

Hurricanes cause damage

Life along the ocean has been tough recently for residents in Florida, Louisiana, and Hawaii as hurricanes moved through. Within a month's time two hurricanes, Andrew and Iniki, caused great destruction.

For days, transport planes were leaving Fort Bragg, N.C. full of cargo. Their destination wasn't to a foreign war. Instead they were heading to South Florida where it looks like a war zone after the destructive hurricane Andrew came through. The cargo on the planes has been much needed aid which helped the thousands that are left homeless. Basic supplies such as ice and gas were high in demand and were sold at extremely high prices by merchants.

Florida and Louisiana stood in the path of Hurricane Andrew that hit in mid-August. Andrew left its path in ruins and left thousands of families scavenging for food and other much need supplies. Among the disaster areas Homestead Florida was the hardest hit. In Homestead alone about 250,000 are estimated to have been homeless and \$15 billion in damage because of Andrew. In south Florida power was out to more than 750,000 and at least 137,000 in southern Louisiana. The total cost of damage in both Louisana and Florida has been estimated at \$20 billion.

Andrew first hit at around 4:30 a.m. near Biscayne Bay in Florida. Later that morning a wind gauge recorded winds at the speed of

164 miles per hour then the gauge broke.

Hurricane Iniki that hit Kaui, the Hawiian IIsland, also caused expensive damage recently. It has been estimated that the storm, which on September 12, created at least \$500 million in damage.

Marine landing ships were there for relief with ice, tents, cots, food, and fresh water to help the thousands of people without homes or power. It is estimated that more than 10,000 houses were severely damaged and 8,000 residents were left homeless. Most hotels and resorts in the area were damaged, sugar fields were flattened and the macadamia nut crop was destroyed.

"The students know how


we feel," said Wessel.

"I am gaining first hand experience about my job. Not just about the important things, but about the minor details as well." Buxton said.

Experience and skills are gained by students who are

involved in the program. "We have about 22%-30% of our graduating class entering the work force and the programs provide them with the experience and the entry level skills they need to find jobs in the Columbus area." Dierman said.





Finally the bell has rung and you can go to your locker and grab that candy bar before you have to run off to practice or your job. It may not sound like much, but when you're not going to eat for another three or four hours, it's enough to get you through until dinner. You open your locker and reach for-hev! Somebody took your candy bar.

If you made this discovery you are not alone. The administration searched most lockers and cleared them of any food

The administration was not totally wrong in their action as the handbook states: "Food and soft drinks are not allowed other than in the cafeteria, TA, or special class situations."

If the food was intended for between class snacks the administration has the right to remove it, but what if the food was for a class, afterschool, or for eating on the bus on the way to a competition?

They could not possibly have known what the intended purpose was behind all the food that was removed. Since the handbook policy had not been strongly enforced up to this point the administration should have given students a warning to remove the food from their lockers. By taking the food without warning some students may have lost the food they had intended to eat for dinner. For example, cross country members that bring lunch to eat with the team and keep it in their lockers may have had their food taken

If students had been notified of a search and not cleared their lockers, then the administration could have stepped in.

If the administration just took the food and threw it in a trash can they contradicted what they try and teach us. They tell us not to waste food in the lunchroom and in religion we learn the importance of being grateful for what we have when so many others have nothing. The administration should have allowed the students to reclaim their food and used this action to serve as a

In the future all students should be told when their locker is going to be searched. If a student is informed-yet still has food- it should be taken, but the food should either be given to someone who could use it or given back to the student after a fine is paid. Under no circumstances should any edible food be discarded.

Enforcing this policy from the start may have stopped the problem of keeping food in the lockers. The administration must realize there are times a student will need to bring food for a class or for afterschool and set up some kind of agreement on where this food is to be kept if it cannot be placed in the lockers. If policies are made and enforced and students are informed of them in a reasonable amount of time, there should be no need to remove or waste any food.

