the







Nebraska legislature looking at expanding legalized gambling

In the Unicameral's latest session, Nebraska's state senators will vote on an amendment that would allow gambling to be constitutional. If ratified, the next ballot will present options to constitutents for legalize casinos and other forms of gambling. Currently, two ballot initiatives lead the charge.

A mendment 3 would allow for the building of two casinos in Nebraska. The other, Initiatives 417-420, would allow for the building of two casinos in Nebraska. The other, Initiatives 417-420, would allow for the building of two casinos in Omaha and over 4,900 slot and poker machines throughout the state.

A thrid option is to abstain from gambling completely. This is supported by scores of religious groups who believe the social cost to would be unbearable, but has drawn concern from many citizens, especially those of Omaha. These citizens feel that the state is losing a valuable source of income to our neighbor to the east. According to The Legislative Guide to State Taxation in Iowa, the state received \$186,730,830 from gaming tax revenues in the year 2000 alone. Gary Bock already makes a living off of legalized gambling. He is the general manager of Simulcast racing at Ag Park in Columbus. Simulcasting allows people to bet on horse races around the country shown on TV. He said that just allowing two casinos anywhere in Nebraska limits the ability of smaller

shown on TV. He said that just al-lowing two casinos anywhere in Nebraska limits the ability of smaller businesses to compete. In his opin-ion, the proposition that would al-low for slot machines and video poker could inject money into the local community, and since, money, once injected into the local economy, typically turn hands seven times before it leaves the community.

"The proposal (Initiative 417-420) to allow slots and video poker will give new opportunities to small will give new opportunities to small business owners," Mr. Bock said, "It would be expensive to get in-volved, but at least they would get

a chance."

The final option available to the state is to allow Nebraska's Native American tribes to set up casinos on their reservation. The current arrangement between the state does not allow for the tribes to operate any type of gambling facilities as long as the state does not allow similar gambling.

Bock said expanded gambling would be a beneficial thing if it were properly regulated.

Reasons that student's support the issue tend to vary.

"I can't wait for gambling to come," senior Nikki Van Ackren said. "Once I am old enough, I'm definitely going to the casinos."

Fellow senior Travis Herchenback had different reasons for supporting the current push.

"Nebraska taxes are way too high," he said. "Maybe casinos are what we need to cut down on

These opinions are not without substance. The U. S. Census has shown several trends in states that legalize gambling. Suicide, domestic violence, child abuse, divorce, bankruptcy, and over all crime rates are elevated in the states that have legalized gambling.

Soon the legislature will decide if Nebraska takes the next step toward rolling the dice with expanded gambling.





Technology is taking over Scotus. First it is automatic bathroom lights and now SIPS.

SIPS stands for "School Information and Performance System" and is a place where parents and students can check grades. On the website, www.scotushs.ne. altonaed.com, there is a school-wide calendar and a place for faculty to place announcements. Teachers and students can also communicate through the website. They can send e-mails and teachers can set up discussion groups. "The total goal of this program is more communication between parents and students and parents and students and parents and teachers," Superintendent Bill Gannon said.

Students can maintain a personal calendar and make a ToDo list for themselves. Homework assigned by teachers through the site is automatically added to students' ToDo List. SIPS allows students to see their grades any time they have an available computer. For students who previously had to

wait until Mondays to know their grade or ask their teacher to print them out, this is a good site and a bad site.

"It's a lot easier to find out my grades," junior Sarah Marik said, "because I can just look at them whenever. I just don't like my parents seeing them everyday."

Students might be finding out that they have to work harder on everyday assignments because they do not have a week or a few days to get their grades up before their parents see them. Many parents like the program because of the availability of their child's grades and attendance.

"Honestly," teacher and parent Janet Tooley said, "I haven't even been on it for (junior daughter) Jamie yet, but it's great. As a parent, the idea of increased communication between home and school is very appealing to me."

Scotus has been looking for software to allow for parent and student access to grades for the past year. Scotus chose SIPS because it is so cost effective that in a few years it will pay for itself. The program that Scotus had before would have cost

a lot more and not been as useful as SIPS is.

