"I thought the most exciting part [of the trip] was getting stuck. We watched movies, played games, and played in the snow," senior Kelsey


Wiehn said.





This new program allows those eligible students to take the class whenever it is convenient for them. They can choose which semester and which period that it is offered to


"There are so many other classes in the curriculum that are a semester long that by making the P.E. classes a semester long five days a week instead of every other day for a year, it made the schedule much more compatible for students," P.E. teacher Janet Tooley said.

The day to day curriculum was the main change. The class' weekly routine consists of lifting, boot camp, lifting, flexibility, and games. In the past, games and lifting were the only options that were alternated by day. "The goal is to utilize the different types of

fitness for individuals. If someone isn't in a winter sport, but will be in a spring sport, with Personal Fitness, they can utilize that flexibility day to get ready for their season," Tooley said.
All P.E. classes excluding 7th and 8th Grade P.E.

no longer require a gray shirt with green shorts uniform. Students must wear a Scotus shirt of their choice with appropriate shorts; for girls they must be at least mid-thigh.

The ultimate goal is for students to want to continue their fitness after this program with all the different types that the class offers," Tooley said.






Over the years, students and teachers at Scotus Central Catholic have come and gone, adjusting into different roles. English teacher Becki Zanardi is a prime example of this, having left the school and returned multiple times, dedicating her time and talents to different classes over the years.

Zanardi began at Scotus as a student teacher in the spring of 1988 while attending the University of Nebraska Lincoln. She had been acquainted with the school long before though, attending Schuyler High School. Eleven years and four teaching jobs after student teaching at Scotus, Zanardi, with the addition of her family, returned to Columbus and Scotus.













This year there were over forty scholarships and hundreds of awards handed out.



















Along with having a different season than prior seasons, many of the players also had different goals in


Junior Zach Svehla said, "My personal goals were to get better from last year. I especially wanted to get better at my serve."



"We had a lot of success this year and the seniors will be greatly missed, but we have a good base for the underclassman in the years to come."





"My favorite meet to compete in was the Scotus Invitational because that was where I had my fastest 5k of the year," junior Nathan


Hiemer said.



The Shamrocks cruised through their first round of state beating Ogallala 25-12, 25-20,







The past three years, the wrestling team had to practice in the cafeteria every day. This year, they were able to practice out at the armory.


"Practicing out at the armory is great. We have a big and spacious gym to wrestle in out there," sophomore Landon Sokol said.

The wrestling team had five seniors who laid a solid foundation for the young program the past four vears.



Overall the boys placed 9th at state and broke the school


record in the 200 medley relay.

Another big win for the girls during the season was defeating Norfolk Catholic by a solid thirteen points.



"I am very proud of the culture of winning that was created in our program. That is a credit to the players and coaches who invested a tremendous amount of time to make that happen," Ohnoutka said.



The boys started out strong scoring two goals in the first five minutes and never looked back. They went on to beat Columbus


High 2-1 and advanced to their third straight state championship game against undefeated and top ranked Elkhorn South.




Brezenski said. "This group of guys have a special talent, and it was an honor to coach all of them. I love all these guys like my sons, and I'm going to miss the seniors especially."





"Districts was my favorite meet because all the competitors were on the infield cheering their teammates on to get as many events to state as possible."


The track team overcame several injuries throughout the season and competed well at state. The eight boys who competed at state tied for the



"At first I wasn't happy at all about it, but by now I have learned to appreciate not having to pick out an outfit every day," Zargatalebi said.


For junior foreign exchange student Tim Chung from China, desserts were a pleasant surprise.








embarrassing moments.






















WE DID IT ALL

"Graduation was nice; the last time I'll probably see everyone in the same place at the same time. It was bittersweet to say the least," graduate Carson Fuchser said.