All of this has really scared me, so I have decided to do something about it. There are many things that teenagers and adults can do to stop abortion, and abortion related activities. I have attended a National Teens




Practice was in the new gym now, just one court away from the varsity side of the gym.





It seems like most teachers know when a football or volleyball player will be leaving from school early, but if you play "other


sports," they question your absports? Not too long ago football, sence. We hate getting dressed volleyball, cross country, and golf up for school and being asked why?





Weighting grades weigh heavy on our minds

Weighting grades has been a concern of many students in the past. Scotus currently doesn't practice this optionbut, some feel it would be a positivechange.

The practice of weighting grades would take into account theclass level of difficulty. Classes which are considered "harder" would be given more weight.

According to Superintendent Daniel Shartz, there are severa! methods currently practiced in schools that weigh grades. In some schools individual class grades are raised.

For instance, if a student received a "B" in a "harder" course it would appear as an "A" on the report card.

The second method would only affect the grade point average. The G.P.A. would increase if a student took classes that were weighed heavier.

"I would like it calculated in the G.P.A. That way if your G.P.A. is higher because you took all pud classes you could be passed up by a student that took tougher classes," Schartz said.

"The G.P.A. is an indication of attitude and effort," Schartz said.

"I'm totally in favor of it," senior Jim Springer said.

"Grades should be weighted because it's unfair to those that take difficult classes and work hard versus those who take pud classes," senior Chris Rickert said.

"Entry level classes and foods and parenting shouldn't be weighted as much. By entry level I mean basic math as compared to physics or calculus," Springer said.

Springer felt classes should be weighted according to difficulty. He also felt that Advanced Placement classes should weigh heavier.

"I don't think it's fair to discredit the amount of work people do in quote "easy" classes," senior Christi Wachal said.

The debate as to whether or not grades should be weighed according to class difficulty is a difficult one. Some classes do takemore time and effort than others, but weighting grades brings to mind a couple of difficult ques-

"The controversy usually centers on how do you determine the criteria for it." Schartz said. "Who's defining weight and what the word weight means?" Schartz

"The question that needs to be answered on this issue is how do you rate class material versus the sudents' ability to leam?" Springer said.

Many students agreed that classes such as art, music, and weight lifting aren't as difficult as a math or science courses such as physics.

"It depends on what the person is interested in," senior Becky Drum said. She is undecided as to whether or not weighting grades would be effective.

According to Schartz weighting grades hasn't been discussed in the last two years of board minutes.

"I would be open to any proposals and to study them, if all



the criteria were taken into account and studied well," Happy Thanksgiving
Schartzsaid.


Mark Sulzle, manager of Pizza Hut said that the new Pizza Hut was built "so that we can better serve the community."

Okay, so you practice,


but where? "We usually practice in one of the member's garages, but if things work out, we are going to start practicing in the basement of Bogey's."







U. S. aids Somalians

Death and starvation seem to cloud over the East African nation of Somalia. Can the "world's police force" fight off an adversary that has already taken the lives of 300,00 and according to the State Department takes 1,000 more each day.

In 1991 Somalia's president for the past 21 years, Siad Barre, was ousted by Ali Mahdi Muhamed. Barrefledthe country's capital, Mogadishu, after a month of intense fighting in the capital between pro-government soldiers and the United Somali Congress (USC). According to the Sunday Times of London (Dec. 29,1991) the opposing sides used left over U. S. and former U. S. S. R. weapons.

Somalia is in a state of civil wars that have developed between the numerous tribes of the country. On May 18, 1991, after the replacement of Siad Barre, the northern part of the country broke off in order to form an independent nation.

Since this time groups of outlaws and bandits have formed and the country is in a constant state of chaos. As a result, thousands of Somali civilians are dying of starvation and disease.

International relief operations have been set up to assist the starving nation, but due to feuding Somali warlords and bandits a majority of the food is intercepted and stolen.

To overcome this obstacle the United Nations transported food and supplies to a neutral port in Mogadishu. The plan has been titled Operation Restore Hope. Soldiers were hired from both sides to guard the food

on its journey to the Somali civilians. Despite this groups of bandits and warlords still manage to steal a large portion of the food and supplies.