"It beats the old system," mom Donette Jablonski said. "I don't have to call in on Wednesdays any-

Donette Jablonski said. "I don't have to call in on Wednesdays anymore."

One concern that teachers do have about the program is the possible loss of personal communication. Gannon said that SIPS should not replace parent-teacher conferences. It should not replace phone calls or meetings when needed. It is a great system, he said, but it is just an added tool.

Teachers have had to enter grades into the computer for many years now so the only change is not posting those grades in the classroom. There is more they can do such as assignments and discussion groups, but it is their choice. Teachers can also put power-point presentations on the site for students.

"For me this is the same as last year," chemistry teacher Jane Dusel-Misfeldt said, "because I never posted grades last year. I feel that if students use it though, it'll be beneficial in keeping them more informed."


"You got to keeping going no matter what happens," senior Ben Mlinar said. "You got to take the bad with the good."

Today, Americans average 6.9 hours of sleep on weekinghts and 7.5 hours of sleep on weekinghts and 7.5 hours of sleep on weekends according to a 2002 National Sleep Foundation's survey. For most people, getting to sleep in is an added bonus to their day. People are so busy in today's fast-paced world that they do not have time to sleep.





Scouting gives a player/team a chance to know what is in store, and it also gives them the chance to work out the kinks that may need to be addressed. It would be difficult for anyone to not know the slightest aspect of their opponent's game, but it can go into much greater detail.

All in all, a major part of any team is due to the coach, but the coaches must have all the correct tools to do what is best. Great assistant coaches can never hunt either. If you can take one thing away from this, let it be that the player will never control the coach's actions. Take what the coach says, absorb it, and then move on. Every player will make mistakes, and somettimes it may not be your fault and you get blamed, but take it in and let it go.





Freshman Brock Lower said that he would still go home even if he were only slightly sick. He said that it is usually on test days that he is sick because he did not study.


On the other hand, some students do not even think about playing hooky because that means they would have to catch up.


Senior Nicki Van Ackeren said that if she does not feel well enough she will go home, but if it means missing an important class then she will stay.


"I hate being sick," sophomore Kellie Johnson said, "because you're so worn down and tired all the time."

"I mainly work out to feel better about myself," he added.



should. I don't like how it tastes. I like how sweets taste, so I eat more of that instead of vegetables and things like that."
McElligott gave a possible solution to the problem of unhealthy eating patterns for high school students.

"Mostly I eat healthy because my mom cooks," senior Stephanie Hall said.

While Schumacher and Hall both said that they eat three meals a day, their snack amounts make the difference. Schumacher said she only snacks sometimes after school, but Hall said she usually has two snacks every day. However, differences in diet may come from differences in activity level.

"Look at individual needs depending on activity or inactivity," McElligott said. "Eating habits also vary with gender."

Special occasions and holidays are a time to be extra cautious of what you eat because foods are more tempting.

"Holidays are difficult because all the extra food is really good," Hall said.

Schumacher agreed that sweets are more tempting, and both girls said that not all healthy foods were difficult to put into their diets.

"Most fruits I'll eat pretty easily and like a lot," Schumacher said.

McElligott said that a good reference for a healthy diet is the Food Guide Pyramid.

Although the Food Guide Pyramid suggests five servings of fruits and vegetables for each day, McElligott said that the fruits and vegetables category would be a good choice to eat more of if necessary or desired.

If teens are concerned about their weight, they should monitor their calorie intake. Recent studies also show that eating three to four dairy products a day can help to improve weight loss.

Any or all of these methods can be used to eat healthier or to aid in losing weight. Eating fast food and quick-fix foods may seem like the solution today, but a good eating habit is the healthier decision in the long run.


No matter what opinions others may form, is not going to stop Cheloha and Levos from appearing the way they please.

When most people think of the word addiction, alcohol and drugs are what pops into their head. But caffeine? No way, right? Wrong. More than 90% of Americans consume caffeine every day.

Caffeine provides an "energy boost" for people or attentiveness and many feel they cannot wake up without the help.

