









# Vimelo grow together...

"I really like my surrealism heart. It was a piece I made based on my heart disease, Hypoplastic Left Heart Syndrome," **Swanson** said.







"Caleb Kosch and Morgan Littlefield improved a lot. At our last performance, a judge said they were a believable couple," senior Cameron Swanson said.



"It was fun to learn the dance and perform at the game. There were a lot of people screaming and cheering. It was awesome," Svehla said.


The rest of the team members also enjoyed having the boys join them on the floor for this performance. "They all did great and looked happy while we performed. I

The guy/girl dance brings the parents and students to their feet after every performance.


"This dance is a favorite because the girls get to sit back and watch the guys attempt the routine, and that is always fun," sophomore Hannah Allen concluded.













the district final losing to Papillion.





One of the challenges the Shamrocks faced was their incredibly difficult schedule which included the number six team in the nation, Skutt Catholic.




Despite the adversity the Shamrocks faced, they came together to win some key games during their 14-12












## modern musical...

The musical cast, composed of around forty students, twenty being seniors, gave three live performances of *Thoroughly Modern Millie*.





"My favorite part of the dance was when **Mr. Coulter** came out to show us his dance moves," senior winter ball king **Mitchell Halligan** said.


The theme for this year's winter ball was "A Winter Wonderland."





"My favorite routine this year was when we performed at the football game before homecoming because we got to do our pyramid, and it looked very polished and clean," senior **Nikki Hiner** said.


The cheer squad also had many team bonding nights where they spent time with each other doing various activities.









The seniors organize the stations with each other, and this year they included music to transition from scene to scene.


Senior **Naomi Kosch** said, "[My favorite part of being in the stations was] being able to perform something meaningful with the whole class."







The night started off with a dinner catered by Husker House. After dinner, students were invited to join the DJ on the dance floor and dance the night away.






At the conclusion of the season, Brezenski's decision

to step down was not an easy one for him.

















**VunCannon** said, "I think they are a useful educational tool that reduces distraction in the classroom when used effectively."


Some teachers would go to extreme lengths to get all their students to put their phones in the phone caddies.