Recently the question has been posed to the United Stated as to what they will do to assist the lawless nation. On Friday, December 5 the United Nations approved of United Stated assistance in Somalia.

According to Bush the United States will only be in Somalia for a couple of months. 17,000 U. S. troops were to be in Somalia by the end of last week said White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater according to the Lincoln Star. A total of 40,000 troops are expected to be sent to Somalia in the future.

Some friction has occurred between the United Nations and the United States concerning the role of the U. S. in Somalia. According to USA Today, on Sunday, December 13, Secretary of State Lawrence Eagleburger denied these alligations.

The Lincoln Star also reported the same disagreement. On December 14 the United Nations chief insisted that American troops should disarm warlord and bandit gangs, but denied that there was any disagreement over the issue.

However, the Lincoln Star went on to report that Fitzwater said that disarmament has "never been a part of our mission, and that has not changed."

Delivering food to the starving Somalis is the only U.S. objective at the present time. The "world's police force" doesn't plan on using its awesome power to control Somalia's playground of madness, but to feed its starving children.





Reponsible drinking offers no solution

Previous to the Blizzard Bash, I had heard rumors of the possibility of the use of a breathalizer at the dance. I felt that this would be a good way for the school to make students aware that they will suffer consequences if they choose to drink.

Taking into consideration that it is illegal to drink until you are

21 and the fact that this is a Catholic school, I have always felt that drinking and its side effects-let alone getting caught would be good enough reasons for most individuals choose not to drink. Although I don't agree with the choice to drink, I do feel students

may not be aware of the actions the school can take if they are found to be under the influence of

"If someone comes in staggering and acting obnoxious, we may test them," Superintendent Daniel Schartz said about using a breathalizer test.

The school does not own a breathalizer but does have access to one if they feel it is necessary. "It (the breathalizer test) is better than calling the police. It is an approach to work with par-Schartz said.

Before working with parents, the school must concern themselves

> with students. "Some students never cause big problems but a million little ones that project the same attitude of non-growth,' Schartz said. "For example most people think of detention as a joke,

yet we are trying to show that it is serious," Schartz continued.

In an attempt to make students realize the seriousness of bigger problems like drinking, the school is working on a new code to make students aware of the rules that already exist.

A policy that Schartz says "most aren't aware of" is that students can be disciplined for activities they participate in outside of the school.

The new code, though still not complete, will be included in next year's handbook under the discipline policy. One possibility that is being considered is for parent's to sign a Safe Home pledge stating that they will not hold parties for their children with alcohol in their home. The signing of this pledge may become a requirement for attendance at

Another consideration in o nl y preparing this code is to make disciplinary measures that affect all students, not just athletes. A decision is often made to suspend on the an athlete for two games, yet this has no affect on other students. The game suspension could still be a guideline for coaches, to make but other disciplinary actions out on such as probation, suspension, their own again. and dismissal would be applicable to all students.

The use of such policies would "help parents see the school as an institution that stands for the value of responsible drinking at the age that the law allows," Schartz said.

It doesn't surprise me that not everyone is aware of the action the school can take. After learning of all the disciplinary measures the school has at its use, I too, was surprised as I feel they are rarely used. To me it seems that incidents of drinking are not handled with the severity they should be.

While it's true that everyone makes mistakes, I wonder how they will ever learn from them

If drinking responsibly means that the alcohol's influence is undetectable, does it make it any more responsible for a driver to kill someone even if they aren't a staggering, bumbling, drunk? Does this mean as long as you can hide your drinking that it is OK (even if it is against the law)?

I am not saying that the

school is all to blame. A lot of the responsibility for teaching teens to stay away from drugs and alcohol is given to parents, and it should be. Parents may not always be strong enough to tell their chil-

dren no, and children may not always be ready to follow a parent's good example.

Programs such as DARE were unheard of when I was in elementary school, but today they have been established to help enforce the idea of staying away from drugs and alcohol.