"There were a few times when my hands would start shaking if I didn't have a pop in the morning," senior Haley Buelt said, "but I'm not that bad anymore. That was mostly in my sophomore year."

Caffeine occurs naturally in a wide range of foods like coffee beans, cocoa nuts, and tea leaves. A reason caffeine is so widespread is because it is added artificially to many other beverages. Average chocolate milk has 6 mg per ounce. One 12-ounce can of Coke, Pepsi, and Mountain Dew include an average of 50 mg of caffeine.

"I usually drink three pops a day," Buelt said, "and at least one in the morning."

Caffeine causes neurons in the

brain to fire more rapidly. The pituitary gland realizes this and thinks something is happening so it tells the adrenal glands to release adrenaline. Adrenaline can make pupils dilate, breathing tubes open up, and hearts beat faster. It can also cause increased blood flow to the muscles, muscles to tighten up to be ready for action, and the liver to release sugar into the bloodstream for extra energy.

Because the plot basically consists of the love "triangles," the emotions of the characters towards one another play a large role in where the story will go next.



Doctors and nurses get credited with saving lives everyday. But without blood donors, many of those patients might not have lived

Every two seconds, someone in the United States is in need of blood. For this reason Scotus holds an annual blood drive.

The American Red Cross needs
at least 2,500 usable units every
week to meet the need for blood.
They give Scotus a goal to meet
every year, with this year's goal being 96 productive units. There are
not enough faculty and students
of age to fill that goal so students
have to recruit parents to give. Last
year 18 parents volunteered to help
reach the goal.

The National Honor Society and
Mr. Younger's Physiology class always help with the drive. They talk
to people who are giving blood and
get people from their classrooms
to give blood. March 15 was the
date for this year's drive, which was
held in the Activity Center.

date for this year's drive, which was held in the Activity Center.

The actual procedure of giving blood takes only about 10 minutes,

but the entire process takes about 90 minutes. There will be a list of reasons why people are not able to give blood. These can include tattoos received within a year, certain piercings, recent traveling internationally, and certain medications such as Accutane.

The next step is filling out a questionnaire. One of the trained staff members will then measure blood pressure and temperature. After this is a blood test for anemia and then more q u e s -

is completed, the blood is ready to be drawn. During this time the person who is giv-ing will lose about one pound of body weight. After giving blood, there is free food, drink, and 15 min-

After giving blood, there is free food, drink, and 15 minutes to relax.

Only a small fraction of the people who give blood will not give usable blood. There are certain requirements that a donor has to meet. People who want to give blood have to be 17 years or older to donate and have either their driver's license or donors card with them at time of donation.

"I'm disappointed that I can't give blood," junior Kristina Flint said. "I missed the age deadline by seven days."

Another requirement is knowledge of all medications taken within a month of donations, all vaccinations received, and social security number. They have to weigh at least 110 pounds and no more than 350 pounds. Iron deficiency is another problem that makes blood unusable.

There are some precautions that people can take to make the whole process easier. Drinking extra fluids that do not contain caffeine or alcohol before donating helps. So does eating within two or three hours before giving and getting a good night of sleep.

Many people are worried about giving blood. It is not painful and should feel like a pinch on the inside of the arm, opposite of the elbow.

"I'm going to give, but I'm scared," junior Jen Haney said. "I don't have a high tolerance for

pain."
For people unable to make the drive but who still want to give, do not give up hope. There is an American Red Cross Chapter in Columbus that receives donations every Wednesday.

Bloody facts

- One pint of blood can help save up to three lives.
- An adult body contains 10-12 pints of blood.
- After a donation, fluid volume is replenished within 24 hours, and red blood cells in six weeks.
- ▲ About 5% of the public donates the 100% of the blood that is used
- The most common blood type is O positive, with 38.6%.
- ▲ The least common blood type is AB negative, with .9%.

Congress votes no to minimum wage increase



It's been eight years since the federal minimum wage has been raised, and a fight to raise minimum wage was just recently rejected by Congress.

When minimum wage was raised from \$4.25 to \$5.15 in 1997, opponents said that the raise would cause a loss of between 100,000 and 625,000 jobs. In 1997, the non-farm population produced more than 3 million new jobs, and the unemployment rate was the lowest it had been in 28 years.

Last year, the average household income remained just about \$43,000 a year, and the poverty rate rose to 12.5%, up from 12.1% two years prior. That comes up to almost 40 million Americans living in poverty today. Also, this past year was the first time in three years that women saw a decline in wages, and there were more children living in poverty and without health insurance, than the year before.

The Republican Party wanted minimum wage to be raised to \$6.25 over the next year and a half, whereas the Democratic Party wanted the amount to reach \$7.25 over a two-year period. Tragically, for many of today's teenagers receiving minimum wage, both ideas were shot down, and minimum wage will remain at \$5.15.

For many years the "Shamrocks" have been around, but Scotus has not always been considered the "Shamrocks." There are many people who support Scotus, but have not yet been told about its history. It has been too long for people not to know, but it will soon be told.

It all goes back to the Irish influence in the early years of Scotus. Franciscan Sisters started this school and named it St. Francis Academy in1878, but in 1925 St. Bonaventure Parish bought St. Francis Academy and the school was later named St. Bonaventure High School. As for being the "Shamrocks," this nickname ties in with the past.

Paul Ernst, the first St. Bonaventure boy's basketball coach, is the man who inspired the school's nickname to be the "Sham-

rocks." Nevertheless, that was not always the school's nickname. The first game was played on Decem-ber 9, 1936, against Lindsay Public High School and the 'Irish' won 56-9. "Irish" at that time was the team's nickname.

High School and the 'Irish' won 50-9. "Irish' at that time was the team's nickname.

The reason for this name was simply because all five boys that played were Irish; therefore, the team was called the "Irish" according to the school's old newspaper.

The following year on December 2, 1937, the first boys basketball game played that year, the team was donated new uniforms by Tooley Drug. Back then when the team received the uniforms, they called them "new suits." It was that year that the team was then called "Shamrocks." So, within that one-year span, the name was changed from "Irish" to the "Shamrocks." It is unknown when the name was actually changed, but Ernst played a big part in this change.

Activities Director Gary Puetz,

who has been at Scotus for 33 years, said that when Scotus was St. Bonaventure they were informally called "The Bonnies."

It was not until 1965 that St. Bonaventure became Scotus Central Catholic. It was not until a little later that a reporter from the Columbus Telegram started calling Scotus "The Rocks." Since then, this name has stuck with the school, Puetz said.

Puetz said as long as he has been here, he and the school have attempted to try and get a mascot. Scotus already has the name, but dressing a student up as a Shamrock or an Irish person might add a little more spark to some home game.





Personally, Ibelieve all great movies placed flawed relationships against a backdrop of a disaster making for unbelievable character development. Shaun of the Dead does this perfectly and on top of it all has witty pop-culture references, memorable parody, and danger that is not too over the top to be screen stealing.

As you may tell by now, this British import is no ordinary zombie movie. I find this movie to be a breathe of fresh air in a year of disappointing American cinema. It plays off stereotypes, mocking the works of legendary zombie filmmaker George Romero, but this does not make this the movie's soul. The other elements layered on top of this basis are so beautifully done that they make this film a shining example of what screenplay can be when combined with brilliant acting.

Shaun (Simon Pegg) is an ambition-challenged twenty something everyman who starts of the movie with a bitter break-up with his once bride-to-be, Liz (Kate Ashfield). With Shaun drowning in sorrows, his friend, Ed (Nick Frost), drags him to the Winchester, his favorite bar. After a night of wild partying they wake up to find London full of the pasty half-dead, a sarcastic irony based off the stereotype of the typical Londoner's appearance, a play on irony that is lost, like much British humor, in the "trip across the pond."

Looking outside, they discover one of these zombies and mistake her for an overtly drunk woman. As they go to wake her up, she attacks. Unable to recall how to stop a zombie, they literally throw whatever they can at her. Eventually they run out of things to throw and end up using Shaun's record collection. In an ingenious comedy bit, they edit it, spiting the worst of the records with scathing commentary and disposing them with a quick chuck at the zombies.