I feel this is a step in the right direction. If parents and schools continue to work together hopefully someday there will no longer be responsible drinkers, but individuals responsible enough to not drink at all.

So far he said he is having fun, and is satisfied with the team. "I want the team to play hard, have fun, and learn to play," Puetz said.


Coaching basketball is nothing new to Puetz. Puetz said that he has coached varsity basketball. "I am probably doing things like they did in 1975," Puetz said.







ties," sophomore Kim Dvorak said.


Perhaps the best cure for spring fever was offered by Hightower, "sun".





Over the last year, as the Cold War has ended, Russia has gone through changes. These changes, however, haven't always been easy for the Russian people. Poor living conditions and food shortages have caused the people to get angry at their leader, Boris

Yeltsin, president of Russia, has recently encountered a power struggle between himself and the Russian Parliament made up of hard-core Communists not ready for the changes and hardships encountered. Recent efforts to impeach Yeltsin have fallen short. A recent vote to put Yeltsin's ousting on the agenda didn't even reach majority approval. It then became apparent that a two-thirds vote needed to directly impeach him would be near impossible. Yeltsin, speaking to an emergency session, told of his mistakes yet felt that the whole responsibility didn't lie on him. He pointed out that three branches of the government, including the Constitutional Court, had commmitted several violations that had also hurt the economy.

"It is not fair to accuse only the president," he said in a brief, impromptu speech.

Russia's Congress, dominated by hard-lined Communists, held another session to discuss and debate a reforandum on whether the president or the lawmakers should rule the country. The referandum was approved and will be put to the test on April 25 as Russian voters go to the polls

to make the decision. They will also vote on whether or not they support the economic reforms begun by Yeltsin in early 1992. Yeltsin was angered by these questions, feeling he should be able to ask questions of his own.

Yeltsin was hoping help was in sight as himself and President Bill Clinton met in Vancouver, Canada for a superpower sumit the first week in April. President Clinton's main objective in the summit was to keep Yeltsin in power so as not to return to a Cold War rivalry. Clinton offered needed help to Russia and Yeltsin because he felt that Yeltsin was the key to the changes in Russia. If Russia happens to slip back into Communism, it would hurt all of the nations, especially the United States.

In the past initiation has been trying for some future Thespians. "This year we used more of a positive influence. Initiation was less strict and less structured," Larson said.



"Everyone else was really laid back when they told you to do something, but Heidi was always yelling at you," Marik said.


"Overall I felt the effort on the part of the initiates was good. Some were better than others. I am glad to know that people like them will continue the troupe after I graduate." Larson said.



"Students at Scotus Central Catholic will make every reasonable attempt to conduct themselves in a manner worthy of the name Christian. A system of deterrents is set up to correct those who err and to protect the rights of others."

This opening paragraph sets the tone for the entire letter. The first time I heard of it I felt it sounded rather strict and unneces-

I have, however, reread the letter and for the most part it seems rather fair. A major difference included in these guidelines is the right the school reserve to enforce all rule whether they were committed on or off campus.

I disagree with this practice for several reasons. First of all. it is double jeopardy. In many cases the school is only notified of misconduct if law enforcement is involved. In these cases not only will a student be obliged to conform to community and family repercussions, but those from the school as well.

Secondly, I feel it is the parents responsibility to discipline their children for unacceptable behavior that takes place outside of school or off Campus. Perhaps the administration could contact the parents and a mutual effort could be made to correct the behavior, but in the end I feel the responsibility lies in the hands of the parents.

The rules aren't really that drastic or strict. They simply encourage behavior that has been expected of us our entire life.

The letter is somewhat repetitive. It states that students can be punished for "engaging in any activity on or off campus forbidden by law." It also states that students can be punished for stealing, selling illegal or illicit drugs, malicious destruction of property, or a conviction of a felony. All of these are illegal anyway and are covered in the rule previously stated.

All in all I think the letter made some very good points and doesn't demand over righteous behavior.