Eventually, they discover the old movie rule that says that only

destroying the brain kills the undead. They fight their way back inside their house, and Shaun is filled with the idea of saving his "mum." Shaun and Ed devise numerous ways to save her and eventually revising to save Liz as well. With the sum of their combined brain powers, the best these two heroes are able to come up with is to pick them up in a car and lock themselves in the Winchester till the whole thing blows over.

On the way, they pick up a couple of Liz's friend and Shaun's hated stepfather, Philip (Bill Nighy). Along the way, there is a hilarious race to get as close to the bar as possible. However, they end up abandoning the car when it is realized that Phillip has been infected.

In a show-stealing scene Philip reconciles with Shaum before Shaum is forced to kill Phillip. As they run to the bar, his beloved mum too becomes infected. When they reach the bar they find it surrounded by zombies. In a selfless attempt to save the others, Shaum leads the zombies on a chase, so the others can make it inside.

Inside the bar, there is a huge argument over the merits of Shaun's life, the merits of his plan, and if Shaun or any of them will survive. Eventually Shaun returns just in time to kill his own mum. Soon the struggle against the zombie's proves hopeless. It comes down to Shaun, Liz, and an already infected Ed locking themselves in the basement awaiting death.

To avoid a fate worse then death, they decide to kill themselves. They decided that only Shaun has the courage to actually kill them all, however they only have two bullets left and three people to kill. Shaun struggles with the idea of killing his stepfather, mother, best friend, and girlfriend in the same day; at this point, his life is of little importance to him. To see how it all ends you will have to watch it for yourself.

The intense drama and emotion of this movie pull at one's heartstrings and the humor slides itself in grim, but seamlessly. The ending is poetic and leaves one wishing that movie were just a bit longer. If you are not a fan of British film, then this movie will be your conversion. After it, you will know what movies are really suppose to be like.

The world mourns the loss Karol Wojtyla, the man better known as Pope John Paul II. The third longest reigning pope in the history of the Roman Catholic Church, his influence will be felt in the church for years to come.

The election of the pope is of vital importance to the whole world as he is the leader of the largest and oldest continuous organization in the world. With over 1 billion believers and over 2,000 years of tradition, whoever leads the Church will instantly become a player on the world stage.

The Conclave, the legislative body made of cardinals that elects the new pope, is set to convene

body made of cardinals that elects the new pope, is set to convene April 18. Pope John Paul II sway is strong in this decision since ninety-seventy percent of those cardinals eligible to vote were ap-pointed by him.

The candidates for pope need not be a cardinal or even a member of the clergy. Church law simply

requires that it be a practicing Catholic man. However, it tradition-ally has been a member of the Con-

Catholic man. However, it traditionally has been a member of the Conclave.

When John Paul was the first elected he was the first non-Italian pontiff in over 450 years. This new election brings the possibility of the first non-European pope in over 1800 years and could mean for first time in history that papacy could be held by someone not from the Western hemisphere.

"Politicking" for candidacy is strictly forbidden and the election is held in great secrecy. In keeping with the idea of breaking with tradition, several media outlets have been touting Cardinal Francis Arnize of Nigeria and Cardinal Claudio Hummes of Brazil as strong possibilities. Arnize has been especially of note within the Vatican for his diplomatic skills in Catholic-Islamic relations.





he finds her (now played by Jessica Alba) working in a strip club and realizes he has led the assassins right to her. Before he can leave, she notices him and Hartigan soon realizes how wildly in love the girl is with him.

He whisks her away, trying to save her from a terrible fate. Hartigan must simultaneously fend

off the hit men and Nancy's advances. Eventually it is revealed the pursuer is the senator's son seeking to finish what had started eight years ago. In the end, he is stopped and Hartigan, fearing Nancy could be used as a pawn against him, takes his own life to protect her.

Despite these interesting and tragic heroes, this movie has few redeeming qualities. Despite very solid performance from all the actors, Taratino's over-the-top violence makes the film far too one dimensional and in the end, one of the characters, Mary, is too brutal to like. 



"At least my fall was graceful," Douglas said. "I am lucky all I di was break my wrist."


